H. R. Mock of Ozona staked a 1000 foot cable tool wildcat, seven miles south of this city. It is No. 1 Thomson Heirs, 990 feet from south and 1980 from west lines of section 71, block A HE&WT.

The project is 1/2 mile northeast of Thomas 1 Thompson, wildcat failure plugged in January, and 3/8 miles northeast of General American Oil Co. No. 1 Thompson, wildcat failure plugged in June 1953.

Felmont Oil Corp., Calvin L. Hay, John W. Rawwe, and Choya Drilling Co., all of Midland, have filed application to drill their 1 Wagley 3/8 mile west of production in the Huldale field, eight miles north of Eldorado. The project will be drilled with rotary to 6,000 feet. Location is 467 feet from the east and 2,173 feet from the north lines of 75-LL.

L. E. Scherck, San Angelo, No. 1, Mrs. C. R. Judkins, section 14, block A GH&SA, was abandoned at 4905 in barren lime. It was one mile south of the Nancy S. Canyon sand pool opener.

## COUNCIL ORDERS STREET MARKERS TO BE ERRECTED

The City Council has ordered street markers for all streets leading off from the San Angelo-Sonora Highway and the Menard Highway.

The markers will carry names of streets which are not generally known to local residents, as Eldoradoans are not in the habit of using street names in giving directions or in speaking of a particular location in the city. Most residents do not even know the names of the streets on which they live.

The markers have already been ordered and will be erected as soon as they arrive, which will probably be before Homecoming.

## PASTOR INSTALLED

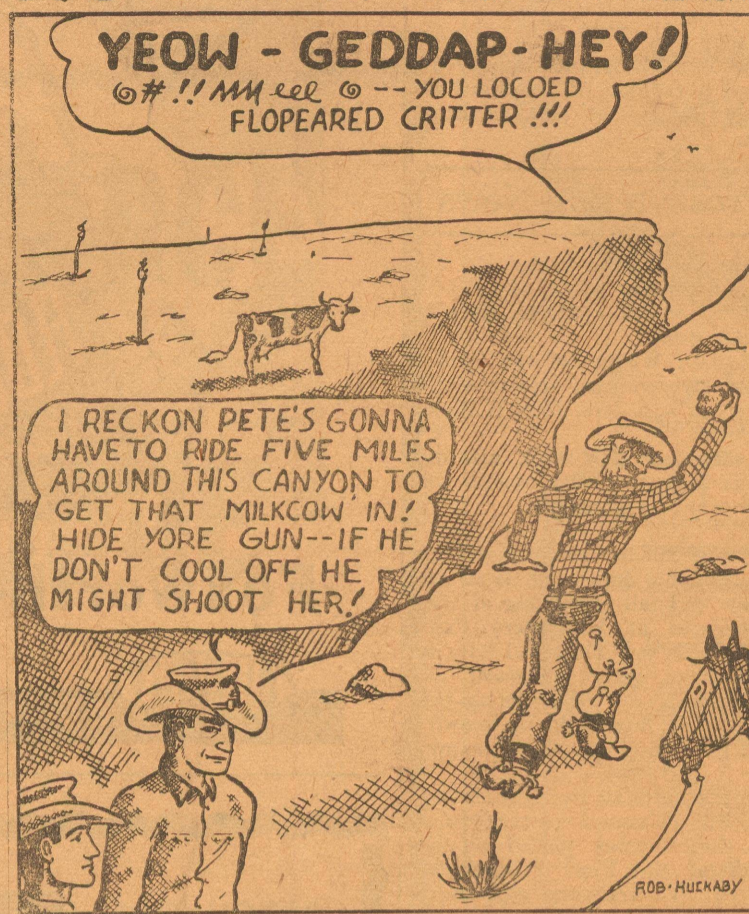
With a large number of Presbyterians and others in attendance, Rev. James Spencer was formally installed as minister of the Eldorado Presbyterian Church Sunday.

## CITY STIRRED BY RATE INCREASE PROPOSED BY TELEPHONE COMPANY

The Mayor and city council are assembling information on the people's reaction to General Telephone's request for higher rates, as announced last week.

There are several petitions at business houses which citizens have been signing, asking the city dads to refuse the request, and there are a large number of signers to date.

Opinions expressed so far indicate that practically everyone thinks the proposed rates are altogether too high, although a small raise might be acceptable.

The Mayor has indicated that the city council will have a statement to make to the public before the next council meeting in August.

## Fewer Absentee Ballots Cast In This Election Than in '52

While a very good vote is generally expected and predicted in Saturday's primary election, the turnout can hardly be expected to reach the total of two years ago, if the absentee vote is any barometer.

Up to closing time Tuesday night, 88 absentee ballots had been received and voted, with 10 not returned, making a total of 98.

Absentee votes are cast by servicemen, construction workers, vacationers and others who for some reason or other will not be in the county on election day.

In 1952, final returns, as recorded in the Eldorado Success, showed 192 absentee ballots requested and 177 voted.

The county voted a total of around 1250 in 1952. In the race for governor that year, Shivers received 792 votes and Yarborough 341.

This year 990 poll taxes were paid, with 11 unders on record, and a possible 250 overs, which are not on record. This brings up again a potential total of 1250—if they all vote.

Considering everything the 1954 election is not likely to bring out as large a total as 1952.

All who hold positions of leadership in the county urge the general public to get out and vote their convictions, as a heavy vote is a sign of interest in public affairs.

A new angle that we have heard expressed several times in the last few days goes something like this: "This campaign has been so 'darn' quiet that I think we are in for some surprises!"

On Saturday morning at 8:00 polls will open in nine voting boxes to give the voters of Schleicher County the final say in the various races for office in the Democratic primary.

For County Judge, the present incumbent, E. W. Craig, has two opponents, W. R. Bearce and Geo. Stanley Finley.

In the Sheriff's race, incumbent E. H. Sweatt has Orval Edmiston as an opponent. The other two county officers—clerk and treasurer—have no opposition.

In precinct No. 1, A. J. Halbert is running for re-election as commissioner with John Williams and Jesse Thompson for opponents.

Grat Edmiston, present incumbent, Edwin Childers and Walter Pope are running for commissioner in Precinct No. 2. Carrol White and Robert Martin are in the race for commissioner in Precinct No. 3, the former being present incumbent. In precinct No. 4 where incumbent H. A. Belk is not up for re-election, there are three in the race for commissioner—M. L. Potter, A. P. Thigpen and R. W. Reynolds.

There are ten voting boxes, including the absentee box. These, together with the election judge for each are given below. In the rural boxes where no public building is available, school busses are being provided this year as balloting locations.

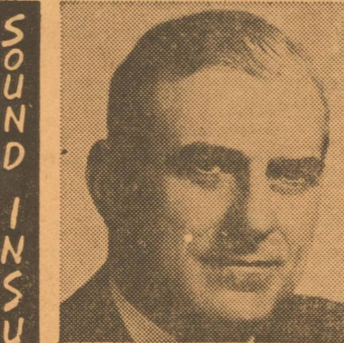

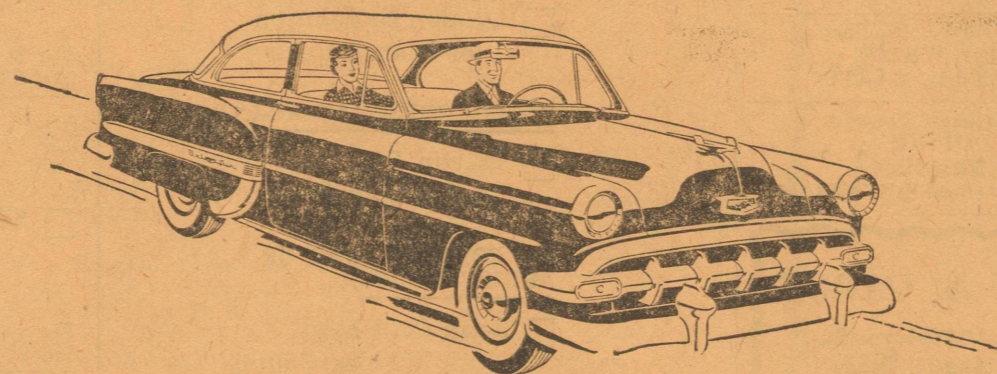

**ATTENTION CALLED TO THE NEED OF BIRTH CERTIFICATE**  
Austin, July 22.—Attention parents!

Now would be a fine time to request copies of birth records for children entering school for the first time in September.

To delay is to risk being caught in the August rush.  
That's the word from W. D. Carroll, state registrar, who remembers with vivid clarity last year's swamped condition in the Bureau of Vital Statistics at the State Department of Health.

Many schools require certified copies of birth certificates as proof that a child is six years old before permitting the child to be enrolled. Carroll advised. But he strongly urged parents to make a personal check with school officials in their areas to determine for sure that birth records are required in those sections.

If they are, by all means make requests for copies of those records early.

“Working with limited personnel, the Bureau of Vital Statistics cannot possibly render the type service expected by those who wait until the last moment to make requests,” Carroll said.

Each application should include the full name of the child, the date and place of birth, and the names of parents. The law says a fee of fifty cents must accompany each application.

Requests for certified copies issued by the state registrar

should be addressed to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas State Dept. of Health, Austin.

How many children will be enrolling in school for the first time this fall? Carroll can't say precisely.

But he does know that some 200,000 children were born in Texas six years ago which, theoretically, would make them eligible for school this year. And most of those entering public school will need proof of age.
