Junior Woman's Club Opens 1951-52 Year At Thursday Meeting

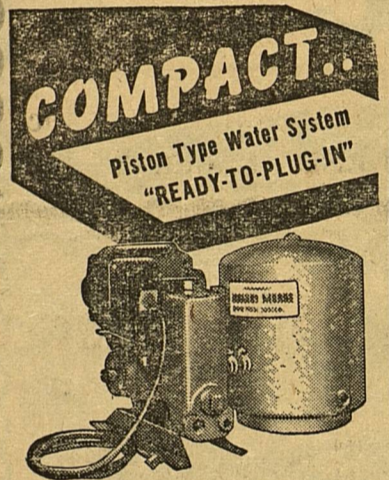
