being filled with tension and conbeing filled with tension and conflict between different groups of students, often including verbal and physical confrontations characterized by hate and fear.

## AUSTIN - The Texas House last week voted to lower the legal intoxication threshold to a blood-

 alcohol level of 08 .Advocates of the legislation, SB 114 by Sen. Mario Gallegos, D1997 Texas led the nation in alco ${ }^{\circ}$ ol-related traffic deaths with 1.748 . Of those deaths, 379 involved drivers with blood-alcohol levels under the present legal limit of 10 .

The alcoholic beverage industry has argued that lowering the bloodalcohol standard will penalize social drinkers and that instead, more cial drimkers and uar instead, more
should be done to curb drunken driving, not drinking and driving.
Rep. Scott Hochberg said, how imed at the social drinker "It tis not lass of wine with dinner"" he sit a "tis sa significant ammount of alcohol." If Texas lowers its blood-alco hol standard to .08 , the state stands. to receive $\$ 12$ million in federal highway grants.

The time has come...controlling the Pecan Nut Casebearer
by Scott Edmonson S.C. Ag Extension Agent

One of the most important nutinfesting insect pests of pecan is the pecan nut casebearer It is found in all pecan growing regions of Texas and southeastern New Mexico. Casebearer Larvae tunnel into nutlets shortly after pollination, often destroying all nutlets in a cluster.
The adult casebearer is a gray to almost black moth about $1 / 3$ inch long. A ridge of dark scales fol-
