**News From Our Neighbors**

**Valuations Upped**

Coke county's taxable valuation for 1951 will be nearly 15 million, an increase of 2½ million over last year. This information was presented to the Commissioners Court here Monday by Frank Eudy, representative of Thos. Y. Pickett & Co., evaluation engineers of Ft. Worth. The firm is hired to handle oil and utility assessments for the county on a percentage basis. Mr. Eudy's early estimate shows an increase of \$2,400,000 on oil properties in the county, due to the completion of 53 new wells during the past year. Coke's total taxing valuation was \$12,358,940 in 1950. —Robert Lee Observer.

**Rain For Big Bend**

Rain which fell last Thursday night and Friday afternoon broke a serious drought in the Big Bend-Davis Mountains area, bringing moisture ranging from one-half to as much as two inches, according to reports received here. The rain in the immediate Alpine area fell slowly Thursday night, over a period of several hours, the precipitation totaling .51 inches. Another shower fell locally Friday afternoon, bringing an additional .20 inches of moisture. —Alpine Avalanche.

**Rain At Fort Stockton**

Spring-like thunder showers and slow rainfall last week-end brought unexpected but welcome moisture to parched rangelands of the Trans-Pecos country, ranging from a half-inch up to more than an inch in places. It began with a thunderstorm Thursday night in an area south and west of Fort Stockton, followed by continued damp weather Friday, and another shower in local areas Saturday. —Ft. Stockton Pioneer.

**Improvement Election**

Sutton County voters will go to the polls Saturday to decide whether \$15,000 shall be spent for right-of-way to straighten out part of U. S. 290 in the Roosevelt area, whether the county shall levy a part of the ad valorem tax which the state is dropping this year. Two propositions are to be voted on Saturday. One is for \$15,000 bond money to enable the county to fence a stretch of right-of-way to straighten part of Highway 290, and the other is to determine whether the county shall take up 30c of ad valorem tax which the state will drop this year. —Devil's River News.

**Election at Ozona**

Crockett county voters will go to the polls on Saturday, March 24, to decide the question of the issuance of \$350,000 in school building bonds for the purpose of constructing a liberal arts building to house the home economics, manual training, band and museum and an addition to the North Elementary school. Responding to a petition signed by the required number of qualified voters, the Commissioners Court of Crockett county meeting Monday ordered the election to be held March 24 and set up election machinery for the special voting. —Ozona Stockman.

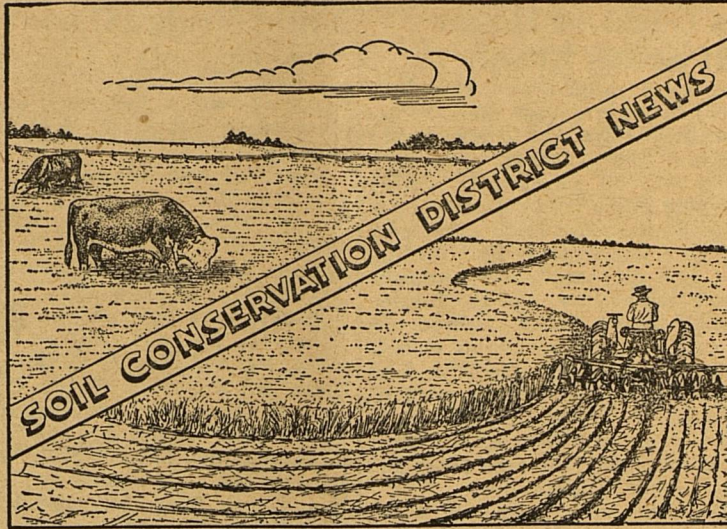
**STANOLIND MOVES IN**

Applications approved by supervisors at their regular monthly meeting in March for assistance in planning and applying conservation practices included W. V. Lux, R. J. Nixon, and H. L. Galbreath for a total of 4,221 acres.

Grass planting season is here again. Several district cooperators have made plans for planting grass this spring. Those planning to plant grass should purchase their seed if they haven't done so already, and make plans to get them planted as soon as possible.

Satisfactory stands have been obtained with several seedbed conditions, however, there has been some very noticeable conditions.

Seedlings on sorghum stubble showed up favorably last year. Where the sorghum was kept free from weeds the previous year, there will be less weed growth this season and the seedlings should grow well this year.

Seedlings on cultivated land which was clean tilled ahead of seeding also looked very good. This method favored early growth for the seedlings, and they were able to establish themselves even though weed competition becomes severe later in the season.

Seedlings on land which has been out of cultivation only one or two years and the present cover is largely weeds. Most of these are overseedings of partial stands obtained from seedlings made one or two years ago. Under these conditions K. R. bluestem stands are very good, but the seedlings are not making as much growth as is desired. Doubtless some of these plantings will be satisfactory in time, but it will take them longer to become established.

**Preparation For Next Season**  
Land still in cultivation and

want to put in grass, regular plantings of sorghum crops in rows will provide a satisfactory condition for grass seeding the following spring. The crop may be either combined or cut for bundle feed. Crops should be cultivated thoroughly to eliminate as much weed competition as possible for the grass seeding.

It is important that the tillage be thorough and the seedbed free of weeds. It should also be as firm as possible. For row seedlings, bedding in the ordinary way is very good preparation. Beds can be firm-ed with a drag harrow and the seeding made in the center of the beds. A flat seedbed is satisfactory for drilled seedings if it is clean and firm. Plantings should not be made in furrows unless they are very wide and shallow, as a heavy rain can cover the seedlings even after they are up to a stand.

Land which has been out of cultivation long enough to have a solid cover of annual and perennial 3-awn grasses is a problem. Land of this type should be conditioned for one or two years with sorghum crops in rows to eliminate the 3-awn and get them in shape for grass seeding. In this case about all that can be expected is to establish a seed source. The length of time necessary for establishment of a stand of grass will be much longer than where a good seedbed is prepared.

Past experience in this part of the country has shown that land preparation in every instance was superior to no land preparation—seedings on land prepared had three or four times the volume growth and seemed to be better stands. This deduction is based on checks within the same fields and included conditions where both annual and perennial vegetation were present.

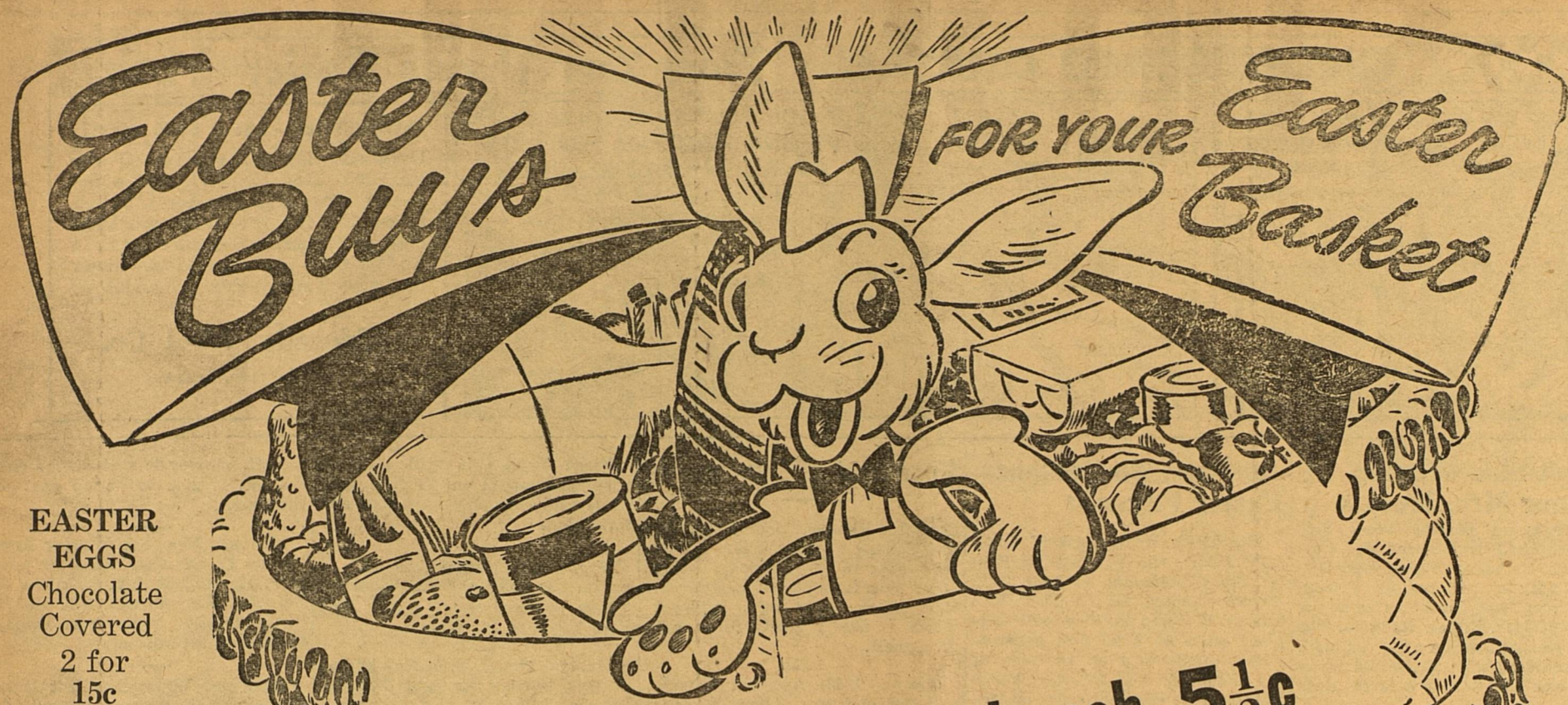

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

**Apricot Sweet Rolls**  
1 tablespoon butter    1/4 cup water  
1/2 cup brown sugar    1 cup sweetened  
1 1/2 cups biscuit mix    apricots, cooked  
1/4 cup Pet Milk        or canned

In 8-in. round cake pan melt butter over very low heat. Remove from heat; sprinkle brown sugar over bottom of pan. Put mix into bowl. Stir in with fork a mixture of milk and water. Turn out on lightly floured board. Knead 8 to 10 times. Roll into 8-in. square. Cover with well-drained apricots. Roll up like jelly roll. Cut into inch slices. Put on sugar in pan. Bake in moderately hot oven (400) 30 min., or until brown. Turn out while hot. Serve warm or cold. Makes 8.
