Short Cotton Crop Estimated For US

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, in a harvest time report, estimated the cotton crop at 9,869,000 bales of 500 pounds weight.

This is 13,000 bales less than the 9,882,000 forecast a month ago. The indicated crop is far short of the government's goal of nearly 12,000,000 bales and is sharply below last year's 16,128,000 bales.

The crop also is short of the 1939-48 average of 11,599,000 bales. Because of the small size of the crop, Secretary of Agriculture Brannan has suspended acreage and marketing quotas for the 1951 crop and called for a production of at least 16,000,000 bales. Rigid government controls, poor weather and insects were factors contributing to this year's small crop.

The department estimated the acre yield this year at 257 pounds compared with 284 last year and a 10-year average of 261.3.

The condition of the crop as of Oct. 1 was reported at 64 percent of normal compared with 74 percent a year ago and 72 per cent for the

10-year Oct. 1 average.

In an accompanying report, the census bureau said that 2,770,392 running bales of 1950-crop cotton had been ginned prior to Oct. 1. This compared with 5,306,453 ginned to the same date last year and 5,305,456 to the same date two years ago.

The condition of the crop, the indicated yield per acre and production, respectively, by states included:

Texas 67, 193 and 2,775,000; New Mexico, 88, 493 and 190,000.

The indicated production of American-Egyptian cotton was put at 62,300 bales compared with 4,000 last year and 27,800 for the 10-year average.



Selecting Turkeys For Thanksgiving

COLLEGE STATION—Although there may be some doubt about which Thursday in November to select for celebrating Thanksgiving this year, there should be no doubt about the quality of the bird you select for your Thanksgiving dinner.

Regardless of whether the holiday is celebrated on November 23 or 30, Thanksgiving is only a few

weeks off, and thousands of Texans will soon be selecting the turkeys that will be eaten later on that day. D. R. Barrett, assistant poultry marketing specialist for the Texas A&M College Extension Service, has a few pointers for the many people who will want to select live birds and do the dressing themselves or will be having it done at the local locker plant.

Barrett points out that the quality of the live turkey cannot be improved by any method of pro-

cessing. It is important that only live turkeys of the best quality be selected, since no higher quality meat can be expected on the table than was selected from the pen of live birds.

Flesh, finish, and the absence of pinfeathers are the important factors which Barrett advises considering when selecting quality turkeys. Well fleshed turkeys will have broad breasts that are well covered with meat. The thighs will be large and the drumsticks bulging.

Barrett says that some fat over the entire carcass is desirable. He says that the creaminess of the skin on all parts of the carcass indicates that the bird is well finished. Turkeys should also be free of pinfeathers. Pins cause difficulty in cleaning the bird and detract from the appearance of the carcass.

Keeping these points in mind when selecting the live bird will help bring a delicious, appetizing turkey to the Thanksgiving table.

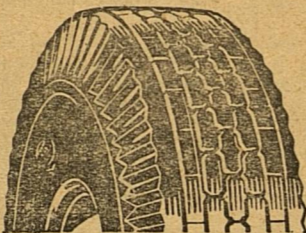
Woman's Club Studies United Nations Flag

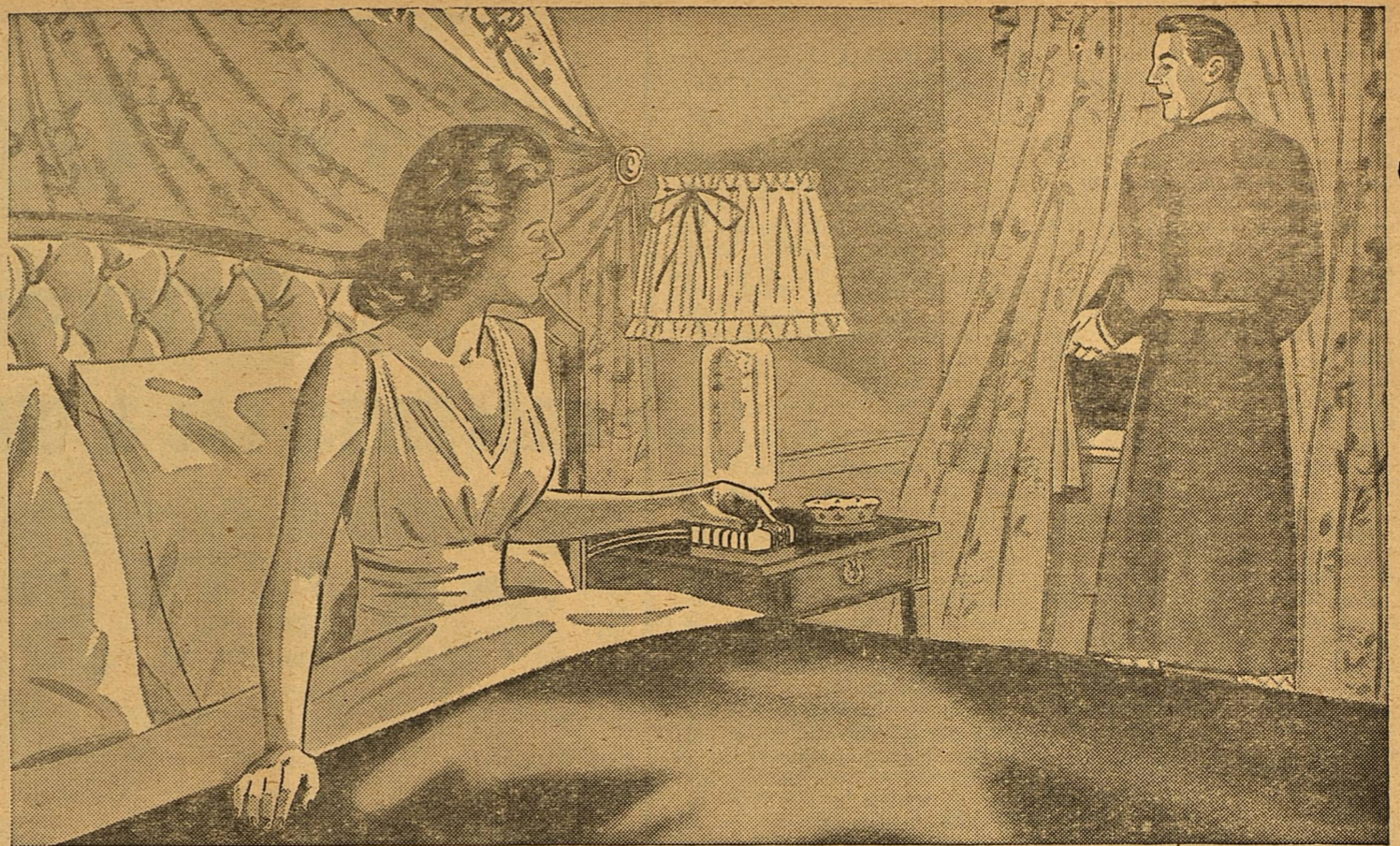

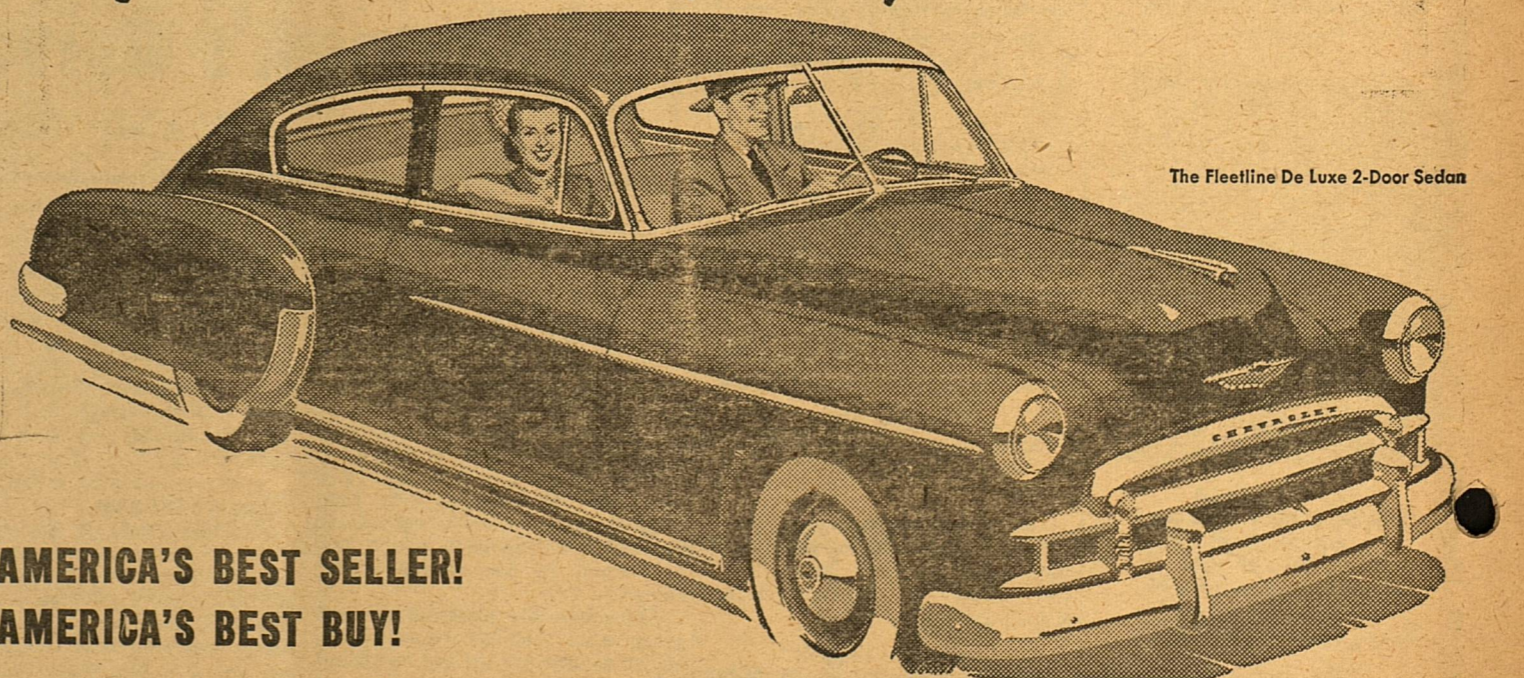

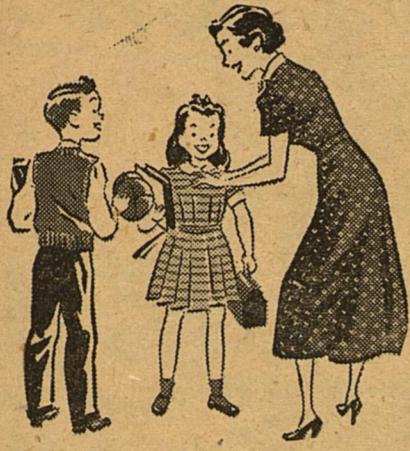

College Station. — Texas 4-H club members, more than 113,000 strong, will join with nearly 2,000,000 members in the nation to observe National 4-H Achievement Week, November 4-12.

Working towards their 1950 theme, "Better Living for a Better World," 4-H youth have been a busy group during the past year. They have produced and conserved food, worked to make their homes more comfortable and attractive, helped to supply the extra labor needed to produce crops and livestock and furnished "know how" for making their farms more efficient and productive. During National 4-H Achievement Week, they will report to the nation on just what they have done. The local volunteer 4-H leaders and the outstanding members will be recognized for the contributions they

have made to the welfare of their state and nation.

The officers of the 4-H clubs in Texas, their leaders and extension agents have made plans for achievement banquets, tours, achievement days and other special events for the week. Exhibits will be placed in show windows and 4-H members will tell service clubs, farm organizations, school assemblies and other groups about their work. The winners of state awards will be honored in many counties by their fellow members and leaders.

A glance at the accomplishments of 4-H members throughout the nation reveals that 16,000,000 quarts of food were preserved during the year; 100,000 acres were planted to gardens; they produced 9 billion birds in their poultry demonstrations; they own one million head of livestock and the list could be extended to cover just about every job in the home and on the

farm. They participated in many worthwhile activities such as farm safety, fire prevention, health work, soil conservation, wildlife conservation, tractor maintenance and a large group of others.

Their work is not limited however to producing and conserving the food and feed they produce for they devote much time to personal improvement programs. They participate in leadership training activities, citizenship work and group discussions that help them to better understand some of the important social and economic factors that are now at work in the world. They study and practice democratic procedures and are doing their part to develop the good neighbor spirit at home and abroad.

Texas 4-H members are extending an invitation to the public to join with them in their observance of National 4-H Achievement Week.

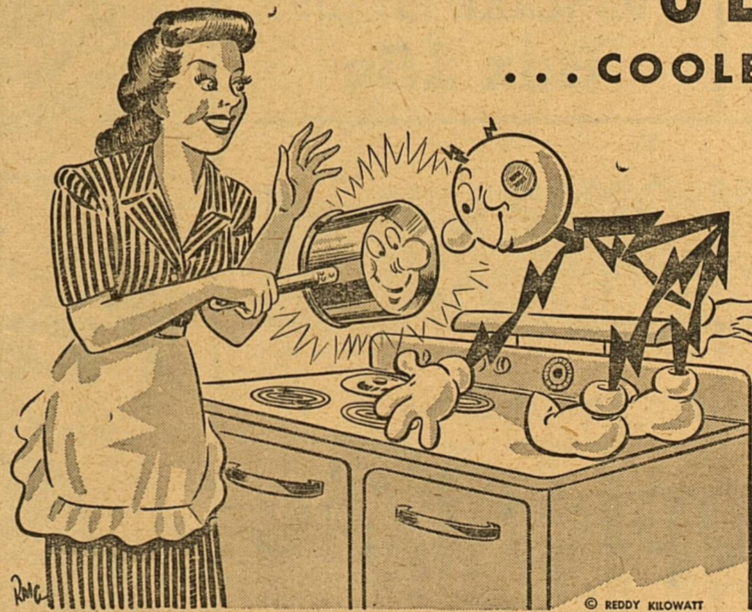

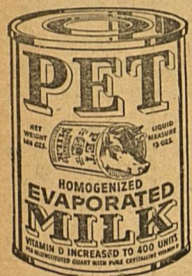
Baked Stuffed Sweet Potatoes

4 medium sweet potatoes (2 lbs.)
1 1/2 tablespoons molasses
3 tablespoons butter
few grains nutmeg
1/2 cup Pet Milk
4 marshmallows

Turn on oven; set at moderately hot (400°). Wash and grease potatoes. Bake 40 min., or until soft to the touch. Cut slice off top of each potato; scoop out centers and mash. Add molasses, butter, nutmeg, salt and milk; beat until light and fluffy. Pile into potato skins. Bake 10 min. longer; top with marshmallows. Bake 5 min., or until marshmallows are light brown. Makes 4 servings.

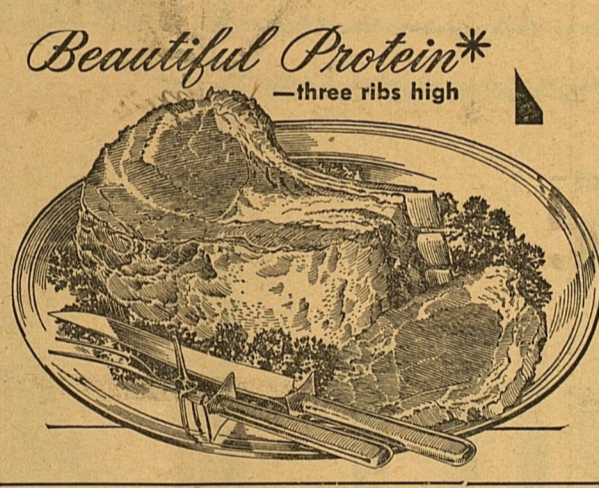
