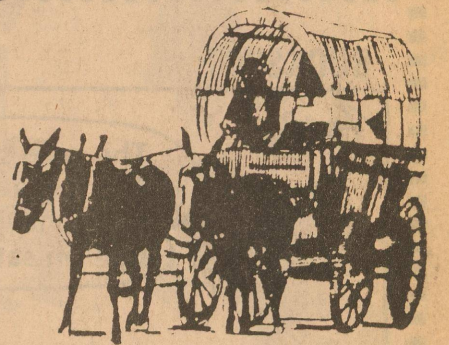

Headlines From Around The World

Washington, D.C.

President Bill Clinton announced this week that Stephen Breyer is his nominee to replace retiring Supreme Court Justice Harry A. Blackmun. Breyer, a New England Court of Criminal Appeals Justice and former Harvard Law School professor is virtually assured of senate confirmation as leaders of both parties have signalled their approval.

The nomination ends five weeks of speculation about who the President would select. Early favorite, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt reportedly withdrew from consideration when it became apparent last week that he would face a strong challenge from conservative lawmakers during the confirmation hearings.

Smithfield, North Carolina

An Amtrak passenger train derailed early Monday morning about 25 miles southeast of Raleigh, North Carolina after it collided with a tractor trailer that was being carried on board a CSX freight train. Amtrak personnel speculated that the tractor trailer laden with cat-box filler had shifted on it's flat car and was sticking out into the path of the oncoming Amtrak locomotive.

The mishap left one dead and hundreds injured as all but one of the 19 passenger cars derailed. A Red Cross shelter was quickly established to render medical assistance and travel help to the stranded passengers.

Washington, D.C.

Lawmakers this week ordered the signs which reserve congressional parking places at Washington airports replaced with less conspicuous ones. The old signs designated parking places for "Members of Congress" and "Supreme Court Justices." Now the markers will simply say, "Restricted Parking, Authorized Users Only."

The changes come amid a furor over congressional perks and privileges. Critics claim that the lawmakers are trying to preserve their benefits by making them less obvious to the public.

Portland, Oregon

Shane Stant, the man who struck Olympic skater, Nancy Kerrigan on her knee with a steel rod, was sentenced to 1 1/2 years in prison this week after pleading guilty to the assault. Derrick Smith, the driver of the get-away car also entered a guilty plea and received the same sentence.

Shawn Eckardt, part-time body guard for Kerrigan's rival, Tonya Harding pleaded guilty to racketeering in the case. His sentencing was delayed until July 11th.

Eldorado High School Graduation Ceremonies will be held at 8:00 PM Saturday, May 21, 1994 in Eagle Stadium. Forty Five members of the 82nd graduating class will receive their diplomas during the program.

This year's Valedictorian is Justina Saunders with a four year average of 98.631. Justina is the daughter of Norris & Sharon Sauer of Eldorado and John & Sue Saunders of San Angelo.

Justina received many awards during her high school career including: the "Semper Fidelis" Award for musical excellence presented by the U.S. Marine Corps Youth Foundation, the John Phillip Sousa Award and the Bausch & Lomb Science Award.

Justina plans to attend Angelo State University where she received a Carr Academic Scholarship and an ASU Band Scholarship. Justina

intends to major in physics and minor in music while pursuing a Bachelor of Science Degree. She plans a career in Aerospace Engineering or Teaching.

Cy Griffin of Eldorado received the Dutch Klein Thunderbird Award at the 27th annual New Mexico Junior College Athletic Awards Presentation, Wednesday, May 4, 1994. Cy, son of Johnny and Julie Griffin and a 1992 graduate of Eldorado High School, was the first member of the NMJC Rodeo Team ever to receive the award.

Bond Election Next Week

A bond election called for by the trustees of the Schleicher County Independent School District will be held Thursday, May 26, 1994. The proposed bond would raise \$1.2 Million in revenue for the purpose of constructing a new gymnasium and updating and renovating existing facilities.

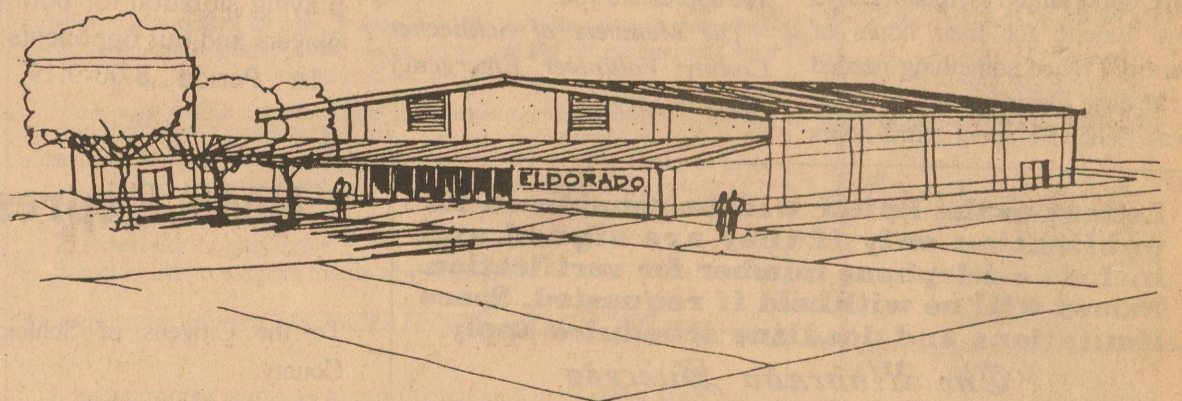
The largest portion of the bond issue would go toward the gym and physical education facilities. The proposed gym would be built adjacent to Fields Street in the area of the current parking lot and bus barn. Although no architect has been hired, it is speculated that the

new gym would have fixed seating elevated well above the gym floor on one side of the structure and collapsible or roll-away temporary seating on the other.

Another project the school board plans to fund with monies from the bond issue is a technology/industrial technology center. The office building on North West Street currently occupied by the ASCS office has been purchased by the school district. Plans are in place to renovate that facility to handle classes thereby alleviating overcrowding in existing facilities. Superintendent of schools, Scott

Barton stated, "The current gym was built in 1958 when Eldorado had 602 students. Today we have 780. In 1958 there were 4 basketball teams and two physical education classes in grades 7-12. Today there are 10 basketball teams and eight P.E. classes. We have outgrown our current facilities."

The bond election will be held in the Memorial Building, Thursday, May 26, 1994 from 7:00 AM till 7:00 PM. Early voting began May 6th and will continue through Friday, May 20th in the SCISD Administration building located at 205 W. Fields St.

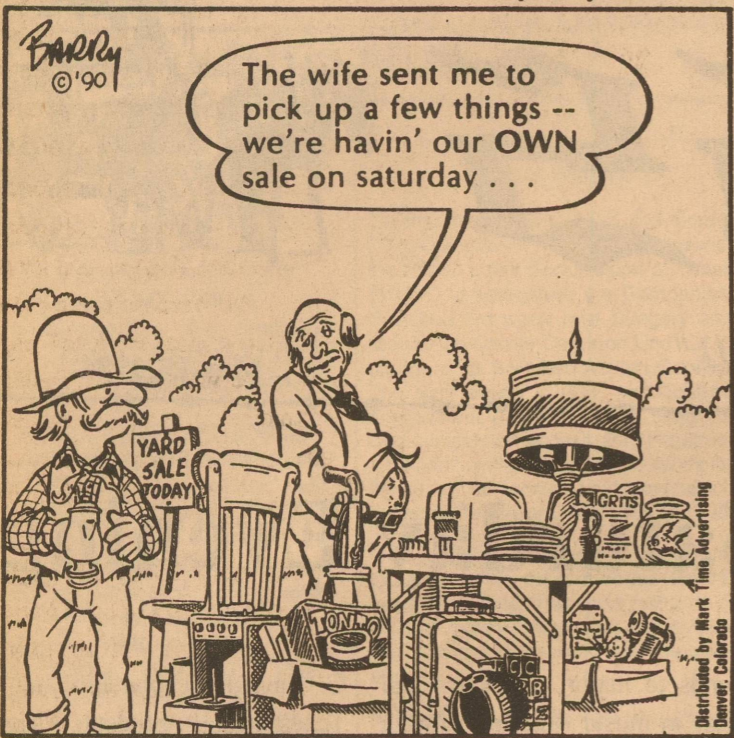

Open Letter Concerning School Bond Election

We plan to move them to the ASCS building also. The elementary, band hall, and auditorium are in need of costly repairs. The elementary needs repairs to the outside doors and the physical education dressing rooms, which were constructed in the 1930s. The band hall needs exterior doors replaced, leaks fixed, and general fixing up and painting. The auditorium desperately needs new seating.

We also hope to build a gymnasium to relieve overcrowding and improve student safety. I have included a schedule for our current use of the high school gym, which was built in 1958. The elementary gym is used all day by grades from early childhood classes through grade four.

This elementary gym has had little renovation since it's construction. Half of the middle school and junior varsity games are actually played in this gym. The gym floor is not standard regulation size nor is the out-of bounds area far enough away from the walls. These two things together create a dangerous playing situation for both our players and our opponents

On May 26 you will have the opportunity to vote on a \$1.2 million building program for the improvement of our schools. While the focus of discussion seems to lean toward the gymnasium, it is important, I think, for you to be aware that the gym is only a part of the construction program. Below, I have attempted to outline our plans for construction if the election is successful.

Recently, we purchased the former day care center building. (The ASCS offices are housed there now.) It is our plan to enlarge this building and move our agriculture science and industrial technology classes to this facility. Currently, neither program enough space to provide instruction safely. The agriculture science building will then be converted to an art, computer sciences, and nursing technology building. All of these areas of study utilize computers and other technologies that require a lot of space.

The high school functional living skills class currently has no classroom. They are housed in a teacherage across the street from the high school.

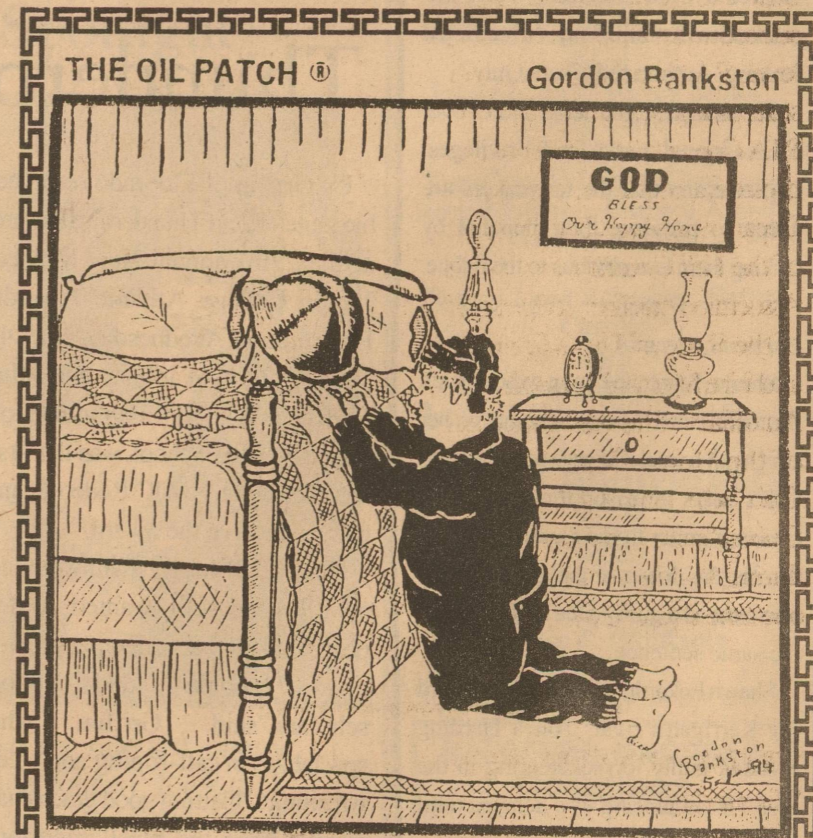

BEFORE SCHOOL: In order for our middle school teams to have any practice time, they often have to come before school, which is an inconvenience to families that have students who need to come to school at a later time.

AFTER SCHOOL: Varsity boys and girls rotate weekly for late practice. They begin practice after the freshmen and junior varsity boys and girls finish. This means that every week either our boys or girls varsity players do not finish practice until after 9:00 p.m. At least once a week there are middle school or junior varsity games scheduled in both gyms after school and into the evening. This means that the other teams who are scheduled to practice have to wait until the games are over which in turn causes even later practices.

Also, take into consideration our travel requirements on Tuesday nights. On out-of-town games, it is frequently after midnight before these same players get home. If we are going to continue to enjoy the long proud tradition of academic excellence in the Eldorado school system, we must give our students every opportunity to be successful.

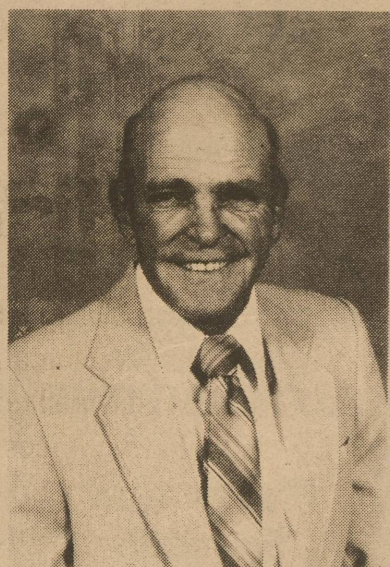
Schleicher County Emergency Medical Service for their support and encouragement during the process of being accepted on the Kerrville Police Department.

Jerroll E. Sanders, age 72, passed away Sunday May 8, 1994.

Services were at 10:30 AM Tuesday, May 10, at the First Baptist Church of Eldorado, officiated by Dr. Lee Brewer, and the Reverend Kenneth Vaughn of Zephyr. Military graveside rites were conducted by the Color Guard from Goodfellow Air Force Base in the Eldorado Cemetery.

Jerroll was born July 3, 1921, in Diboll, Texas, and moved to Eldorado in 1954.

During World War II, he was commissioned a first lieutenant in the Air Force. While stationed in England he was shot down and imprisoned in Germany for 15 months. He also served during the Korean Conflict.

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twins. I said I would and thought I would like to go with Jack," Mrs. Moore said. "That was in February of 1951 and we were married on August 25th of the same year."

Jack was a farmer/rancher in the Reynolds community. "Along with Jack came many new friends and many relatives. We thought we would live west of Eldorado all our lives but the drought of the 1950's changed our plans," she explained.

Her husband went to work in San Angelo where their three children were Celeste, Sarah and Marshall were born. Demands of a young family took Mrs. Moore away from teaching for 13 years. She exchanged grading papers for changing diapers and baking cookies.

When her youngest child, Marshall was in the fourth grade, she returned to teaching. At this time, the Moore family was living in Columbus, Texas, near Houston. She taught math and English in Columbus for nine years. When their last child graduated in 1974, the family moved back to west Texas. Jack bought a hog operation south of Christoval where they still live.

She returned to teaching at EHS in the fall of 1975. Mr. Robert Jay was her principal.

"This May I will retire. I will have

completed 30 years of teaching overall, 21 of which have been with SCISD," the veteran teacher explained. "It somehow seems fitting." She has come full circle, ending where she began.

For those of us who have been subjected to her sermons on honor, responsibility and respect; for those of us who had to write papers, study vocabulary, discuss ideas and voice our concerns about the future; for those of us who woke at the crack of dawn for UIL trips; and for those of us who became more cultured and shared great works of English literature with her, we look back upon our high school years and say goodbye to an admirable educator and a true friend. She will be missed.

"There are many things I will miss. For the most part, I have had a good rapport with my students and they have kept me young. My strong belief that there is good in everyone has influenced the way I teach. Sometimes that good is pretty well hidden but it's there," she said.

"To all my present and former students, I would like to say 'thanks' for letting me share a part of your life," she concluded.

Dorothy's Movie Time

I'm back with 2 movies again this week. Both are primarily adult films. The first is "A Perfect World" starring Clint Eastwood and Kevin Costner. 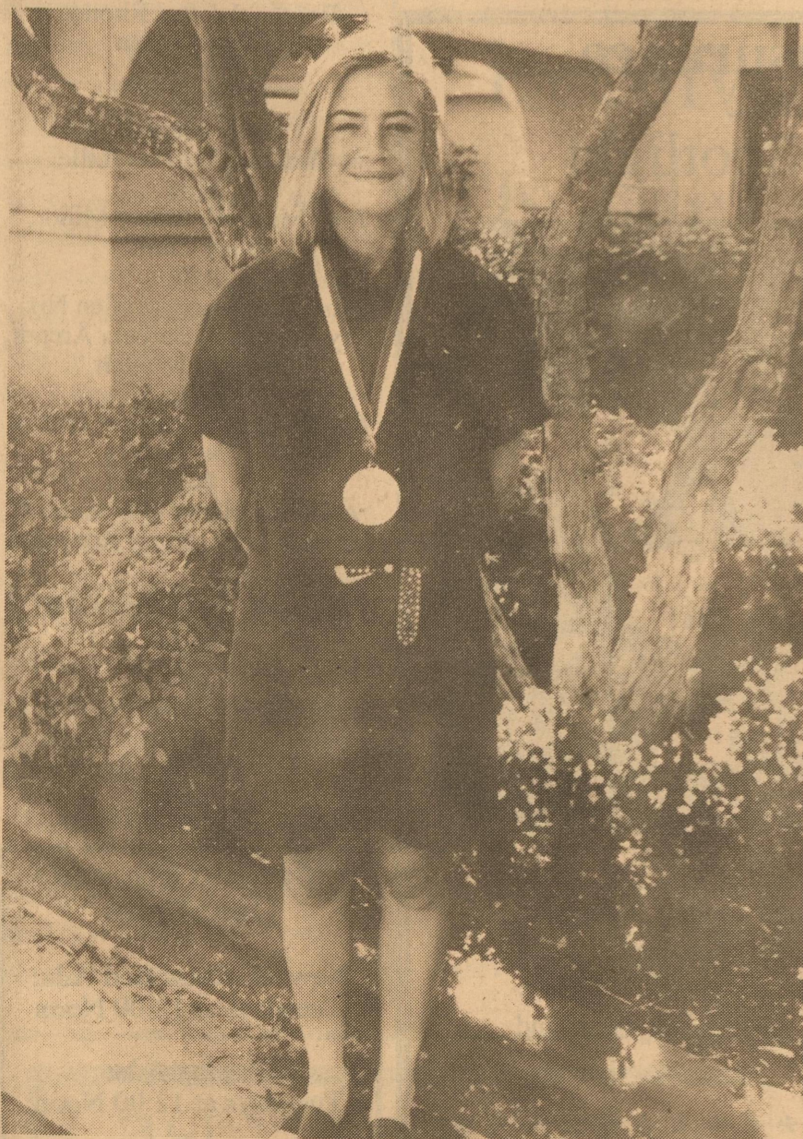
