Choice Of Service To Be Restricted

The Commanding Officer of the San Angelo Recruiting Station today advised men contemplating enlistment to act before May, to insure obtaining their choice of service. He based his statement upon information released this week by the Defense Department in Washington which will restrict volunteers in their selection.

Though stating that he had not received official notice of the new plan, Sgt. A. J. Martin pointed out that it will not be effective until May 1 and the recruiting ser-vice can still enlist men under pre-sent regulations. "The volunteer can still select from several different enlistment programs," he said. 'These include: the Regular Army, the Air Force, the Airborne, and the Far East Command; or, for high school graduates, a choice can be made of any of 23 Army Technical Schools. Qualified men are also being sought for Army Officer Candidate School attendance," he added.

"The Air Force volunteer undergoes aptitude testing at Lackland Air Force Base and is assigned to duties commensurate with his abilities and desires. Men with previous service may qualify for a non-commissioned grade in the Air Force providing they have sufficient technical or educational background," he concluded.

It was estimated that a million Rev. Charles G. Bruce of Kenedy, people lined the streets to cheer comparable, none approached the total who saw and heard Mac-Arthur because television is of ecent origin.

Mrs. MacArthur, dressed in blue and with a white orchid given her by the Tennessee DAR, of which she is a member, preceded the General into the House. She sat in a gallery seat, looked down on the Senators and military attaches as they were announced. Then at exactly 12:30 the arrival of Mac-Arthur was announced amid a tumult of cheers and applause. He poke for 35 minutes.

This occasion was reminiscent of the other returning heroes of the war—Eisenhower, Nimitz, Bradley, Clay and Wainwright. Each of them were received in Washington when victory was fresh and grati-tude was abundant. It is difficult to pick out any one and say he was received with the most enthusiasm, but the post-war triumphal entry of Admiral Nimitz into the Capitol will be recalled for generations It was probably the most grandiose of all history, and this is no re-flection on the others.

The MacArthur message was firm, dramatic and challenging. He defended his belief that Chinese bases in Manchuria should be bombed, that Formosa must be defended, that Chinese Nationalists on Formosa should be aided and encouraged, and that an effective naval blockade be thrown around the Chinese coast.

The speech has set the stage for House and Senate committee hearings on the over-all Far Eastern policies. The General himself will have a chance to detail his plans and his strategic concepts in meeting the global challenge of Com-

munist aggression.
THE MORALE of troops is running high these days. At least that is true with the 5th Marine division now engaged in the vininity of Hongchon, according to a letter I just received from my former Secretary, Lt. Lathem Ables of Brownwood. He was a Marine reservist and was recalled last April.

"I landed in Korea on February 16 (my birthday)," he reported, "and was assigned to "B" company, toon and told that we were moving up in the attack.

"Our movement toward the 38th parallel has been slow and cautious in accordance with General Ridgeway's policy of keeping the line intact and taking no chances."

Speaking of morale, Lt. Ables commented: "I can say that there is a mistaken idea in the States of 'low morale' of the troops over here—or at least so far as the 5th Marines are concerned. The boys are the finest I have ever seen and moral is about as high as it can get. Nothing at all seems to faze them and their combat efficiency is


