

\$2,150 Guarantee Brings Game to Home Grounds on December 1st

The Marfa Shorthorns, champions of District 9-B and the Eldorado Eagles, champions of District 10-B will battle for Bi-District honors in a game to be held at Eldorado at 7:30 p.m., on Friday, December 1st.

Final arrangements for the game were made Monday when officials from Marfa and Eldorado met at McCamey and came to an agreement. Since both teams prefer to play on their home grounds, the conference Monday was in the nature of a bidding contest, and Eldorado received the game by offering the Shorthorns a guarantee of \$2,150 to come to this city.

This guarantee had been quickly underwritten Monday morning when a committee went out among local football fans and brought in over 100 checks for \$25 each.

Preparations for the game here on December 1st are being stepped up this week. Eldorado still has an unfinished grandstand, and plans are under way to borrow enough lumber to fill up the stand with seats.

A reserve seat section is to be provided and there will be an advance ticket sale. Regular admission for this game will be \$1.25, and reserve seat tickets will be \$2.00, including the federal tax.

What About Marfa?

Marfa clinched the championship of their district Friday night by defeating Sanderson 32 to 7. Previous to that they had downed Alpine 21 to 0.

Just how strong they are compared to the Eldorado Eagles remains to be seen. If the Eagles are in good form like they were here Friday against Junction they are going to be hard to beat. The Marfa Shorthorn line-up as published last week just before their Sanderson game, is as follows:

Junction Goes Down In Defeat In Hard-Fought Game Here Friday

The Junction Eagles, regarded before-hand as the strongest team in District 10-B, and favored to win, came to Eldorado last Friday night for the deciding game and went down in defeat to Eldorado by a score of 12 to 14.

In so doing they provided the crowd with one of the most breathless games ever seen on the local field. When the final whistle blew, Junction was pounding away a few feet from our goal line with everything they had.

Nixon, making good on his two kicks after touchdown, saved the score from being a tie. But no one player could be credited with this game. In the last quarter with their backs up against their own goal line, the Eldorado team formed a rock wall that took everything Junction could put out. A step or two more and the score could just as well have been Junction 18.

Clean Game

There were rumors before-hand that this was going to be a "dirty" game, but that proved to be untrue. It was hard-played football all the way, with only a few penalties, and no players injured to the extent of having to be taken out of the game.

The game was witnessed by one of the biggest crowds ever seen here—weather was favorable.

The Game

The first quarter produced no score for either team. In the 2nd

quarter Nixon got off a pass to Hicks who went about 82 yards, placing the ball about 10 yards from the goal line. Nixon then went around Junction's left end for a touchdown. His place kick was good. Score 7-0. Junction came back strong, galloped through for a touchdown, but failed in their effort for the extra point. Score at the half 6-7 in Eldorado's favor.

In the third quarter Junction threatened seriously but was held for downs close to the goal line. Eldorado kicked out on their own 26. Horsefly Murr drove to a first down and kicked up seven yards over Eldorado's left end. Then Brite got a first down on the six. Murr mauled through Eldorado's left guard to the touchdown. Conversion point again failed. Score 12 to 6 in favor of Junction.

On two plays in the 4th quarter Hicks and Nixon picked up eight yards, one play failed, then there was a five-yard penalty against Junction that gave Eldorado a first down on the Junction 12. Hicks then ripped down the middle to Eldorado's second touchdown. Nixon's kick was good. Eldorado 14, Junction 12.

Junction menaced seriously before the quarter was out. It seemed that the last four minutes were all played within 10 yards of the goal line.

New Fords To Be On Display Here Friday

The 1951 Fords, featuring Fordomatic Drive, the new automatic transmission, will be introduced in Ford dealerships throughout the nation Friday, Nov. 24. Two of the new Fords will be on display in Eldorado at Charlie Trigg Motors, Ford dealers.

"Ford cars for 1951 accomplish notable refinements in styling, beauty, engineering, riding qualities, economy, safety and ease of handling," L. D. Crusoe, vice president and general manager of Ford Division, announced.

Addition of the new automatic device will make available to Ford buyers a choice of three transmissions and two engines—six different power combinations in all.

Both the conventional three-speed transmission and the Ford overdrive will continue to be available. These, with the new Fordomatic Drive, will be offered with either the 100-horsepower V8 or the improved 95-horsepower six engines.

The distinctive styling of the 1949 and 1950 models has been retained, but with refinements and improvements both in interiors and exteriors.

A lowered hood, a new dual-spinner grille and a wider, longer wrap-around bumper give a more massive appearance to the front end. Parking lights are restyled and larger chrome headlamp rims extend beyond the lenses. Added chrome and new, larger tail lamps add to the appearance of the rear

end. Rear deck lids on the new Fords have been counter-balanced and are opened by a new key release lock. Springs then assist in raising the lid and hold it in the open position. The new models have a wide range of color combinations, and a choice of upholstery, headlinings and other interior trim to harmonize with body colors.

The '51 "Safety Glow" instrument panel is completely new. A "Chanalited" instrument cluster adds safety and convenience, and the speedometer pointer has a glowing ring which encircles and illuminates the figure showing the speed. The instrument control knobs are mounted in depressed cups, each individually lighted.

Key starting is provided by the new ignition switch which incorporates the starter control. The steering wheel also is re-designed, with a full-circle horn ring on custom models. A posture control front seat is mounted on curved tracks, and when it is moved forward or backward, the entire seat assembly tips to the correct position for tall or short drivers. An assist spring moves the seat forward automatically.

An outstanding feature of the new cars is a new "softer" ride which is made possible by suspension improvements and automatic ride controls. A new control valve was developed in the hydraulic shock absorbers, which adjusts the cushioning effect. The combination

of new tension-type rear spring suspension and softer front spring rate maintains a proper balance between the front and rear for a level ride on all roads. Rubber engine mounts also have been re-designed.

The Ford deluxe line includes the business coupe, tudor and fordor models. In the custom line are the club coupe, tudor, fordor and convertible. The Country Squire station wagon and the Crestliner complete the passenger car line. The V8 engine or the six are optional on all models except the convertible and the Crestliner.

Several important engine changes have been made. Valve rotators have been incorporated and the top compression ring on each piston in V8 and Six engines now is chrome flashed. A weather-proof ignition system also is a feature.

The new fuel pump is designed to assure reliability under all kinds of operating conditions. A larger windshield wiper motor improves wiper operation.

New mounting of the intake manifold on the Six insures more uniform fuel distribution for quicker cold weather starting and smoother performance. Quieter operation is accomplished by installation of expansion control Autothermic pistons and by adoption of a redesigned camshaft and a three-blade fan.

Gears have been redesigned and strengthened in the conventional three-speed transmission and in the unit used with the overdrive.

Property Improved At Shell Station

Improving of the property at the Shell Station has been under way for several weeks, and the project nears completion. A crew from Menard has been renewing the suction manifold, replacing obsolete equipment with new. The local crew is working on a similar project at Big Lake.

The four Shell cottages, occupied by Frank Prochaska, F. A. Watson, J. A. Neill and D. Smith, are being repaired in preparation for arrival of the painting crew. The men will paint the power house and Auxiliary building interiors, and the outside of the houses, also the 1000-barrel float tank and the water barrel.

A crew of men has been here several weeks working over the lighting system for the buildings, the stages, and the yards. At present the work is being held up because of the shortage of materials.

Shortage Continues In Texas Classrooms

Demand is greater than supply in the matter of teachers for Texas elementary schools, Dr. Lorena B. Stretch, dean of the Baylor University School of Education, said recently.

The foremost woman educator, who serves also as chairman of the school's Teacher Placement Bureau, announced that appeals from the

schools for teachers are coming much faster than are applications from prospective teachers. She urged Baylor senior education students to list their qualifications with her bureau.

The unprecedented demand is due primarily, Dr. Stretch said, to the coming of war babies to the class room. The situation may get worse before it gets better, she said, and the increase will be felt in the higher grades as the present first graders advance.

It all means that the future is bright for prospective teachers, she declared.

And to make the prospect even brighter, Dr. Stretch pointed to


provisions of the Gilmer Aikin bill setting minimum salaries for school teachers. The college graduate with

no previous teaching experience is guaranteed a starting salary of \$2,403 for a nine-month school term.

Recipe of the Week

Uncooked Fruit Cake
¾ pound seeded raisins
¼ pound dried currants
¼ pound dates
¼ pound figs
¼ pound candied cherries
¼ pound candied pineapple
2 ounces citron
½ pound pecans
1 cup rolled oats
½ cup grape juice
½ cup orange juice
¾ cup strained honey
2 tablespoons unsalted fat
2 whole cloves
2 allspice berries
1 inch stick cinnamon
¾ cup bread crumbs.
Simmer fruit juices and spices 5 minutes. Strain, add oatmeal and bread crumbs to fruit juice. Cool. Stir in honey and fat. Cover batter air tight and let it stand overnight. Mix fruits and nuts and let stand overnight. Combine mixtures and blend thoroughly. Pack tightly in waxed paper lined pan or pack in aluminum foil freezer container or cover pan with tight fitting lid. This may be stored in the refrigerator for several weeks.

An ORDINANCE REGULATING the SHOOTING Of Fire Works!

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE AND SHOOTING OF FIREWORKS WITHIN THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS, PROHIBITING THE SHOOTING OF FIREWORKS WITHIN THE FIRE LIMITS, DEFINING FIREWORKS AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS

Section 1. Definition. The term "Fireworks" referred to in this ordinance shall include Toy pistol, toy gun, toy cannons, detonating canes, roman candles, sky-rockets, blank cartridges, firecrackers of any size and kind, or any substance of an explosive nature and device for discharging same.

Section 2. The shooting of fireworks prohibited. It shall be hereafter unlawful any person or persons to set off or shoot any fire works within the fire limits, of the city of Eldorado, as the same is now defined or may hereafter be defined.

Section 3. It shall hereafter be unlawful any person or persons to set off or shoot any fire works anywhere, within the city limits, of the City of Eldorado between Midnight and 6 A. M. of any Day of the Year.

Section 4. It shall be hereafter unlawful for any person or persons to set or shoot any fireworks within 300 yards of any hospital, school or any other public building; in any street or public park; or within 300 yards of any stand or store where fireworks are kept or sold.

Section 5. All ordinances or part of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 6. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, shall be guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar nor more than One Hundred Dollars.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

Recipe Column

With Thanksgiving Day here and Christmas around the corner housewives are thinking about mincemeat. Mincemeat was first made in 1890 and it has been a ready-to-use product ever since. Basic ingredients are fresh apples, two kinds of raisins, currants, orange and lemon rind, brown sugar, distilled white vinegar, choice cider, salt, a small amount of beef, choice spices.

Mincemeat Cheese Cake (Refrigerator Style)
Ingredients: 1 nine-ounce package mincemeat, 1 cup water, zwiebach crumb mixture (see recipe below) 1 cup cold water, 2 table-

spoons (2 envelopes) unflavored gelatin, 2 eggs (separated), 3-4 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 three-ounce packages cream cheese (at room temperature), 1 teaspoon lemon rind, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 chilled evaporated milk, whipped, or 3-4 cup heavy cream, whipped.

Method: Break mincemeat into pieces in small saucepan. Add 1 cup water. Place over medium heat and stir until lumps are thoroughly broken. Boil briskly 2 minutes. Cool. Press zwiebach crumb mixture on sides and bottom of 8 in. spring form pan, saving 1-4 cup crumbs for top. Put 1/2 cup cold water in mixing bowl and sprinkle with gelatin. Put egg yolks in top of double boiler and beat slightly; mix in well remaining 1/2 cup cold water, add sugar and salt and mix well. Cook over simmering water until mixture thickens slightly, about 5 minutes. Pour over softened gelatin, stirring until dissolved. Cool. Cream the cheese until fluffy. Slowly mix in gelatin mixture. Thoroughly blend in lemon rind and juice. Chill until mixture thickens slightly. Mix cooled mincemeat into gelatin mixture. Fold in whipped evaporated milk or heavy cream. Then fold in egg whites which have been stiffly beaten. Pour into crumb lined pan. Sprinkle remaining crumbs on top. Chill in refrigerator until firm, about 2 to 3 hours.

Zwiebach Crumb Mixture
Ingredients: 1 1/4 cup firmly packed zwiebach crumbs; 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 cup butter (melted).

Method: Mix zwiebach crumbs, sugar, and cinnamon, stir in butter, blend well.







buying for Thanksgiving. We especially hoped to find out what kind of meat people were having for the traditional feast.

We came up with a few interesting facts: Roasts are quite popular. With pork reasonably priced, lots of people bought roasts—they do go well with dressing too.

Turkeys? They sold at over 60 cents Wednesday, as compared with hens at 59 cents. If turkeys are bought, the demand is usually for the smaller ones. But more popular than turkeys are hens, with friers running a close second. People are buying meat sort of in this order: hens, roasts, friers, hams, turkeys. That's a tentative rating, of course.

We rather gathered from remarks made by clerks that maybe people don't make the fuss over Thanksgiving that they did a generation or two ago. While there is a little more buying of canned pumpkin, mincemeat, and items of that sort, grocery buying this week runs generally about as usual, but possibly a little heavier in amount.

Something else seemed to crop up—the hunting season is on, and families are a little divided, so maybe the Thanksgiving dinner will be a few days late.

To relieve the egg shortage in Eldorado, and to provide some friendly diversion for the over-worked Success crew, a sociably inclined hen from the Boyer farm spent three days in the business district of Eldorado.

It happened like this: She had been in the habit of roosting under a pickup in the Ray Boyer farm yard. She didn't notice the difference when she happened to roost under the family car—and in some way she managed to keep a toehold when Boyer drove the car to Eldorado Saturday morning.

Westbrook Oil Co. is drilling at around 5000 feet on their Baugh test, nearly a mile from the Baugh pumper, in section 8. Hiawatha has drilled the water well for the new wildcat on Forrest Runge's ranch, in the southwest corner of sec. 66.


