Otis Davis' son Michael Davis of Midland, is here visiting his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Riley.

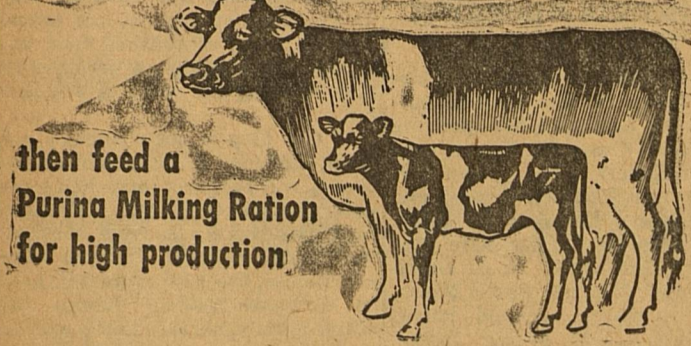

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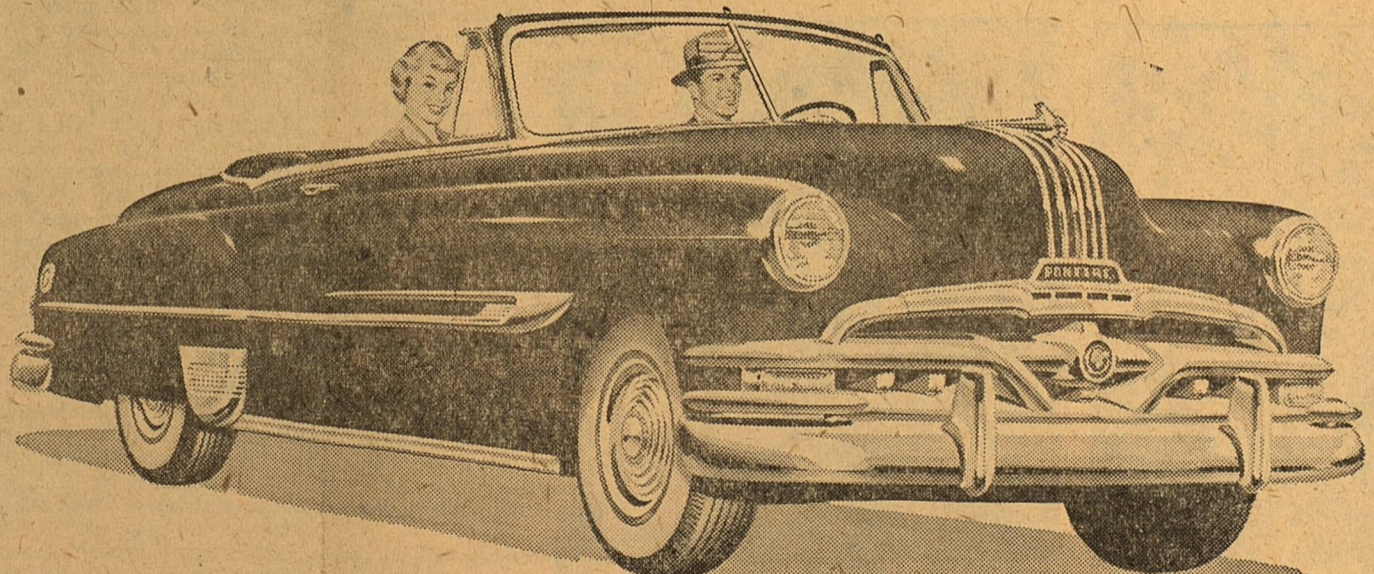
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Bride Is Honored

WHY CHRISTIANS TAKE A STAND AGAINST DANCING

I Peter 3:15 "Sanctify in your hearts Christ as Lord." Lord means Boss. When he becomes your master he is your example. Can you imagine Christ at a dance? Paul said, "Abstain from the very appearance of evil." II Peter 2:2 "And many shall follow their lascivious doings by reason of whom the way of Truth shall be evilly spoken of."

Is the dance lascivious? Here is your answer! Rudolph Valentino said, "Dancing is the outward appearance of perfect marriage, the dance is a partnership. It is the mutual sense of rhythm. It is sex!"

"The dancing sheik" ought to know his business. If this is true, it is lascivious and no Christian has a right to such experiences this side of the altar.

The Chicago vice commissioner asked when they talked to three hundred prostitute girls, "What led you to become what you are today?" Eighty-five percent of them said, "My first step wrong was caused by the modern dance." That was not preachers; it was an investigation of the Chicago vice commission. Many girls and boys have lost their honor and character by dancing, but not one has been made purer by the dance.

A physician of Chicago and L. A. (specialist in nervous diseases) says, "As a medical man I charge that dancing's charm is based upon sex appeal. It is the most insidious of the preliminaries to sex betrayal. We doctors know there are mysterious current affinities that seem almost chemical, caused by physical contact. I am no prig or prude but I tell you frankly that

it is not safe to subject even the strongest men and women to the temptations of the dance. The physical stimulation of the dance drugs the intellect and the spirit."

Harry Stribes (ex-dancing teacher, professional) says, "I do not believe a woman can dance virtuously and waltz well, for she must yield her person completely to her partner."

A Christian must be careful that he does nothing that will cause anyone to stumble and the dance has proven itself to be one of the major stumbling blocks thru its entire existence. In Roman 15:1-2 it says "Now we that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves, let each one please his neighbor for that which is good, unto edifying, for Christ also pleased not Himself."

A young woman who was a church member came to her minister and asked him what he thought of her going to the dance. He warned her against it and told her she could not win souls there. She said, "If I can, then will you admit that it is all right?"

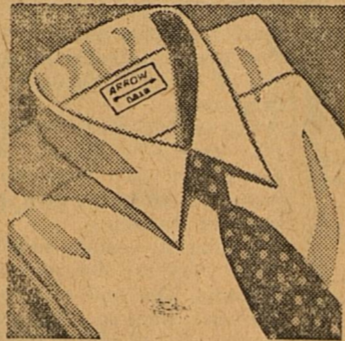

Report From Democratic State Convention By Local Delegates

The great interest engendered over Texas in the precinct, county and state conventions during May probably will result in increased attendance at the next precinct conventions July 26. That is the prediction of experienced political observers who point out that the July 26 meetings will lead up to another state convention in September at which the state party platforms for the next two years will be adopted.

Governor Allan Shivers deserves a lion's share of the credit for this increased interest of Texas citizens in the convention phase of their government. For months he stressed the importance of the May conventions as being the average voter's only opportunity to express himself on national party matters. His leadership resulted in the selection at San Antonio May 27 of an uninstructed, unpledged delegation to the Democratic National Convention in Chicago July 21. The Texas delegates are instructed only to look for candidates and platform planks that are worthy of the Jeffersonian principles upon which the true Democratic Party is based.

The Governor is expected to devote much of his time and public appearances during June and July to the July conventions, explaining their importance in the state political setup and urging voters to express themselves on state issues as they have on national issues. He is likely to base his state platform and program on the principles laid down at San Antonio, which were summarized in the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION TO NATIONAL COMMITTEE MEMBERS

WHEREAS, the Democratic Party in Texas has heretofore placed its representation in the National Committee in the hands of two of the leading citizens of this State, the Honorable Mrs. H. H. Weinert and the Honorable Wright Morrow; and

WHEREAS, the grave responsibilities placed upon the Honorable Mrs. Weinert and the Honorable Wright Morrow have been assumed and discharged by them in full accordance with the highest traditions of our Democratic faith, and they, by their services, as members of the National Committee, have performed their trust with great credit to themselves,

Therefore, Be it

RESOLVED, This Convention acknowledges, with a full sense of gratitude and appreciation, the services so well and ably rendered the State of Texas by the Honorable Mrs. H. H. Weinert, National Committeewoman, and by the Honorable Wright Morrow, National Committeeman, and we do here and now express our appreciation in a rising vote of thanks to these great and able Democrats.

THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY OF TEXAS IN STATE CONVENTION

At San Antonio on May 27, 1952, Resolves:

First: We reaffirm our devotion to our treasured Democratic heritage and to the tenets of the historic Democratic Party true to the traditions of Texas—a State of the Southland that sheltered the still small light of the Democratic Party for more than a half century through the shadowed valley of darkness and defeat. We avow our fidelity to the faith of our fathers embodied in the deathless doctrines of the inalienable liberties under law of the individual man and the reserved and inalienable rights under the Constitution of the individual, sovereign states. We repudiate the Republican Party as a party long hostile to our aspirations and still alien to our heritage and stranger if not unfriendly to our needs. We reassert our belief that the Democratic Party of Texas is the best instrumentality through which to advance the best interests of our people and confirm our intentions to seek the solution of our problems within the framework of the Democratic Party.

SECOND: In this Critical Year of Decision 1952, we deem these twelve truths to be self-evident:

(1) Maintaining the highest degree of freedom for the individual consistent with law and order and reposing in the individual state the greatest measure of responsibility government consistent with the national defense are the true fundamentals of our party and the true cornerstones of our liberty. The preservation of our freedom requires that further trends toward the centralization of power in the federal government be halted in their tracks.

(2) Economy in government, the principle and practice of Jefferson, our founding father, is indispensable to our salvation. The survival of our economic system demands the ruthless extermination of extravagance and waste in government—both civilian and military, the practice of the most rigid economy consistent with our national strength and national defense, and the easing of the crushing bur-

den of federal taxation to the extent that true economy will achieve and the requirements of national defense will permit.

(3) The integrity of our federal government compels scrupulous adherence to its solemn obligations in its treaty of annexation with the Republic of Texas and its rigid respect for the rights of all of the states in the lands owned by them. The attempted judicial confiscation of the submerged lands of Texas and other tideland states, having been twice repudiated by overwhelming votes of both Houses of Congress, stands also condemned as an act of piracy by the conscience of mankind. The very honor of the government of the United States demands the complete relinquishment of all claims of title or paramount rights by the federal government over these lands belonging to the states.

(4) The integrity of our federal government cannot exist apart from the integrity of those who administer it in its every bureau and department. The cleansing of government of the grafter and the influence peddler, without fear or favor, and be he friend or foe, is the course of morality which the Democratic Party must pursue.

(5) The devotion of the Democratic Party must be to the great body of our people. While it must ever be the guardian of the rights of minorities—as well as the majority—to freedom of speech, press, assembly and worship, the rights of property, and equal justice under law, it must be the relentless foe of the special interest and the minority pressure group that seeks not rights but privilege, dictation, or control.

(6) The imposition by federal law or federal fiat of a Fair Employment Practices Code upon every individual employer in every individual state would be a last, long step toward the ultimate destruction of the very freedom it purports to promote—for loss of freedom to choose the employee leads inevitably to loss of freedom to choose the employer. Both are slavery. Against this instrument of tyranny we stand—along with the Democratic Senators and Congressmen from Texas—in unalterable opposition.

(7) The rights and liberties of all our citizens of every race, creed and color are imbedded in the Bill of Rights to our United States Constitution and bulwarked by the protection of our courts. The invasion of the sphere and the sovereignty of the individual state through the enactment by the federal government of so-called Civil Rights Legislation would be but one more step to enslave the states in the foolish attempt to impose and enforce tolerance and brotherhood by compulsion of law. Along with the Democratic Senators and Congressmen from Texas, we stand resolutely against it.

(8) Both Communism without and Communism within are alike the threatening assassins of our civilization and potential murderers of our freedom. Every measure within our resources must be taken against Communist aggression without and Communist infiltration within.

(9) In labor controversies the government of the United States must not be the partisan of either management or unions. We stand with the vast majority of the Democratic Congressmen and Senators from Texas and from the South as a whole in firm opposition to the weakening or repeal of the Labor-Management Relations Act. "Equal justice under law" for both employers and unions is the only sound federal labor policy.

(10) The Executive Department of the federal government, including the President of the United States, must ever remain subject to the Supreme Law of the land in the Constitution of the United States if liberty is to live. Any other doctrine is the dogma of dictators.

(11) The paramount obligation of our government is to our fighting men and their families. Keeping faith with them requires the subordination of every non-essential civilian activity of government to the early accomplishment by every weapon and resource of victory and peace.

(12) The nominees for president and vice president of the United States chosen by the Democratic Party should be strong men—sun-crowned—the men the times demand—men whom the spoils of office will not buy—who can walk with kings and yet not lose the common touch—men worthy of the dignity of the offices they will bear—and men who love and can be trusted to follow the ancient landmarks of our historic Democratic faith.

Sincerely believing that these principles can best be achieved through the medium of the Democratic Party of Texas and that the future welfare of Texas can best be advanced within its fold—earnestly desiring to build a greater and stronger Democratic Party to battle without timidity or retreat for its original and genuine ideals:

We call upon all good Texas Democrats, who believe with us in

these fundamentals of our faith, to remain in or to return to the House of Our Fathers—to march in our ranks and to fight under our banner.

All persons, who are qualified to vote under the laws of the State of Texas and who believe with us in their country above all else, in states rights and in individual rights, in honest government, in local self-government to the highest practical degree, that Texas tidelands belong to Texas, that subversive elements must be purged from the government, that the majority should rule, but the rights of the minority must be protected, that the government should be operated economically to the end that the crushing burden of taxation shall be reduced, that all socialistic trends in our government must be eliminated, that communism is a curse upon this earth and must be given no quarter at home or abroad, being the basic philosophy and true ideals of the Democratic Party, are invited to join the Democratic Party and participate in its affairs without further qualification and all resolutions and policies to the contrary adopted or followed by former conventions of the Democratic Party are hereby repealed and annulled.

FINALLY: The Delegates of the Democratic Party of Texas are instructed to vote as a unit and to fight as a unit—without fear or faltering—for the embodiment of this declaration of principles in the 1952 platform of the National Democratic Party and to support as a unit and to vote as a unit for real Democrats of the true blood of our heritage for nominees for president and vice president of the United States. In this critical year of decision we give a sacred charge to the Texas Delegation to the Democratic National Convention to expend all of the starwart strength of Texas Democracy in a battle for a platform true to the traditions and for candidates loyal and devoted to the principles of the Great Democratic Party of our Fathers—a platform and nominees that Texas Democrats can in good consci-

ence support with fervor and with faith. You shall prevail because ours is the armor of the right and the cause is just and true!

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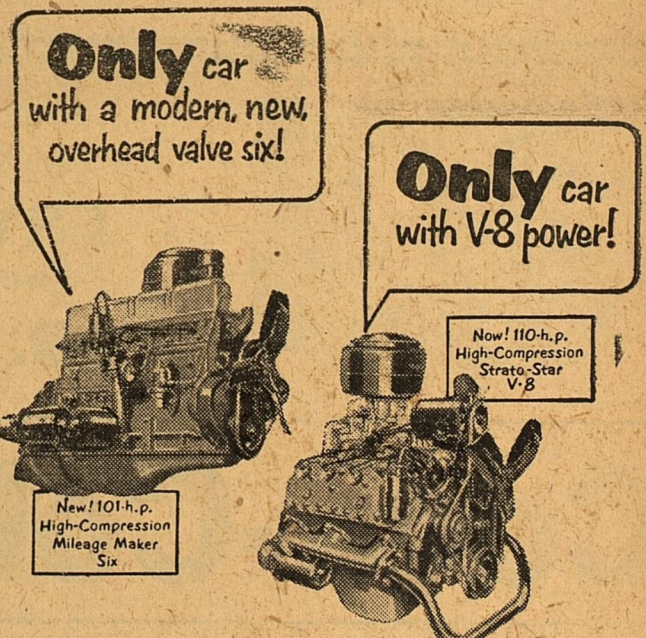

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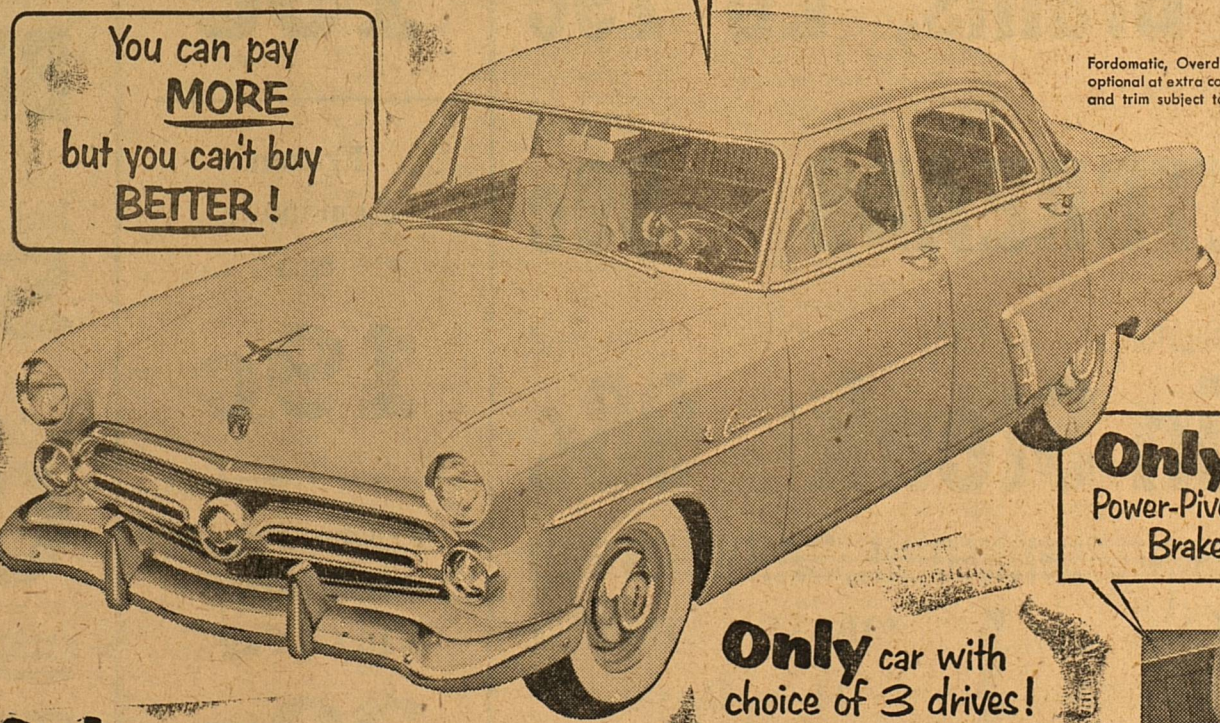

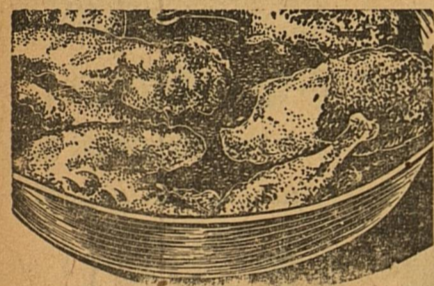
