# Big Crowd Present at Graduation Friday

W. J. Fraker, principal of the Eldorado High school, was in charge of presenting of awards to Junior and Senior High School students, and Henry Speck, president of the school board, handed out the diplomas to 24 graduating Seniors, in Commencement exercises Friday night in the school auditorium.

In their last appearance before an audience as students in EHS the group had the support of a large number of relatives and friends who through their presence and their applause gave the young people their final send-off.

The valedictorian, Wilson Humphrey, chose as his subject, "The Road Ahead," in which he mentioned the challenge of giving the best of one's self to the world, concluding his address with a well-known poem. Miss Lucille Farmer played for her girls' sextette to sing "Calm as the Night." Fred Gillaspay, one of the graduates, played as a solo on the slide trombone "The Holy City."

Two late substitutions were made in the program: Carolyn Ratliff played for the professional and recessional and for an instrumental solo, and Mary Lou Alexander substituted for Jane Belk Alexander by receiving her awards and delivering the salutatory address. Rev. F. H. Pryor delivered the invocation, and Rev. Charles Bruce delivered the benediction. Supt. T. E. Holcomb greeted the class and the audience, and introduced the speaker of the evening, Joe H. Foy of San Angelo.

In his address, Mr. Foy stressed the fact that graduation was not completion of education—that in the years ahead the graduates would find change and growth in their individual lives. In this changing world, he pointed out, the frontiers of pioneer days have disappeared, to be replaced with new and more challenging frontiers in science and other phases of modern living. He stressed the fact that through modern farming practices the productivity of the soil has been increased three-fold, that there has never been so much for so many people.

With education a continuous process, character is gradually built up, so that modern man learns to be governed by his principles as a matter of habit.

By giving the best effort of which he is capable, man develops his body, his mind, and his spirit, enabling him to find a useful field of service, and pleasure and happiness in working in that field.
