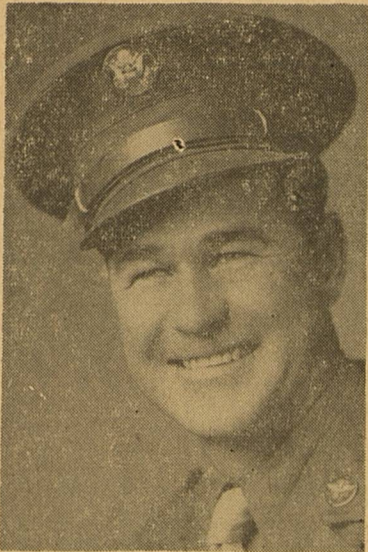

He was killed Sept. 26, in Korea, where he went into action with the First Marines. He is a candidate for the Silver Star, which will probably be given to the family.

He lived at Hobbs, New Mexico, four years before his induction into service, and attended college there, playing football with the college squad. He had been in service over a year when he was killed.

He is survived by his parents, and a small brother, Jim, who is less than a year old.

It is not known at this time whether funeral services and burial will be here or in Hobbs.

SPECIAL CALL MEETING

Emergency Ordinance

Be it remembered that there came and was held a special meeting of the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, on this the second day of January A. D. 1952 at the regular meeting place with members present to-wit—

J. C. Ratliff, Mayor, A. J. Atkins, City Secretary; W. M. Patterson, Jr., Gus Love, S. M. Oglesby Jr., Aldermen; and among other business transacted, an Emergency Ordinance was passed, to-wit

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, that an emergency has arisen, concerning the report of rabies within the bounds of Schleicher County, and the City of Eldorado,

We the City Council, of the City of Eldorado, Texas, deem it necessary to pass an ordinance regulating the vaccination of all dogs, against rabies, that are within the city limits, of the City of Eldorado, Texas.

Motion by W. M. Patterson Jr., seconded by Gus Love, aldermen, to pass an ordinance, prohibiting any dogs to run loose within the City limits, that have not been vaccinated, against rabies, and any person or persons, found guilty of violating any provision of this Ordinance, shall be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5) nor more than Fifty Dollars (\$50), and each and every day continuance of any provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense. Motion passed.

Emergency — This ordinance will take precedence over any existing ordinance, and will become effective five days after its passage.

After this limited time all dogs will be put in pound and held for three days, and if not called for and vaccinated against rabies, then dog will be disposed of.



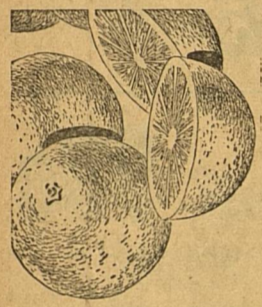

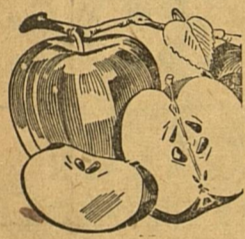
