

The CARE packages which have been prepared for Korean relief include woolen blankets, cotton textiles, food, woolen suiting, underwear, knitting wool. All contributions will be pooled to provide a complete package. Deliveries will be arranged by CARE to orphanages, refugee camps and other relief centers, on the basis of greatest need.

Mrs. Tisdale explains the needs

of the Koreans thus: The "casualty" tally for South Korea's civilians runs likes this: Estimated population, 21 million Homeless refugees, 5 million Additional war victims, 1 million Actual sufferers, every single erson in Korea.

That summation, cited by CARE epresentatives who surveyed conditions in the war-devastated country, was released by the General

Federation of Women's Clubs to illustrate the magnitude of the relief needs. The Federation, through its local Women's Clubs in every part of the United States, is currently conducting a Thanksgivingseason campaign for funds to send CARE packages of food and tex-

tiles to Korean war victims. Bleak as are conditions now, according to the CARE survey, the need for food, clothing and other supplies will grow even more cri-tical during the coming year, because of the cumulative effects of malnutrition, the complete loss of personal possessions, the depletion of previous supply stockpiles and the soaring inflation which sees wages lagging far behind prices of available goods.

Future crop yields, the CARE report explained, will be seriously affected by past recruitment of farm labor into the armed forces; by the tremendous loss of draft animals, and by shortages of fertilizer and seed rice. Sea food, on which Koreans ordinarily depend a great deal to supplement their diet, will also be scarce; fishing boats have been wrecked, commandeered or worn out, and there is a great lack of material for nets and other fishing gear. Decrease in normal food production means that South Korea will need 115,000 tons of food products in 1952, according to conservative estimates by responsible officials.

Clothing will be even scarcer than food, the report predicts, since the bulk of the output of South Korea's cotton and woolen mills in the past year was diverted for use of the Korean armed forces. Normally, the Korean population requires two yards of fabric per
