IT WENT BOOM!



The boys tossed the wire for a thrill, and the resulting boom could be heard many blocks away. The fire burned out the city feeder line, causing the entire city to be without service for 45 minutes. Damage is estimated at \$200, mainly on the building which was badly burned, and in addition there was loss of electric service while repairs were being made.

West Texas Utilities Manager Jerry Pennington was on the job at once with his crew, restoring service in record time considering the seriousness of the damage.



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

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

phenothiazine. Phenothiazine salt was also put out at the same time, and kept before them at all times, winter and summer. Now for seven years they have not had to drench their sheep. However they have found that it often takes more than one drenching to first control the worms. It might take two years to first get your control, then the phenothiazine salt will keep them under control the rest of the way. This was an actual experiment at the Sonora Station. Climatic conditions here in Schleicher county are much the same as that of the Sonora Station so we should be able to control stomach worms with phenothiazine salt as they did.

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
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
