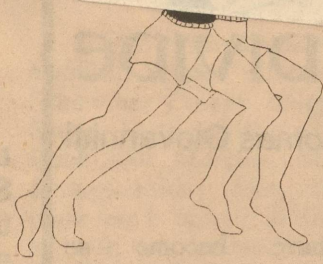

### Library Received Dobie Award

Jeri Whitten, librarian for Schleicher County Public Library, Carolyn Mayo, library board member and Hal Whitten were in Corpus Christi recently to receive the J. Frank Dobie Library Trust Award.

J. Frank Dobie, the great Texan and great writer, who did so much for Texas libraries while he was alive, left a will which set up the Trust which will provide funds to help Texas libraries for years to come. Since 1976, the Trust has endeavored to locate the most deserving libraries in the state in order to make a real impact on the quality of library service offered in the small cities of Texas as well as honor the memory of a great Texan who believed that reading can change peoples lives.

In December Hawley Wolfe & Jeri did the paperwork to meet the guidelines set up by the Award Committee. With Loraine Hamiltons expertise and Ilse Williams help, the Grant

was mailed - with no days to spare - to meet the deadlines. Since we had been told "no one gets the award the first try" we were preparing for another try next year when we received a call from James Stewart, Chairman of the Board, saying we were one of five libraries in the state of Texas to win \$4787.00 to be given at the Texas State Library Awards Banquet; TLA Convention.

The money is for books only, as set up in the guidelines left by Mr. Dobie. The amount of money varies each year according to interest, copyrights, etc. There are no restrictions as to the type of books which may be purchased. In our application to the award Committee, however, we asked to improve and add to our large print collection and the children's and adult reference books. This is our plan.

I would like to thank everyone for their prayers, cards, food and wonderful help and time that you have given to our family and Ashlynn.

I would also like to let everyone know a little more about what is going on with Ashlynn. She has not been definitely diagnosed with Rett Syndrome. She does, however, have many characteristics of this disease, as she does with several others. Two of the doctors who have examined her have diagnosed her with Rett Syndrome, but her main neurologist has not diagnosed her yet. The problems with a diagnosis is that she has so many characteristics of so many different syndromes.

There is no test available to determine whether she has Rett Syndrome or not. Diagnosis is made strictly by characteristics and regression of developmental skills.

Whatever she has, it is NOT contagious.

Ashlynn has regressed over the last 18 months, losing some motor skills (mainly her hands). She has never been able to crawl or walk on her own. She can, at times, walk with assistance.

She is currently out of the hospital. There is a high probability that we will be returning to the hospital for the placement of a permanent feeding tube. This will be done in the hopes of reducing her chances of getting pneumonia.

We have no idea what her actual life span will be or what

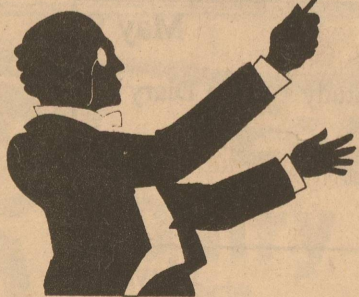
to expect from her. Ashlynn started having seizures last March. They have been uncontrolled, but we are beginning to gain some control with her new medicine and by learning more about how to deal with them.

Ashlynn is still a beautiful little girl who is always willing to give you her sweet smile. She loves the same things that all little girls love - dolls, books, movies and lots of hugs and kisses and, of course, BARNEY! She is very aware of her surroundings and she does understand what you say.

The next time you see her, don't be afraid to lend her your smile - she won't be afraid to return it!

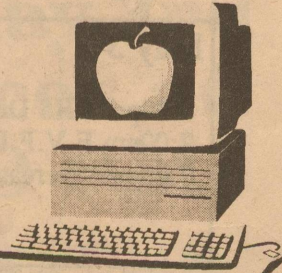

## Local Texas Bluebonnet Award Participants

Eldorado Elementary participates in the Bluebonnet Reading program for students in Texas. The program is designed to promote student reading in Texas.

The Texas Bluebonnet Award program consists of: 1) A list of twenty books chosen by librarians and teachers across the state; 2) Students must read at least five of the books from that list in order to vote for their favorite book; 3) In Eldorado the voting is held as if it were a national election - registered voters, secret ballots, etc.; 4) When the winning author is announced, the students who voted are treated to announcement celebration, with cake, punch, cookies and all the party trimmings.

Every year ten students, representing the ten library districts in Texas, are chosen to be on the podium when the winning author receives the Bluebonnet Award.

This year a student from Eldorado Elementary was chosen for that honor. After reading the most books and scoring the highest on a test over the books they had read, Toni Martin and Courtney Sauer were chosen to go to represent Eldorado Elementary at the Texas Librarians Convention in Corpus Christi. Toni Martin, who scored the highest on the test, was the student representing Eldorado on the podium, on behalf of the 220,106 students who voted in 1994 Bluebonnet Awards.

Linda Peters and Mickey McGregor, teacher for both girls, accompanied Toni and Courtney to Corpus Christi. They left Eldorado on Tuesday

morning, April 12th. On Wednesday, they went sightseeing in Corpus Christi - they went on a boat tour of the harbor, toured the Texas State Aquarium, and spent time on the beach walking and collecting shells. On Thursday they met the other selected Bluebonnet kids and rehearsed the award presentation.

Toni and Courtney met with Phyllis Reynolds Naylor, the winning author, in a private meeting at the Texas Art Museum for autographs and photographs.

They then attended the Bluebonnet Award luncheon along with about 1,700 librarians and guests where Phyllis Reynolds Naylor was honored with a ceremony to present her book *Shiloh* with the 1994 Texas Bluebonnet Award. The luncheon was sponsored by the Children's Roundtable.

The Texas Bluebonnet Award is a project of the Texas Library Association and is co-sponsored by the Texas Association of School Librarians and the TLA Children's Roundtable.

## Superintendent Addresses Bond Election

### To The Citizens Of Schleicher County

As you may have heard, on Monday, April 11, the Board of Trustees for the Schleicher County Independent School District voted to call a bond election on May 26, 1994. The purpose of the proposed bond is to facilitate new construction and renovate existing facilities to meet current and projected district needs.

The board reviewed enrollment statistics that track the growth of SCISD for the past thirty-three years, visited with principals, counselors, and teachers to assess future needs, evaluated the district's financial status, and consulted a financial advisor. Based upon their findings, the board elected to propose a bond issue to the public that, if passed, would satisfy the district's requirements.

In the near future, you will have the opportunity to review plans and cost projections, assess the tax impact for you personally, and be given the opportunity to offer suggestions. Below, I have included answers to some questions you might have at this point.

### Why do we need a building program?

**Gymnasium/ Physical Education Facilities**  
Available physical education/athletic space has not increased since 1958. In 1958 when the current high school gymnasium was completed, the

Eldorado school system had a student membership of 602. Today our student enrollment exceeds 780 students. This increase in student population has dropped our square footage per person to 17.77 square feet. The state average is 33.21 square feet. Also, in 1958 there were four basketball teams and two physical education classes in Grades 7-12. Today there are ten basketball teams and eight physical education classes.

There are also four athletic classes scheduled during the day. Some of our students do not finish practice until 8:00 or 9:00 at night; and still must complete homework assignments, eat, and try to get rested before the next day!

Physical education classes must share the gym with athletic teams and do not have enough room during the winter months to participate in a full activities program. The load imposed on the gymnasium creates a safety problem for our children.

### Industrial Technology/ Tech Prep/Computer Technology

The high school program is not like you and I remember it. Computers and technology have taken over. In the near future, we will have students graduate with "real world" marketable skills. Some of our students will have college credit before they graduate. They will be trained in the use of business machines, computers and their applicable production technology, and some will even graduate as certified nurse's assistant. All of this is in addition to the regular reading, writing, and arithmetic curriculum.

All of these programs require space and equipment. Through grants from various sources and agreements with universities and colleges, we have the necessary equipment to prepare our students--we just don't have the space to use it effectively. It is our plan to reorganize, renovate, and build to meet these needs.

### What is our current debt?

Next year (Feb. 1995), we will make the final payment on the middle school and field house. It is the district's plan to retire this current debt and pay for the new construction and renovation without any tax increase for construction. We hope to retire any new debt in 3-5 years.

### How are senior citizens affected?

As of 1979 property owners who are 65 years of age or older and have applied for the over age exemption on their homestead will have their homestead frozen at that tax levy.

### Who can vote in the bond election?

Any person who is a registered voter and a resident of the county on election day.

### When will the election be held?

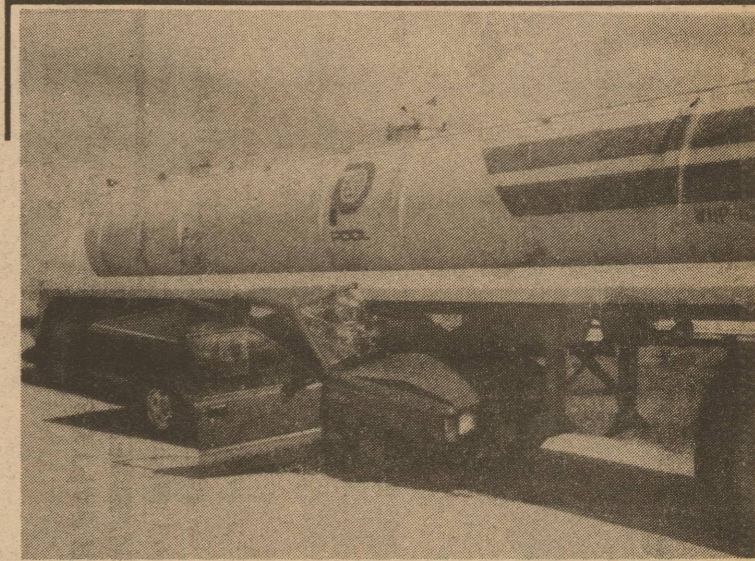
The bond election will be held on Thursday, May 26, 1994, 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

### Where will the bond election be held?

The bond election will be held at the Memorial Building for all Schleicher County residents regardless of precinct.

### Can a voter vote absentee?

Yes, absentee voting by personal appearance will be held at the Administration Building, at 205 Fields, Friday, May 6, 1994, 8 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. through Friday, May 20, 1994, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Applications for ballots by mail must be received no later than the close of business on Wednesday, May 18, 1994.

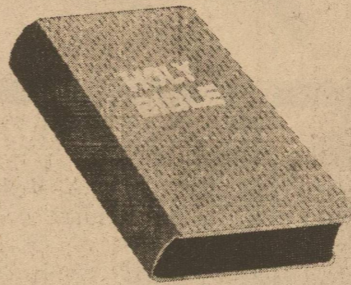

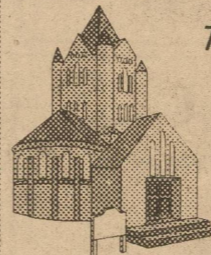

## Caliche Pits New Concern For Texas Landowners

Paul Mohle of the Texas Railroad Commission met with Schleicher County Commissioners on Monday, April 25, 1994 to discuss new regulations regarding open caliche pits. Mr. Mohle informed the commissioners of the Texas Aggregate Quarry And Pit Safety Act adopted by the state legislature in 1993.

The act requires owners of open sand, gravel, rock or caliche pits located within 200 feet of a public roadway to slope the sides of the pit or construct barriers in such a way as to prevent automobiles from entering the pits. Mr. Mohle stated that legislation was prompted by a fatal accident in south Texas in which a school bus collided with a truck and veered into a pit filled with water. Several school children died in that accident.

During the discussion, Mr. Mohle informed the commissioners of the new state fees for caliche pits in Schleicher County. Owners and operators of open pits will be assessed a fee of \$500.00. Political subdivisions such as counties or cities will be charged \$350.00 for every inactive pit they operate. County

commissioners expressed concern about the number of pits in Schleicher County and the high cost to the owners of permitting and bringing the pits into compliance with the Pit Safety Act.

Mr. Mohle informed the commissioners of the civil penalties provided for in the act. Failure to comply could result in a first time fine of up to \$1000.00, with additional violations drawing fines of up to \$5000.00.

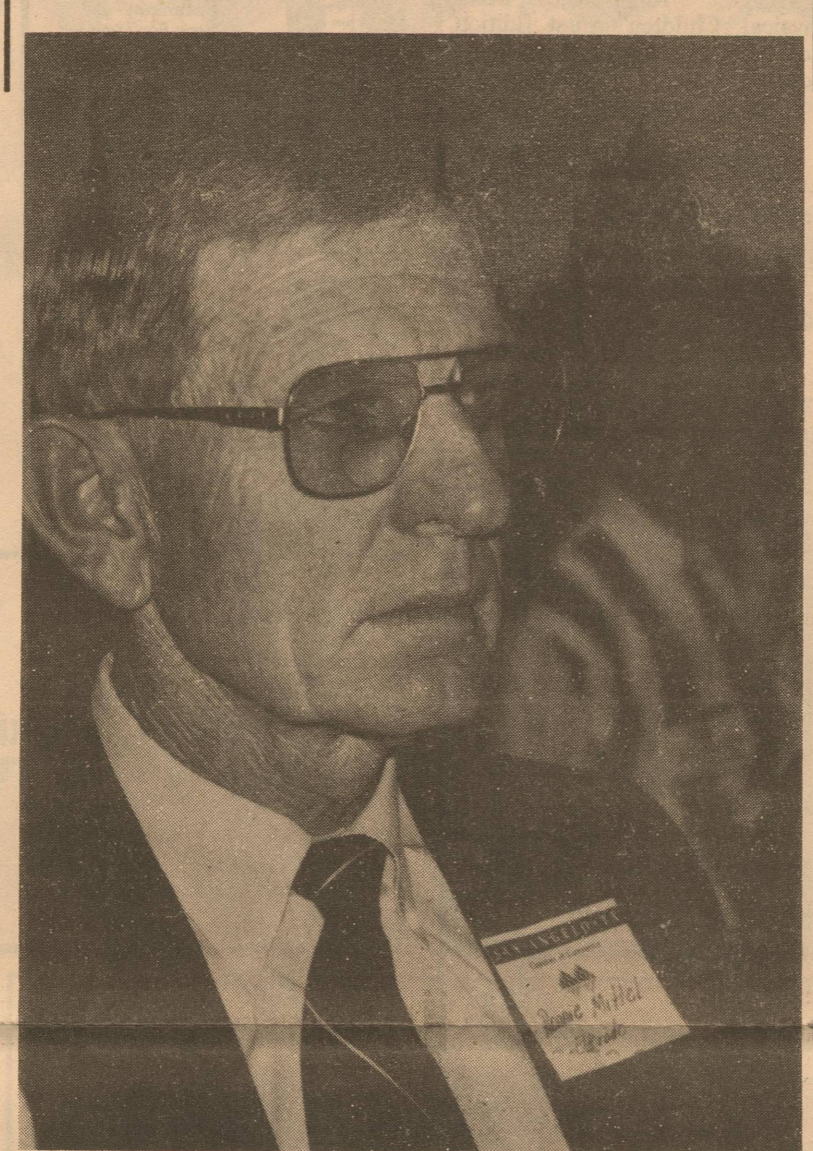
The Varsity boys accumulated 22 points in their


