TWO EMPLOYED ON FACULTY FOR COMING YEAR

Jack Black athletic director and coach at Big Lake, has accepted the position as high school principal, and will be a new member of the Eldorado High School faculty for the coming year.

Mr. Black's family consists of a wife, a daughter in the upper elementary grades, and a son who is under school age. The new principal has rented the Gus Graves house, vacated by the Coulters, and will move there probably next week.

He has had ten years of experience as principal and coach. He has a Master's from Sul Ross in administrative education, and comes to Eldorado with the highest of recommendations. He succeeds Gordon Griggs, who has joined the Lake View faculty.

Mrs. Nancy Thompson, wife of "Bubba" Thompson, has been employed to teach sixth grade. She taught last year at Wolforth. She has her degree and comes to Eldorado well recommended.

All except two or three vacancies in the faculty have been filled, and it is hoped that contracts for these can be mailed out at an early date. The next regular meeting of the school board will be August 14.

To Coaching School

Coach Ted Kirby, and the assistant Coach John Waldrum will leave Sunday for Austin, where they will attend coaching school from Monday, July 31 to Friday, August 4. Mr. Kirby, who is attending school at Sul Ross, will start his third year as coach in Eldorado, and Mr. Waldrum, employed early this summer as assistant coach, is starting his first year here.

George Long Starts Construction Work On New Building

George Long, who retired from the business district a few years ago, has started construction of a new 30x70 foot business building, which he will use for a mercantile business. It is located on the site of the old McWhorter building.

Workmen started digging for the foundation early this week. Camron & Williams of San Angelo are the contractors in charge of construction. It is estimated that from now until completion about two and a half months of time will be required, or possibly more if weather is unfavorable.

The building will be of tile, with stucco for the outside finish. It will have concrete floors, and plastered inside walls.

Agreement Reached On Right-of-Way On West Highway

A condemnation suit voted by the Commissioners Court Monday against Henry Speck, was withdrawn yesterday when the Court came to an agreement with Mr. Speck for right-of-way across six sections of his pasture land—thus clearing up all right-of-way obstacles on the new highway west thru this county.

The understanding reached yesterday includes an agreement regarding material (caliche) on the Speck ranch for use of the highway engineers.

The Commissioners Court is making every effort to have the plans and legal work completed in order that contract for construction of the remaining 14 miles may be let in Austin in September. If all goes well and weather conditions are favorable, it is possible that the new highway may be completed this year.

A bond issue will soon be submitted to Schleicher voters to provide funds for the county's part in securing right-of-way, building new fences and digging wells. Fencing materials have already been bought and are on hand.

CRAIG WINNER, MEADOR LOSES BY FIVE VOTES

What is thought to be the second largest vote in Schleicher County's history went on record this week. The official count for Saturday voting is 959, as compared with 967 in an election years ago.

The county Democratic committee met Tuesday morning and made their official count at 959.

One of the largest crowds ever seen in Eldorado gathered here Saturday to vote, and on Saturday night to get the official score. Cars were parked for blocks in and near the business district, and crowds thronged the streets until about midnight, when the final figures on the Judge's race were posted.

C. L. Meador, candidate for reelection as County Judge, lost by a few votes to E. W. Craig. Only five votes separated the two, the totals being 470 and 475.

H. T. Finley retained his place as County and District Clerk, winning over W. A. Schuller by a 2½ to 1 majority.

A. J. Halbert is new commissioner of Precinct No. 1, having received more votes than did Robert Nixon and Henry Speck together.

For the first time in a number of years the county will enjoy the luxury of having a run-off race, but this will be confined only to the voters in Commissioners precinct No. 4, where L. Moore and H. A. Belk turned out to be the two high men out of three—T. C. Meador being dropped as a third candidate in this race.

In Comparison

Schleicher County voted about as other counties did on the Governors race, casting 718 votes for Shivers and a total of 131 for the other candidates in the race. Shivers is re-elected for his own term without a runoff.

According to reports from the election bureau it appears that Pierce Brooks and Ben Ramsey will go into the run-off for lieutenant governor. Schleicher county gave Brooks a plurality of 287 votes, and cast 209 votes for Ramsey, who ran second in Schleicher.

For Agriculture Commissioner, Texas as a whole gave J. E. McDonald a good vote, but he must go into the run-off against John C. White. Schleicher county gave McDonald 456 votes.

Schleicher reversed the state's outcome on the race for judge of the court of Criminal Appeals. Robert Lattimore, high man, was second in Schleicher with 197 votes and W. A. Morrison, second state winner, received 290 in Schleicher. For Associate Justice of Supreme Court, Schleicher voted like this:



Magazine Publicizes Willoughby's Sheep

Under the caption, "World's Largest Sheep Ranch Founded on Leased Land," the Farmer Stockman has published the following story on Ray Willoughby, who got his start in Schleicher County:

THIS IS THE STORY of the world's biggest sheep rancher, Ray Willoughby of San Angelo, Texas. Willoughby began his ranching

career in 1917 near Eldorado, Tex., with 700 ewes he had borrowed money to buy. Fresh out of the University of Texas, he had studied business administration and law. This coupled with the fact Willoughby had grown up on a ranch in McCullough county enabled him to eventually pyramid his holdings. These ewes on 6,000 acres of land he had under lease worked into the gigantic ranching operation that now covers ranch land in 12 Texas counties.

His holdings exceed 200,000 acres and on which he ran, prior to the war, about 108,000 sheep. From these he clipped about a million pounds of wool a year. Willoughby recently purchased a 47,000-acre ranch, 40 miles south of Marathon. He retains the original Eldorado ranch, has another 40,000 acres south of Alpine, and some 130,000 acres in Culberson, Jeff Davis and Hudspeth counties. Despite his duties overseeing thousands of sheep and square miles of land, Willoughby is a bank director, active in San Angelo civic work, and probably holds more offices in the sheep and cattle business generally than any other Texan.

He recently made cattle history when he was elected president of the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association at their annual meeting in San Antonio. This is the first time that this sort of thing has happened since the inception of the Cattle Raisers' 108 years ago. Willoughby has also served as 18th president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association.

Willoughby grew up in a country that boasted of trying to run the sheep man out. But his personality and his love for both sheep and cattle has earned him the respect of both cattle and sheep men.

Today, Willoughby runs fewer sheep due to the drought in many sections of the West and high

prices during the war. Along with sheep he runs about 500 cows and 1,500 steers. He has seen wool prices range from 6½ cents to as high as 70 cents per pound, and declares that a ranchman just has to "keep hanging on and hope for the best."

Willoughby can and does twirl a rope with the best of his cowhands. When he is not in Washington or Denver or Chicago at a sheep or cattle huddle, you can find him on one of his ranches chatting with the hands or checking his sheep. His helpfulness to the sheep and cattle men makes him a Texas symbol.

When Willoughby was 14 years of age he called for a shave in a barbershop and got it with the back part of the razor at a cost of 10 cents. He has gone a long way from 700 ewes and a 10 cent shave.
