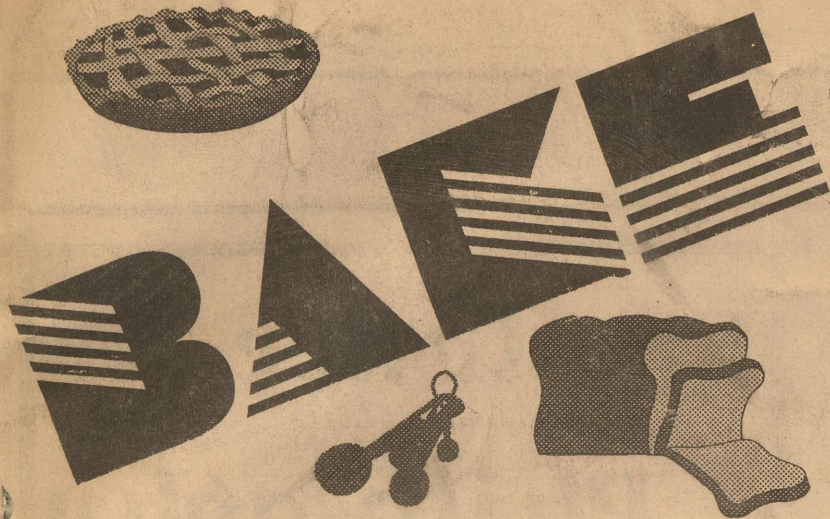
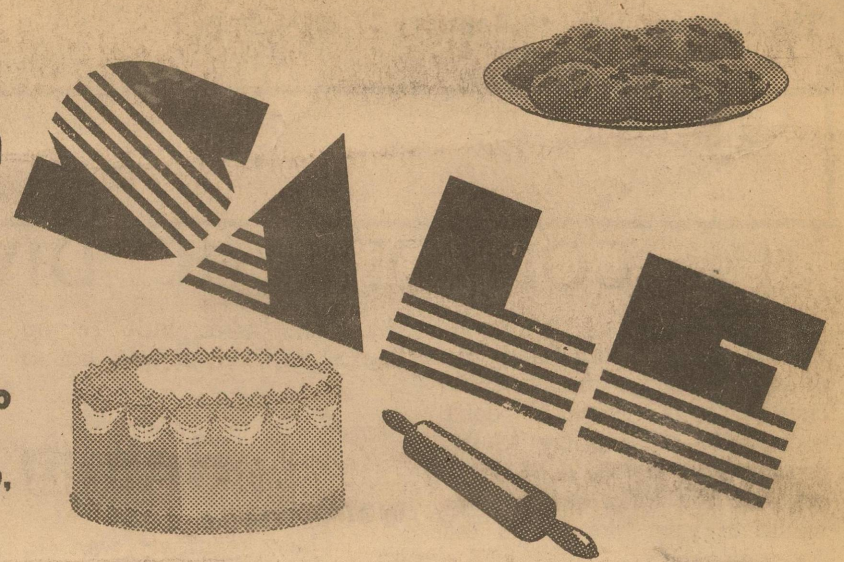

Our school district oversees multi-million dollar budgets providing education for over 3.5 million students in pre-kindergarten through grade 12 of 6,184 school campuses statewide, staffed by 219,338 teachers; 10,601 campus administrators; 3,991 central administrators; 27,491 professional support; 36,717 educational aides; and 121,446 auxiliary staff for a total work force of 419,590. In these difficult times, school board members are called upon to make tough decisions. February has been declared SCHOOL BOARD RECOGNITION MONTH in Texas, a time for educators and citizens across the state to salute these unpaid volunteers who serve public education on behalf

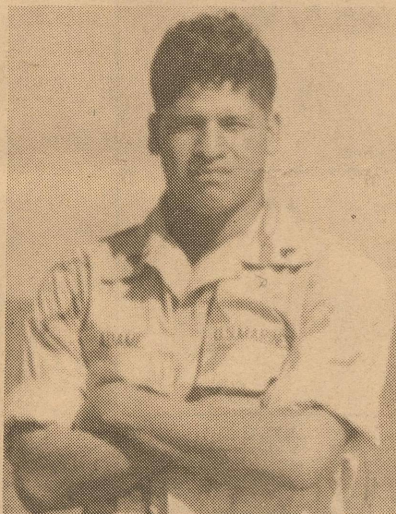
of their communities. It seems fitting that at least once a year we thank them for their time and dedication.

Adame Participating In Operation Restore Hope

Marine Corps Cpl. Richard Adame Jr., the 22-year-old son of Yolanda and Richard Adame of Eldorado, is participating in Operation Restore Hope in Somalia. Adame, a 1990 graduate of Eldorado High School, is

attached to the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit embarked on the amphibious transport dock ship, USS Denver.

The Marines, hitting the beach in amphibious landing craft, provided a secure environment for medical personnel to open a clinic and treat approximately 1,000 Somalis in four days. The sailors and Marines in Operation Restore Hope are key components of the Navy's "...from the sea" strategy, which emphasizes Navy and Marine Corps operations in littoral and regional areas in response to contingencies or crises. Naval expeditionary forces are now shaped for joint operations close to shore overseas and tailored for national needs at home.

Nearly half of the U.S. fleet is underway, either training or deployed overseas, at any given time.

Schleicher County Library Book Review

Walking Down The Wild, A Journey Through The Yellowstone Rockies is a fascinating blend of history and folklore, of travel and contemporary thought.

Gary Ferguson, a student of environmental science, an interpretive naturalist and a former employee of the U.S. Forest Service, is well suited for his 500 mile "hike" on foot through the Yellowstone Rockies.

Mr. Ferguson writes with poetic intensity of his love affair with this land and its creatures. He does not attempt to make light of the hardships of such a journey, he has his troubles with the cold, the heat, bugs, blisters, and above all, keeping an eye peeled for grizzlies.

However, one can see that Mr. Ferguson considers these only mild inconveniences. He speaks of rainfall cranes slipping out of the sky "like God's own airplanes," hawks "letting out long, raspy whistles that cut like sirens through the hot summer air" and of trading curious stares with a bull moose not ten feet away.

In explaining the many Topogra - placid oddities of this region, Mr. Ferguson recounts the old Indian legends. He tells the early Western folk tales believed names such as Dead Horse Pass, Wounded Man Creek and Demon's Cave. He relates the Indian stories of the sun and moon, the animals and describes the early use of various plants for healing. Interposed between takes of early wanderers are excerpts from one hundred and fifty year old journals of men such as Trapper Orbowe Russell, John James Audubon and General William Sherman. All of Mr. Ferguson's research has been coordinated by his wife, Jane,

who has done a masterful job of making this book flow.

Yet for all of Mr. Ferguson's interesting material and the beauty of his descriptions there is a dark side to his writing. He is deeply troubled by his belief that man has lost contact with the land. He feels that people have become too "instant" and want everything easily obtainable.

Mr. Ferguson recounts angrily how *People for the West!*, a corporate sponsored organization, and over two hundred and fifty other groups, loosely connected as the "wise use" movement, are pushing for viewing and oil exploration in and around all national parks. He speaks of Nevada Mines attempt to mine with-in too close a proximity to the headwaters of the Yellowstone River (a timely topic, see *People*, December 13, 1993, pages 65-66). He describes the profit and land development at any price movement by many of our corporations and politicians.

In the end, Mr. Ferguson leaves the future of this region in our hands, for us to decide. Do we want our rivers despoiled, the land stripped and the creatures who have lived there forever endangered? We must decide.

This book shows the greatest of emotions, from the roaring of the soul for the beauty of the land to the first shaking anger at man's intervention. This book is a must read for anyone who cares anything about our heritage.

Cover with waxed paper; cook at HIGH 15 to 18 minutes or until sauce bubbles and cheese melts (turn dish one-quarter turn halfway through cooking if cooking unevenly.) Makes 4 to 6 servings.

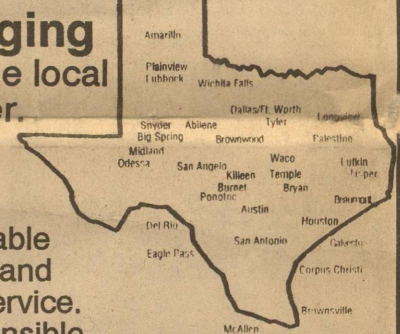

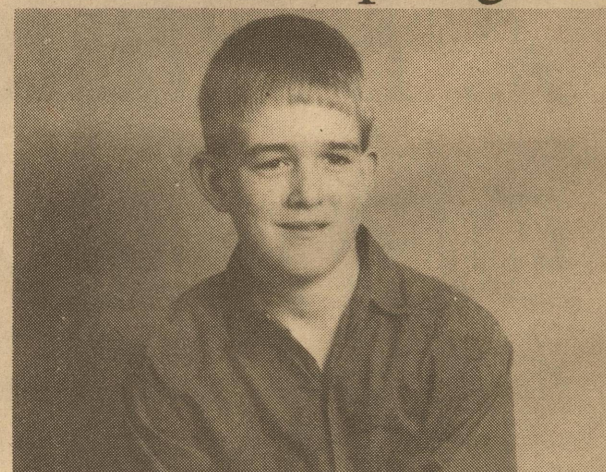
