Firemen Entertain Hill Country Assn.

The Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department will be hosts to the Hill Country Firemen's Association Tuesday, August 8, in Eldorado.

An interesting program has been worked out for the day's entertainment. An opener will be the parade at 8:30 starting at the Memorial building in Eldorado, followed by registration. The business session will occupy most of the morning. A memorial service will be held at 1:30. A high light in the day's events will be an address by W. G. Burns, city fire marshal of Dallas. Much in demand as a speaker, Mr. Burns has a national reputation as an interesting lecturer and speaker, and the general public is urged to be present if it is at all possible.

The races will take place in mid-afternoon, in the block between the bank and the Red and White. The various departments will take part in the races, and included with the afternoon's races will be water polo in which women will participate.

All firemen and their families will be served a barbecue supper, with the city, Lions and ex-firemen furnishing the food.

A dance for firemen and their families, and the general public will climax the day's entertainment. The dance will start at 9:00 p. m., with Ike Verfurth of San Angelo, furnishing the music with his six-piece orchestra. The dance will be held in the Community building. Ray Hudgens is in charge of arrangements.

Headquarters for the day's events will be the Memorial building, beginning with registration in the morning and concluding with the dance that night.

Delegates are expected from Ballinger, Bangs, Brady, Coleman, Eder, Felvin, Junction, Mason, Miles, Ozona, San Angelo, Santa Anna, Sonora, Winters, and the hostess city.

Roping Club Adds Mule To Weekly Show

Many out-of-town ropers were present to participate in Sunday's roping in the local arena. A new and thrilling event was exhibition mule riding by Rooster Martin Jackson and Whiskey Mund on Roy Andrew's "Tornado Mule."

Out-of-town ropers participating in the day's events included: Crawford Mitchell and Dub Glenn of Rocksprings; Herb and Homer Wood, Mertzon; Bill Doran, Jack Doran and Warty Allen, Sonora; Jim Aransas, San Angelo; Bill Martin, San Saba; Preston Honeycutt, Snyder; John Ed Roger and Jim H. Richardson, Ft. Terrett; John and James Burrus, Hamilton; Bing Crosby and Jimmie Weddle, Christoval.

There were 24 ropers in the first jackpot roping, with Sam Henderson of Eldorado tying the fastest calf in a time of 11.4 seconds. John Rae Powell of Eldorado was second with 12.1, and James Burrus was third with 12.5.

Many witnessed the best matched calf roping which has ever occurred in the local arena between two fast cowboys: Herbert Woods, Mertzon, and John Burrus, Hamilton. They each roped and tied 6 calves with John Burrus winning by a small margin of 7.4 seconds and a total time of 115.4 compared with Herb Woods' 123.0.

The Burrus Brothers matched loops with John E. Rogers and Bing Crosby and also won this match by a smaller margin of 2.3 seconds. James' and John's total time on 8 calves was 138.4, while John Ed and Bing took 140.7.

A non-winner jack pot was staged to wind up the show. John Ed Roger won this with a time of 16.4. James Alexander placed 2nd with 22.0, and Bill Martin, third with 17.5.

The local boys will begin next week with practice roping on Wednesday and will stage their weekly shows on Saturday instead of Sunday as the Sonora Club plans to stage shows on Saturday night and Sunday.

Lighting of the local arena which has been planned for several weeks, will get under way some time this week.

R. E. A. BEGINNINGS HALTED BY PEARL HARBOR, WAR

According to REA applicants in this county, the disaster which occurred at Pearl Harbor halted all negotiations for the building of REA lines. Applicants had just received official approval for an REA loan when the disaster struck and the whole procedure had to be repeated in 1944.

The Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op was organized and chartered in June, 1941, by E. C. Hill, P. K. McIntosh, F. B. Gunn, T. W. Johnson, W. R. Bearce, E. B. Willoughby and J. Forrest Runge. These men and others contacted in person all potential REA users in the county and pulled the strings necessary to get REA official approval of a loan. As soon as the okay was received, the Pearl Harbor disaster stopped negotiations.

It was not until 1944 that the loan could be made, following signing up of members again, and acceptance again of their applications for a loan. The office was set up and a manager secured in January 1945.

Construction of the first lines was particularly difficult, since war shortages hampered the buying of supplies. Taylor Construction Co., of Taylor, Texas, was awarded the contract in February, 1945, to build 246 miles of line and the first lines were energized on January 5, 1946.

Old Will Davis Road Now Being Surfaced

Commissioners of Precincts No. 1 and 4 are completing the last lap of a bus route in Schleicher Co. The stretch of road which is receiving a coat of caliche is known as the old Will Davis road, five or six miles in length, in Precincts 1 and 4.

With the completing of this stretch of bus route, which will be in two or three weeks, weather permitting, all roads used by the Eldorado busses are surfaced for use of school children when school opens next month.

From this office Manager McCormick directs the affairs of the Co-Op, issuing orders to the men who maintain lines and carry out

Jerry Pennington, West Texas Utilities manager, whose company supplies current for the REA, threw the switch which energized the first line. Ernest Hill received the first current, L. T. Wilson the second, Jack Ratliff the third, and P. K. McIntosh the fourth.

The shortage of wire and poles continued for some time, but new members were added steadily nevertheless. By August 1, 1946, 188 miles of line had been energized; in August 1947, 262 miles had been energized; in August, 1948, 346.6 miles had been put in operation, and today there are 454 miles of line. These reach into all adjoining counties and have subscribers from the following towns: Mertzon, Menard, Ozona, Sonora, Ft. McKavett, Christoval, and San Angelo as well as Eldorado.

The work still continues, contracts having been let only last week for 189 miles of REA line, including 80 miles in northwest Menard, 26 in South Sutton and 83 in east Crockett. This proves that the extension of REA lines is an endless process and that more and more people away from town are receiving electricity through these lines. The convenience of dependable electricity is becoming an indispensable part of modern rural life.

Schleicher, Sutton Wildcats Drilling

Three wildcats in which Schleicher County residents are interested are drilling ahead this week. Plymouth No. 1 A. B. Thomerson Estate, Wednesday had reached a depth of about 1770 feet. Location is in the northeast corner of Sec. 66, block H, GH&SA RR Co. (Locality, Toenail Trail).

Surface hole is going down on the Delta Gulf et al H. F. Thomson Estate, in Survey 71, block TT. This well is southeast of Huldale. Surface hole is being drilled on Clarence I. Norsworthy Jr., and Lone Star No. 1 R. M. Thomson Estate wildcat, in survey 67 in Sutton County. Part of the survey lies in Schleicher County.

Schleicher Exceeds Its Bond Quota, Subscribes \$14,962.50

Schleicher County was one of 103 counties in Texas that exceeded their quotas in the recent Independence Savings Bonds Drive, Judge C. L. Meador, Jr., county Savings Bonds chairman, announced this week after receiving final sales figures from Nathan Adams of Dallas, state chairman.

Sales in this county were \$14,962.50, or 154.25 per cent of the \$9,700.00 quota.

The Independence Drive was held May 15-July 4, with sales through July 17 being counted toward the quota.

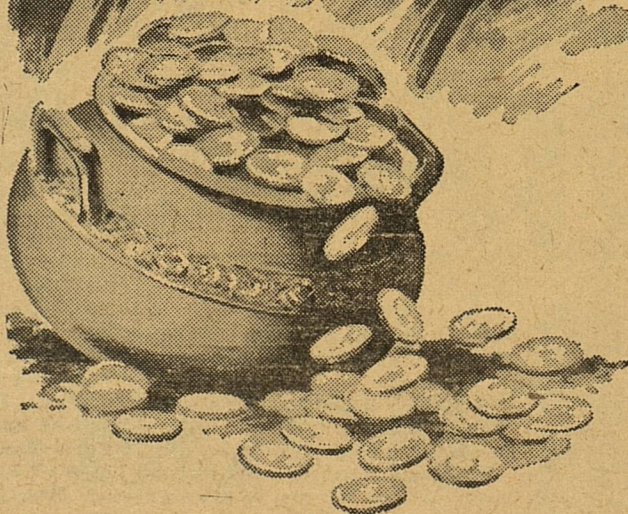

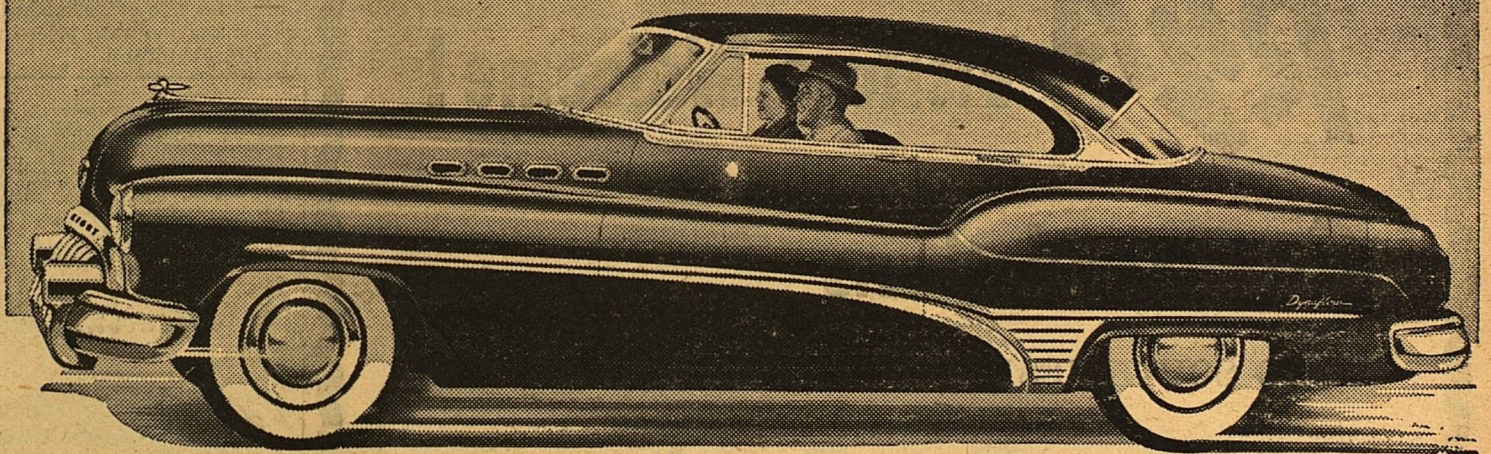

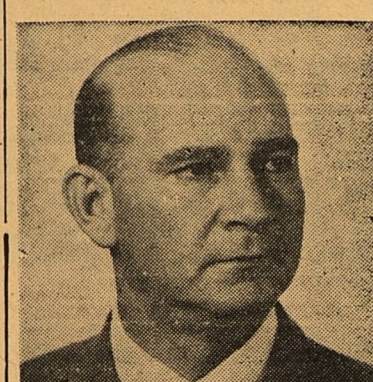

Road Contract Let

Contracts were awarded last week for topping the second 20-mile section on State Highway 118—Alpine to Big Bend park road—and for building bridges across Calamity and Sheep creeks on the same highway.

C. Hunter Strain of San Angelo will be the successful bidder on the topping job with work to be started next week and completed in a short time.

Work is under way on the third 20-mile section of Highway 118. O. D. Burselson of Alpine is the contractor for this job which calls for grading, drainage structures and topping.

It is expected that this 60 miles will all be completed by the end of the year. The first 20 miles has been completed for some time and the second 20-mile section is ready for topping.

It is also expected that a survey of the remainder of the route to the park boundary will be started in the fall.—Alpine Avalanche.

Bond Issues Lose

The hospital issue with a total of 943 votes came the nearest to winning the majority required with 421 votes for the hospital and 522 ballots against the project. This fell 51 votes short of enough to put the hospital over the majority mark.

The park bond issue received a total of 909 ballots of which 359 were for the issue and 550 votes were cast against the issue. Another 97 votes were needed for the issue to gain a majority.

Only precinct giving a majority in either of the bond issues was the precinct number one (Menard) vote given to the hospital which registered a 309-285 vote in favor of issuing hospital bonds.—Menard News.

San Angelo City Detective Roy Jackson said the body appeared to have been dragged about 76 feet along the highway. He suffered a hole in the back of his head, crushed chest, and mutilated shoulder.—Robert Lee Observer.

Fire Dept. Inspected

Henry Timmerman, assistant engineer with the State Fire Insurance Division in Austin, was in Ozona this week to make the long awaited inspection of Ozona's fire protection facilities with a view to making a downward adjustment in the city's fire insurance key rate as justified by the improved fire fighting facilities.—Ozona Stockman.

Col. Black Featured In July Magazine

Colonel Wm. L. Black of Fort McKavett was such a prominent figure in the wool and mohair industry of this country that his versatile and adventuresome life is often relived when old timers get together, or when the history of the sheep and goat industry is reviewed. The July issue of the Sheep and Goat Raiser features the Colonel who was a man of many firsts.

He is said to have built the first rock tank in Schleicher county and the first water wheel in West Texas, which he used for power when he dammed up the San Saba River in 1892 and built the first commercial cannery, tannery and rendering plants in the state. He was a cardinal worker in breaking down the prejudice against goat meat, beginning his campaign by canning 5,000 Angoras. Col. Black wrote the first book on the Angora Goat industry ever published in the United States and even today the book, "A New Industry," is respected as an ultimate authority.

Colonel Black worked diligently for a wool futures market similar to the cotton exchange, and a week after his death the future trading in wools began. His contributions to the ranching industry of this country are lasting, although many of his ideas failed because he was a man far in advance of his times. He died in 1931.

TROUBLE CALLS ON REA ARE FROM MIXED AND VARIED LIST OF CAUSES: RANGE FROM LIGHTNING TO BIRDS

REA employees report that trouble shooting for the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op has its surprises.

Study of a record of trouble calls answered this year reveals the fact that the causes are varied, ranging from lightning to sparrows!

Here is the list for this year, as it has been kept "for the record" by Mgr. Don McCormick:

Feb; Construction Co. ran derrick crane into 3 phase line at stock pens knocking out all 70 amp fuses at sub-station.

April: Cooper Gas Co. employees ran pole derrick into line No. 1 and kicked breaker at stock pens.

May 10: Lightning broke pole top insulator on McFall tap on line 4, kicking breaker at line 4 take-off.

May 17: Lightning hit line 10 extension burning ground wire in two on 28 amp sectionalizer and burning primary fuse in 7½ KVA at Two-Bits Meador's ranch.

May 31: Lightning hit rural line of W. T. Utilities Co., at Sonora, knocking out one REA phase also W. W. West tap, but no damage on either line. Lightning hit and broke pole tap insulator on Ed Willoughby tap knocking out all of line 8. Willoughby tap off 16 hours. Lightning broke pole tap insulator on line 11 in McIntosh pasture, knocking out all of this line.

June 2: Call from Virgil Cauthorn saying his was off and upon arrival found lightning had kicked 20 amp sectionalizer May 31. No damage to line. Mexicans did not know what to do to get service restored.

June 3: A. B. White reported no electricity and upon examination found lightning burned out transformer on May 31. Mr. White gone for two days reason for delay in outage.

June 6: Lightning broke insulator on Dove Creek line kicking sectionalizer at end of lane. Service restored in 3 hours, after fault detected.

June 22: Bledsoe and Hensel Matthews were laying pipe in ditch under single phase tap and in reversing ends got pipe into phase wire, kicking out line 8 extension. No one hurt. Service restored in 20 minutes after outage reported.

July 13: Line 5 tap 15 out north of Lavell Meckel's. Lightning broke insulator on Henry Mittel tap, about 2:30 a. m. Reported 7:45 a. m. Cleared 8:30 a. m.

July 21: Fuse on 'B' phase was blown at sub station. Reported at 1:00 p. m. Cleared at 1:25 p. m.

July 22: Thad Thomson tap on line 8 off at 2:00 p. m. Reported at 4:00 p. m. Cleared at 4:20 p. m. Sparrow kicked out sectionalizer by causing short circuit on tap side. First outage to be caused by sparrow.

Stiffen Broom

To stiffen your broom dip it in a pail of boiling soda solution and dry it in the sun.

Sharpen Tools

To save the gardener's back and make old tools work easily, sharpen them and keep them sharp all season. For general sharpening, have an 8 or 10 inch file, a whetstone, and possibly an emery wheel. The most useful whetstone is made of carborundum with one side fine and one coarse. When sharpening a blade, push it one way only, and stroke the full length of the stone. After each using, dirt should be cleaned off tools to make them work better and last longer.



RECIPE OF THE WEEK
By Mary Lee Taylor

Fruit Icebox Dessert

Broadcast: August 5, 1950

1/4 cup powdered sugar	1/2 cup ice cold Pet Milk
1/4 cup soft butter	4 teaspoons granulated sugar
1/2 cup Pet Milk	2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 cups graham crackers, broken in 1/2-in. pieces	1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 cup canned crushed pineapple,* well drained	

Mix powdered sugar and butter in a 1 1/2-qt. bowl. Stir in 1/2 cup milk, a tablespoon at a time. Be sure all milk is mixed in before adding more. Fold in half of graham crackers at a time, being careful not to crush the pieces of crackers. Drop in 4 portions on a flat pan. Top with the pineapple. Chill until firm, or about 2 hours. When ready to serve, put ice cold milk and granulated sugar into small, cold bowl. Whip with chilled rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until fluffy. Add lemon juice and rind; whip until stiff. Serve on the dessert. Makes 4 servings.

*Fruit cocktail, peaches, or apricot halves also can be used.
