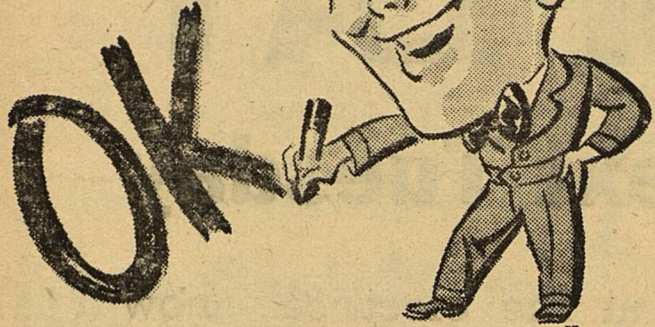

Fisher Reports On Special Session

As was expected, the called session of the Congress is moving slowly and will probably end in another week. Over in the Senate, the President's request for the passage of a Federal anti-poll tax bill was brought out and ran into an expected filibuster.

The Southerners don't want it because of the invasion by the Federal Government of rights reserved to the individual states to handle. Those who believe in states' rights contend that it is up to Texas, for example, to decide whether Texas is to require the payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting.

Moreover, even if a Federal law outlawing the poll tax is passed, and even if such a law should be held constitutional (which is doubtful), it would apply only to voting for Federal officials and not to state and local officials.

Other measures which are included in the President's so-called "civil rights" program, have little or no chance of passage at this session. These include an FEPC, anti-lynching law, and another against segregation. The FEPC Bill, which would establish a bureau to require farmers and merchants to hire colored workers under certain conditions, is pending before a Committee of which I am a member. I am in a position to know it will not be taken up or reported by the Committee at this session. The FEPC is a "dead duck" so far as the 80th Congress is concerned.

The best and indeed the only real solution of the race problem is through education and gradual progress. That must be done on a local, community level. It can't be solved by passing laws in Washington and trying to force people to change their thinking. Such attempts only aggravate the problem and set the clock of progress back instead of moving it forward.

A few months ago General Eisenhower testified before a Senate committee and defended segregation in the armed forces. In touching on the attempts to solve racial problems by law, he commented: "But I do believe that if we attempt merely by passing a lot of laws to force someone to like someone else, we are just going to get into trouble."

On the housing front, which is one of the problems featured in President Truman's message to the Congress, the President submitted a report made by the Council of Economic Advisers. It was there pointed out that the "residential construction is expected to increase the total supply of dwelling units by more than a million during 1948." It is further stated in the report that this is about all the building hat available material and labor will permit, and that the building boom is inflationary because it is serving to drive costs of construction, including labor, higher. Already the costs of new houses are prohibitive and many believe that to subsidize such construction at present would run costs up beyond what they may otherwise be—which are already entirely too much.

Firemen Publicize X-Rays With Polo

The Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department staged a session of water polo and hose contests last Saturday afternoon in the business district, to publicize the free X-rays which were being given this weekend by the state health department.

One of the main events was the hose racing contest, in which the two competing teams raced to see how fast they could connect their hoses to have them ready for fire fighting. This contest was conducted according to state regulations which specify that each group must couple the hose, connect the hose from the fire plug to the truck, and finally have 100 feet of hose ready for action. The team which is able to show water coming out the nozzle of their 100-foot length of hose is the winner.

Another exciting contest to bystanders was the bucket contest. Each team directs a stream of water on a large bucket, trying to move it across a certain line.

The group also met Wednesday for another evening of practice before the contests at Junction next week.

CO-OP WITH 301 MEMBERS TO DATE EXPANDS TO SONORA AND MENARD, EMPLOYS 15 MEN AND 5 VEHICLES

Force account (employees doing the work) has played an important part in REA development in the area served by the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op.

On August 1, 1946, the Co-Op had 188 miles of line in Schleicher County, serving 138 members, on August 1, 1947, there were 262 miles serving 220 members; today there are 348.6 miles serving 301 members.

This growth was accomplished by the contractor finishing sections A and B, and the crew building, by force account, 21 miles up to August 1, 1947 and 86.6 more up to August 1, 1948, most of this in section C.

The year of 1947-48 is characterized by completion of section C, paving the way for starting of section D and securing approval of Sec. E.

Section C, which has received attention of Southwest Texas officials for over a year, is so near completion that only another week or two may be required to conclude the job. Poles in line extensions will also be up soon, if work continues at its present pace, though twelve miles of wire is still lacking.

Sonora Line Is Next

One of two large projects confronting the Co-Op is 150 miles out of the Sonora sub-station, leading south to Juno and vicinity and covering southeast Crockett. Lackey of Junction as low bidder has been awarded contract for clearing the right of way on this 150 miles, and work may start this month, if present plans materialize.

All material except wire is on the ground, though the first carload of wire is expected in October.

Wire Shortage Continues

REA officials agree that the biggest headache in REA extension and growth is shortage of wire.

Steel has always been short, but aluminum is shorter—and both are needed in manufacture of wire, which is composed of a steel core with aluminum strands.

Shortage of this vital material has delayed work seriously, and there is no indication that it will become plentiful in the immediate future.

Work At Adams

Work will start soon in the Rudd and Adams community, in the northeast part of Schleicher County comprising 50 miles of Sec. D. Line is Outgrown

To serve members better and to relieve the load, a three-phase line from the railroad crossing near the Eldorado depot, to a point past Fort McKavett, will be put up, replacing the present single one which is inadequate for its load.

The line is used heavily, as it passes through the Page oil field, and picks up many users on its way to Ft. McKavett. The three-phase line will divide the load.

The present line, known as Line 1, is 130 miles long, and is more heavily loaded than the average REA line. Installation of the three-

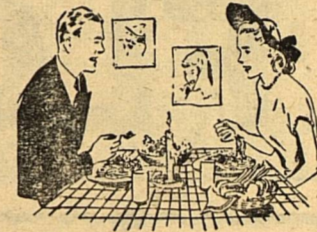
