A 7.100-foot Ellenburger wildcat and an east stepout to production in the Hulldale-Strawn field have been staked in Schleicher county for immediate drilling.

C. L. Norsworthy, Jr., No. 1 Ethel Williams will be drilled as the wildcat, 660 feet from south and west lines of section 77, block M, GH&SA survey.

That makes it 18 miles northeast of Eldorado and two and one-quar-North lower Canyon field.

The Ohio Oil Company will drill the Hulldale-Strawn stepout as its No. 5 Thomson. It is slated to go to 6,000 feet, 467 feet from south and 2,139 feet from west lines of section 81, block TT, TC survey. That makes it one-half mile east of the discovery well.

They were using ropes to get out, after going through the cave, when Officials Receive a loose rock hit Harold. In the ensuing excitement the boys pulled him out, but Conner slid back into the cave.

Rutland took the car and drove alone to Eldorado for another rope, expecting to go out and join the others in getting Conner out. He must have presented a gruesome appearance in town—the upshot of the whole thing was that he went to the doctor's office and the fire

department went out to Whitten's. Meanwhile the boys had gotten Conner out, and the three met the fire truck when they started to town.

It was thought that Harold's heavy cap may have saved him from erious injury. He had heard the rock coming, had put up his hands. injuring his thumbs—but his head took most of the weight of the rock. Six stitches closed the wound and he was taken last night to his home, as he could not be accommodated overnight at the crowded hospital at that time.



Valuations Upped

Coke county's taxable valuation for 1951 will be nearly 15 million, an increase of 21/2 million over last year.

This information was presented to the Commissioners Court here Monday by Frank Eudy, representative of Thos. Y. Pickett & Co. evaluation engineers of Ft. Worth. The firm is hired to handle oil and utility assessments for the county on a percentage basis.

Mr. Eudy's early estimate shows an increase of \$2,400,000 on oil properties in the county, due to the completion of 53 new wells during the past year. Coke's total taxing valuation was \$12,358,940 in 1950. -Robert Lee Observer.

Improvement Election

Sutton County voters will go to the polls Saturday to decide whether \$15,000 shall be spent for right-of-way to straighten out part of U.S. 290 in the Roosevelt area, whether the county shall levy a part of the ad valorem tax which the state is dropping this year.

Two propositions are to be voted on Saturday. One is for \$15,000 bond money to enable the county to fence a stretch of right-of-way to straighten part of Highway 290, and the other is to determine whether the county shall take up 30c of ad valorem tax which the state will drop this year. - Devil's River







If freight and travel volume serve as a barometer of the expansion of our economy, Dr. Walter W. M. From 1939 to 1949 the ton miles of freight moved in this country jumped from 527 billion tons to 870 billion. In trucks alone it skyrocketed from 44 to 94 bilion.
