BUSINESS DEAL INVOLVES 3 LOCAL MERCHANTS


A series of changes is in the making, in the business block north of the Hoover Drug.

Bob McWhorter has sold his variety store, known as City Variety, to J. L. Ratliff. The store will continue under its present management the remainder of this week, but will remain closed Monday, when inventorying will start. After the inventory the deal will be offi-cially closed, and Mr. Ratliff will be in charge as new proprietor.

Mr. Ratliff has been one of the city's long-time merchants. He spent a few years in Ozona, then early this year returned to Eldorado to open a furniture store in this city, in the former West Texas Cafe location. He has been operating this business since that time.

Present plans, as announced by Ratliff and his son Jack Ratliff, are these: Jack will go ahead with his previously announced plan to move his insurance office into larger and more modern quarters in the present Wheeler grocery location. This building, and the adjoining one, occupied by the furniture store, both owned by the Ratliffs, will be completely renovated to accommodate the insurance and furniture business, with hardware as an added line.

A major renovating project will carried out in the modernizing of this building. The interior will be completely repaired and renovated and the front recessed windows will be removed and a modern front will be put in. Work will start as soon as Wheeler Grocery gives possession, which is expected to be in a week or two.





Mittel ranches, 13 miles north of Eldorado, have shown considerable improvement during this year's This Air-Minded Age! past and present growing seasons. Range conservationists of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District in checking vegetation on deferred ranges with Henry and Perry Mittel this week found that a big change is taking place. The range now has a good cover of grass and dead litter over most parts which will hold the rain drops where they fall and add organic matter to the soil. Side oats grama, little bluestem, big bluestem, Indian grass, green sprangleton, and hairy grama made up a big percentage of the composition of the rangeland. All grasses were making an abundant seed crop, and an increase in these kinds of grasses can be expected in the future.

Looking over Forrest Runge's Trickham pasture with him this week Range Conservationists saw 'ranching going to seed." This is a half section pasture made up of ordinary upland and very shallow upland soils. Rangeland of this type is considered to be of low productivity, but this wasn't the case in this particular pasture.
