Overall Picture

Here is a resume of the status of the proposed new Mertzon road

to date: There is a 20-mile stretch to the county line, which will be handled in three strips, an 8-mile strip, and two 6-mile stretches. The first eight, leading out of Eldorado, is staked off, as explained above, and highway officials are now spending their time on deeds; the county will complete right-of-way preliminaries when the deeds are

turned over to county officials. The second project, a six mile strip of paving, is being surveyed off, with probability that stakes will be driven to mark it off within a week or two. This 14-mile total will probably be built at one time.

The third and last strip in this county, six miles long, will receive attention as soon as officials know where it will connect with the road leading this way from Mertzon to the county line. This Schleicher strip, six miles long, will probably follow the present route much of the way.
