County Extension News

Feeding to keep stock alive is one thing, and feeding to keep them producing is another. Presently, some producers face the former problem.

Essentially, feeding to keep stock alive requires the utmost conservation of energy—restrict or prevent travel, have plenty of good water at hand, provide shelter.

Obviously, cattle weighing 1,000 pounds, or sheep weighing 100 pounds, require more feed for maintenance of body weight than after they have dropped to 700 and 70 pounds respectively. So we have let stock lose weight and many have lost about all that they can stand.

Under starvation conditions where there just isn't enough feed, a feed high in protein and energy is worth much more pound for pound than a feed low in protein and energy. We have the relief program moving in concentrates such as corn, wheat and cottonseed cake which provide more feed units at less handling costs than for roughages.

In other words, a pound of 50-50 mix of wheat and chopped hay daily may maintain a ewe, but a pound of 80% wheat 20% chopped hay would be better. Similarly 2 pounds of cottonseed meal and 3 pounds of a low grade hay may maintain an 800 pound cow, but 4 pounds of cottonseed meal and 6 pounds of hay would be better.

Under extreme conditions, sheep and perhaps cattle can live on concentrates, as cottonseed cake, only. Also, stock can live on about one pound of feed daily per 100 pounds live weight after they have lost a considerable amount of their weight. With modern transportation, there is no reason for the extremes. Sell out before the stock get weak. It doesn't seem logical to feed cattle and sheep concentrates only, for as ruminants they need bulk. Commonly, the most efficient use of concentrates is to supplement forage.

Protein is an essential in using low grade fibrous roughage. Any forage left in a drouth region will classify as very low in protein. Historically, cottonseed cake, 43-41 percent protein, has been fed as the supplement to low grade, low protein roughage. The protein in the cottonseed cake balances the low protein roughage.

What can agricultural workers do to aid the drouth feed program? Become informed on the utility of feeds, the price of such utilities, and then work out a rational procedure.

Drouth relief feed prices as given are: Wheat \$1.10 per bu. of 60 lbs or \$1.83 per cwt. Corn \$1.00 per bu. of 56 lbs or \$1.79 per cwt. Oats 50c per bu. of 32 lbs or \$1.56 per cwt. Cottonseed meal \$35.00 per ton or \$1.75 per cwt.
