Bailey Ranch Boys Build Nativity Scene

An unusual pleasure awaits any motorist who drives past the Bailey Ranch Baptist Church after dark during the holiday season, for he will find a beautiful reproduction of the nativity scene, done life-size and illuminated with floodlights, in front of the church facing the road. Schleicher County residents are indebted to the Royal Ambassadors, a group of boys in the church, who conceived the idea for the scene and carried it through to completion.

The entire nativity scene is shown. In the center are Joseph and Mary, watching over a manger, and in the background are shepherds, the wise men, the camels and sheep. All of the figures are life size and are colored realistically. They are grouped under an outdoor tabernacle, which stands in front of the church near the road.

The inception of the scene grew out of a recent RA meeting, at which the boys and their sponsors were discussing the true meaning of Christmas, and trying to find ways in which they could make other members of the community happier and more joyful on Christ's birthday. It was pointed out that such a project did not need to cost any money, and that anything, even the old tabernacle under which they were sitting, might be made into something which would make the whole community remember the true meaning of Christmas.

The suggestion was then made by the group that they make a replica of the nativity scene in the tabernacle, and plans were made by the group and carried to completion. Various members of the church helped the boys with the wiring for the floodlights, and other details of arrangement, but the boys were in charge of the entire undertaking.

The scene will be lighted until January 1, and any Schleicher county residents who have not yet seen it are invited to drive by after dark, when it is especially lovely.

Courthouse Display Attracts Attention

Travelers coming through Eldorado after dark have been very impressed with the beautiful display of lights on top of the court house, which are visible for a long distance down the road. Many favorable comments have been heard—some observers say that Schleicher County has the most original idea of any town in this area.

Strung down the south side of the court house are a number of red lights arranged to form a large cross. On the court house roof the figure of Santa is seen, climbing down a ladder. Two of his reindeer are also there, drawing a red sleigh. The entire scene is brilliantly lighted.

The thanks of the county goes to the Lions' Club and to the Volunteer Fire Department, who arranged the display. The arrangement is not only a source of pleasure to residents of this county, but also indicates to travelers the imagination and ability of Eldorado businessmen.

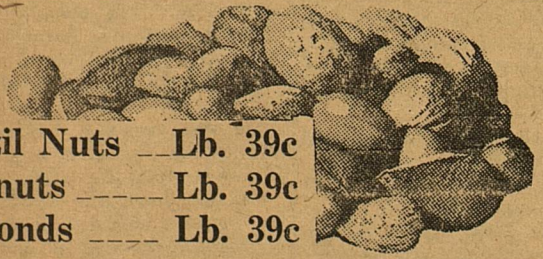

Because of shortage of storage room, the Jackson well is being kept closed most of the time, and is allowed to flow only at stated intervals. On Tuesday of this week the well was opened for 3 1/2 hours and flowed 42 barrels of 42 gravity oil during that period, through a 1/4 inch choke. Opening pressure on the tubing was 35 pounds. Flowing pressure was between 150 and 175 pounds throughout the flow.

It is understood that the Shell pipeline company will make pipeline connections to this well early in the coming year.

On this the 20th day of December, 1948, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, convened in special session at a Special Term of said Court at the regular meeting place thereof in the Court-house at Eldorado, Texas, with the following members of the Court present, to wit: C. L. MEADOR, Jr., County Judge; J. E. SPENCER, Commissioner Precinct No. 1; L. G. EDMISTON, Commissioner Precinct No. 2; CARROL WHITE, Commissioner Precinct No. 3; L. MOORE, Commissioner Precinct No. 4; H. T. FINLEY, County Clerk, when, among other proceedings had, the following order was passed:

It was moved by Commissioner J. E. Spencer, and seconded by Commissioner L. G. Edmiston, that there be submitted to the qualified voters of the said County who are property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County in the sum of \$15,000, for the purpose of repairing and improving the Schleicher County Courthouse; the proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County in the sum of \$25,000, for the purpose of improving county parks in said County; and the proposition for the levy and collection of an annual tax not exceeding five (5) cents on each one hundred dollars assessed valuation of the county for the purchase and improvement of lands for use as county parks; the election to be held on the 15th day of January, 1949; the motion carried by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners J. E. Spencer, L. G. Edmiston, Carrol White, L. Moore.

Thereupon, the following ELECTION ORDER was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the qualified voters of Schleicher County, who are property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the propositions hereinafter set forth:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 15th day of January, 1949, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION NO. 1
Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of \$15,000, payable serially within ten (10) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half (3 1/2) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of repairing and improving the Schleicher County Courthouse, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

PROPOSITION NO. 2
Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect an annual tax not exceeding five (5) cents on each one hundred dollars assessed valuation of property in said County, for the purchase and improvement of lands for use as county parks. The said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed presiding officers for said election:

At the Court House Building, in Eldorado, Texas, Election Precinct No. 1, with W. T. Whitten as Presiding Officer.
At the Eldorado High School Building, in Eldorado, Texas, Election Precinct No. 1A, with W. N. Ramsay as Presiding Officer.
At the Mayer No. 1 School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 2, with John I. King as Presiding Officer.
At the Adams School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 3, with Jim O'Harrow as Presiding Officer.
At the Vermont School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 4, with Oran Enochs as Presiding Officer.
At the Mayer No. 2 School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 5, with D. C. O. Wilson as Presiding Officer.
At the Alexander School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 6, with Dick Ramsel as Presiding Officer.

At the Cliff School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 8, with J. Forrest Runge as Presiding Officer.

At the Reynolds School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 9, with J. W. Davis as Presiding Officer.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF COURTHOUSE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 1."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF COURTHOUSE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 1."

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PARK BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 2."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF PARK BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 2."

"FOR PARK TAX, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 3."

"AGAINST PARK TAX, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 3."

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the three propositions, respectively.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote.

A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of said County and attested by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The County Judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the County Courthouse door and in each election precinct at least fifteen (15) days prior to the date of said election.

The County Judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published within said County on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

After ten days in the city, Dutch is back in uniform. I don't mean Army khaki or Navy blue—but a different uniform, that's every bit as patriotic and American.

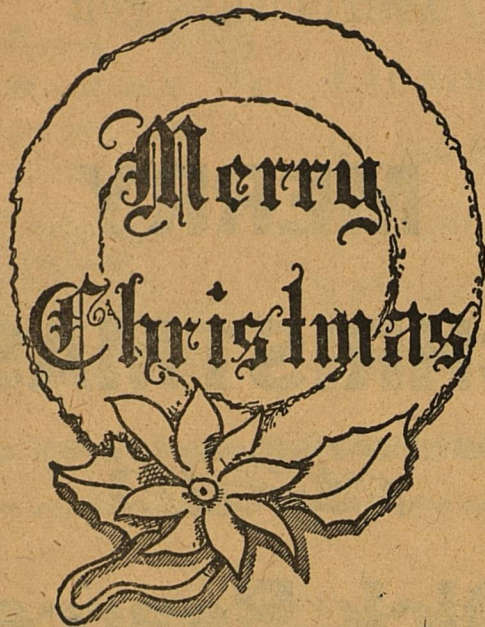

Santa appeared at the party and distributed the many gifts which the students had exchanged with each other.

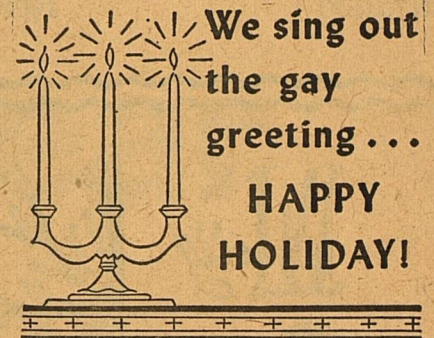
