COUNTY AGENT PREDICTS 1949 CROP SITUATION

What's ahead in the crop situation for 1949? This question has been asked by

Here is the answer.

There's a caution out for wheat and feed grain producers. Prices of these crops probably will drop about a third this Winter and Spring. So they will be about onethird less than they were in 1948. Exports will be as large next year, but will be trimmed in places by large demands for durable goods and armaments.

Figuring on average weather have a good year. The agricultural economists figure that there will be twice as much cotton exported next year as last. The nation here at home will not use as much cotton as in 1948. The support price will hold at 90% of parity-which means that the government loan will be around 27 cents for middling seven-eighths inches in Texas of the mothers, and will begin at markets. Feeding costs will probably be much cheaper than in 1948. Supplies of hay are generally fair with a record of feed concentrates per animal unit. Consumer demand is expected to continue high with the U.S. population increasing by two million annually and a record number employed. The feeding of livestock looks generally good. Too, the government has called for an increase in lamb, pork, and beef. However, the prices of livestock as a whole are expected to be down moderately, but not to the extent that the feed ratio per pound of meat won't be up over 1948. -W. G. Godwin, Co. Agent.
