8-MILE STRIP EAST-WEST ROAD IS OKAYED

An 8-mile link in what promises to be a through highway to Big Spring is given official okay, with announcement that the state has approved construction of this strip. The order reads:

"In Schleicher County a farmto-market road from U.S. Highway 277 in Eldorado west, a distance of approximately 8.0 miles, is hereby designated subject to the concurrence of the Public Roads Administration and subject to the condition that Schleicher County fill furnish all required right. of-way free of cost to the state.

'Upon fulfillment of the conditions of this Order, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction, at an estimated cost of \$55,000.00, and to assume the road for maintenance upon completion of construction."

The new highway from Big Spring to Big Lake is practically completed. New construction recently okayed includes:

Crockett County: approximately 29 miles from State Highway 163, 14 miles north of Ozona west and north to the Reagan County line; estimated cost \$255,000.00

Reagan County: 7.9 miles from U. S. Highway 67 at Big Lake south of the Crockett line; estimated cost of \$80,000.00.

With new highway assured over Lane, only one break oc-n the highway—about a 15mile strip between Eldorado's new 8-mile strip and the new strip coming from the other side of Schleicher Co. That the state will also pave this strip is the hope Schleicher Co. residents.

When completed, new highway would run from Menard through Eldorado west, crossing the northsouth highway and angling northwest into Big Lake.

It is expected that Schleicher Co. will start at once to purchase rightof-way on the 8-mile new strip and that work will start immediately afterward on construction.

Motorists of the southwest are interested also in the okaying of a 3.8 mile stretch from Highway 151 to Ft. McKavett, cost \$33,000.00

Patsy's prize was an unusual wool from the West Texas Woolen Mills here. The jacket is lined and is fitted, with a turnback collar, five buttons down the front, and a peplum. The skirt is pencil-slim. With the suit, she wore a pink dickey and other accessories of pink and black.

Material for the suit was donated earlier to the department by the West Texas Woolen Mills, with the agreement that the girl using the material would enter it in the contest and later keep the garment. The material, which would sell for \$9, and other purchases for the lining, buttons, etc., bring the total cost of the suit to around \$13.

ALL PREDICTIONS IN PRESIDENTIAL **ELECTION UPSET**

Harry S. Truman was re-elected President of the United States Tuesday over Thomas E. Dewey in one of the most amazing elections in the history of the county.

Where all the dopesters and experts had predicted a landslide for Dewey, the President with his party split in the north and the south came up with a majority in 28 states with a total electoral vote of 304. The above are figures given out Wednesday. Gov. Dewey conceded defeat at 11:15 a. m. (EST) Wednesday.

Schleicher's voters followed the state pattern, about 5 to 1 vote favoring Truman over Dewey. Two totals, 8 boxes reporting (Cliff not in) are:

President: Truman 487, Dewey 100, Thurmond 43.

Senator: Johnson 471, Porter 143. Practically all amendments carried. This is the largest Republican vote cast since Hoover carried Texas in 1928.
