Eagles To Take On Junction Here Tomorrow Night

Detailed Plans Are Announced For PTA-Sponsored Carnival

A parade at 5:30 in downtown Eldorado will kick off the annual PTA Halloween Carnival October 30, to be followed by an evening of fun for all at the Memorial Building and the school.

Various committees of the PTA have been busy for several weeks planning a program of activity to make Halloween a more "Safe and Sane" night for every one concerned. 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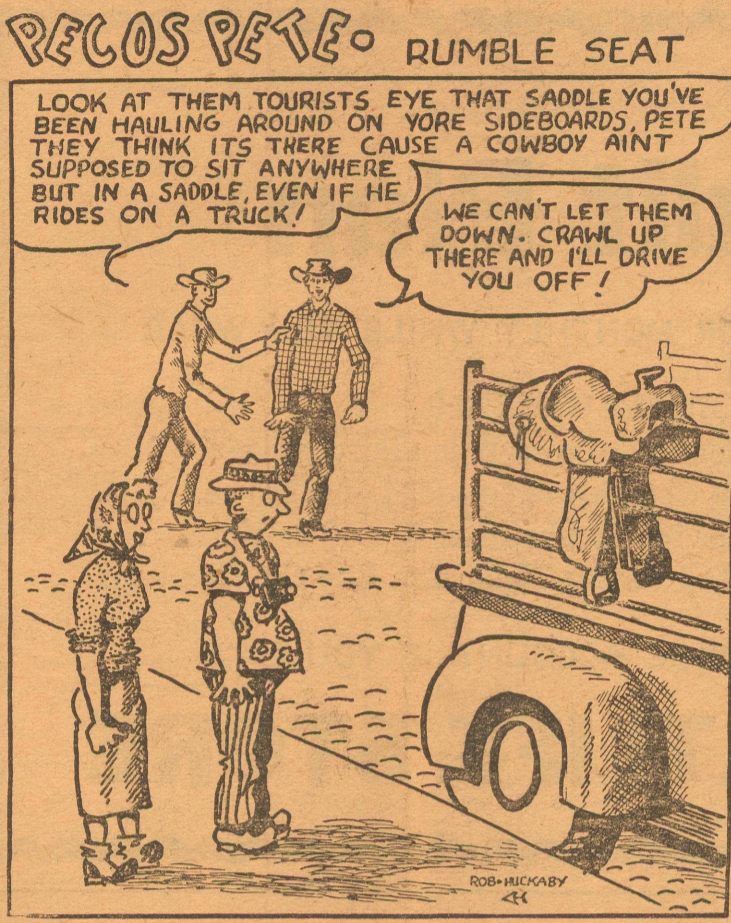
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Former Schleicher Co. Resident Dies in Nev.

J. Harold Jackson, 47, well-known rodeo performer and former Schleicher County resident, died Friday, Oct. 15 at his home in Las Vegas, Nev., of a heart attack. Funeral services were held Tuesday at Abilene and burial was made in Elmwood Memorial Park at that place. Among those attending the services were the following from Schleicher County: Lottie and Reuben Reynolds, Mrs. A. L. Westbrook and Auta Mae Bradshaw.

Harold Jackson was born on the Rocking Chair Ranch in northeast Schleicher County on Sept. 13, 1907, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Jackson. As a young man he moved to Abilene with his parents and graduated from Abilene high school.

He achieved fame as a rodeo performer and toured Europe in 1934 as a member of the Tex Austin Rodeo Show.

Survivors include the wife; the parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Jackson of Abilene; two sisters, Frances Jackson of Abilene, his twin sister, and Mrs. Jack Morris of Abilene; three brothers, Joe W. Jackson of La Porte and Charles Jackson and William Jackson, both of San Angelo.

So many foods are in abundant supply it was difficult to decide which ones rated a place on the November list, says John J. Slaughter of the Agricultural Marketing Service.
