WEST HIGHWAY SOON TO BE OPEN TO MIDWAY LANE

The stretch of west highway to completed, after topping equipment | Hq Hq and Service Co. and crew have been on the job for some time.

This stretch of highway, which starts at the county line, connects with the Schleicher paving, to complete the paving to the Midway Lane highway.

Remaining to be completed is another stretch of the road in Crockett county leading west from Midway Lane, to connect with the paved strip into Big Lake. Work on this stretch has also been under

way for some time. The West road has been closed to traffic at the county line while the caliche and gravel base and topping were being applied. It is expected here that the fence wil be taken down late this week or soon afterward, thus opening the road to general traffic west. For the time motorists going to Big Lake will use the Midway Lane road and go through Barnhart to reach their destination. Later the entire new road will be in use.

From a point eight miles west of Eldorado, to a point about 12 miles from Big Lake the new road follows a new route. It goes thru oil country in Crockett, and will probably be put to good use by oil operators as well as ranchers and the motoring public in general.
