New Restricted Residential Area Planned For Eldorado

Paul Page and Howard Derrick have bought a tract of land from John Conner, and will open a restricted housing project which as yet has not been named.

The land comprises a little over 12 acres, in the northwest corner of the City of Eldorado, west of the new Mertzson Highway which divided the Conner land.

The promoters state that they expect to put in paving and curbs, and then lay off the tract into lots which will be at least 100 feet wide. The original city maps show the land as divided into 50-foot lots.

While leveling, grading, and replanting of the land will start at any time, it is expected that there will be no paving until spring.

Much remains to be done before the lots will be placed on the mar-

ket. Approval of the city on changing the size of the lots must be obtained, and other details worked out with the city fathers. The streets must be named also.

It is tentatively planned to restrict construction to masonry only; there will also be restrictions on minimum cost.

It is expected this new development will encourage building of larger homes there. The location is high, the site is three or four blocks from school, and is already within the City limits.

The promoters state that there have already been several inquiries concerning the lots, but that they will not have them ready for sale until preliminaries have been disposed of.

The owners are prominent young Schleicher County ranchers.

Elders Sell Filling Station Business

After nearly ten years in the business district of Eldorado as proprietor of their own filling station, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Elder have sold out to Clovis Taylor, who assumed charge early this week.

The Elders retained ownership of the building, and Clovis bought all of the stock and equipment, and has arranged with the Elders for a long-time lease. The new name is Clovis Oil Company.

Mr. and Mrs. Elder opened for business in the former John Davis location, now Jones Bros. Station, operating a snack bar also in a small adjoining building for a time.

Eight years ago they bought lots and put up their own tile building which still houses the business.

The Elders are well known in Schleicher County. Mr. Elder has had oil field experience, and Mrs. Elder is noted for her interest in art, in which she has been conducting private classes. At present they have made no definite plans for the future. The couple have three daughters, Patricia, Mrs. Dan McWhorter, and Nancy.

Taylor, who is new proprietor of the business, has also lived here many years. He operated his own station for some time shortly after the close of World War II, then for eight years was employed by Cameron's. He has a wife and two sons and two daughters.

Oil Business Shows Signs of Picking Up; Wildcats Spotted

BRONCOS STAMPEDE OVER EAGLES HERE LAST FRIDAY NIGHT

As had been expected, the Eldorado Eagles fell an easy victim to the Sonora Broncos when they met in Eldorado last Friday night for the Eagles' last game of the season. The Broncos, undisputed champions of District 6A, have another routine district game to play with Ozona tomorrow.

The runaway here last Friday started out with the Eagles delivering the kick-off. The Broncos received and promptly set up a pattern of first downs that brought them up the field and over the goal. This seemed to be the pattern for the play that continued. Before the second quarter was well advanced the score stood 21 to 0 and it was 28-0 at the half.

Along in the third and fourth quarters, Sonora began sending in their second string and it was in the fourth period that Eldorado made its lone tally.

Win Two

In district competition this year Eldorado defeated Eden and Ozona, and lost to Menard, Junction and Sonora. In non-conference games they won over Rocksprings, Big Lake and Iraan, and lost to Melvin.

The general opinion among Eldorado fans is that the fortunes of the Eldorado Eagles will steadily improve for the next two years.

Eldorado Wool Co., Receives Approval for '54 Wool Loans

As a result of the absence of any demand for wool since earlier in the year, it is said that some 18 to 20 million pounds remain unsold in Texas, of which in excess of 5-million pounds is Spring shorn 12-months. Recently, foreign markets, particularly in Australia, have declined violently, which adds to and intensifies the market difficulties in which domestic wools are already involved.

Sources close to the wool trade, not only in Texas, but elsewhere in the nation where wool is produced make the observation that more interest is being developed in Commodity Credit Corporation Wool Loans than in many years.

In Texas, some wools at various points have already been offered to the CCC on a loan basis, and if some open market demand does not develop by the first of the year, a major portion of the unsold wool will eventually find its way into those channels, where it is determined that such wools are eligible and in a condition meeting loan requirements.

The Eldorado Wool Company has been approved and designated as an authorized Handler to receive applications for 1954 Wool Loans and to process such loans when wools have been appraised and approved by representatives of the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Standard Oil Co. of Texas announces the location for an Ellenburger wildcat in this county nearly three miles southeast of Eldorado. It will be known as No. 1 Thad Thomson.

Scheduled depth is 7100 feet. The test will be 1980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 22-A-HE&WT.

The prospector is nearly four miles east and a little north of Wahlenmaier and Williams No. 1 Long, wildcat failure abandoned in the late spring of 1951 at 7511 feet. Ellenburger was topped at 7141 feet.

It is also 1½ miles northwest of Sorrels No. 1 Tisdale, wildcat failure abandoned in the early spring of 1949 at 7026, after topping the Ellenburger at 6701.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 3-C Harris, north stepout to production in the Toenail Field of this county, 20 miles northeast of Eldorado, recovered oil after acidizing through perforations between 5296-302 feet. Swabbing continues. Location is in the 71 A. B. Thomerson survey.

A wildcat scheduled for Schleicher County is Union Oil Co. of California's 6300 foot test, to be drilled with rotary. Location is six miles northeast of this city and 13-8 miles south and a little west of the Huldale South Field, in which there are two wells. It will be known as No. 1 Robert Milligan. Operations are scheduled to begin on the 22nd of this month.

Location is on a 320-acre lease, 660 feet from south and east lines of 71-LL-TCRR. This test is 1¼ miles NE of Eastland and Wahlenmaier No. 1 Cheek, a wildcat failure abandoned in July '49. It is also 5-8 miles west of Union Oil and Lario Oil and Gas Co. No. 1 McElroy, failure abandoned April 15 at 5825 feet.

Another wildcat that appears to be in the making in a short time is a test reported to be located on the NW¼ of Section 160 in the Bailey Ranch area. Section 160 is owned by T. C. Meador and lies to the east of Sec. 177, where Hunt Oil Co., recently drilled their No. 1 Robert Nixon. According to oil property maps, Pure Oil owns the lease on the NW¼ of Sec. 160 where the coming test is to be made.

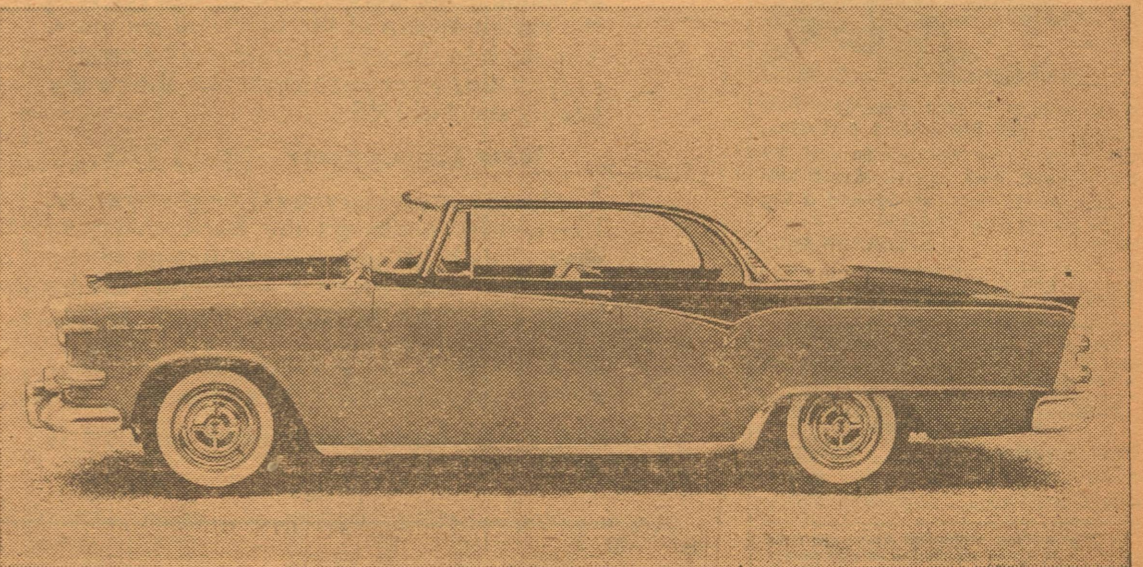
A quarter mile north west extension is indicated with completion of Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 3-C Harris. It is in 1-A. B. Thomerson Survey, 20 miles northeast of Eldorado. Calculated daily flow is 320 barrels of oil, with gas-oil ration of 7300-1.

Potential was based on an actual 15-hour flow of 200 barrels of oil plus 1.6 per cent acid water through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,296-302 feet in 5½-inch casing cemented at 5,368 feet, the total depth. Plugged back total depth is 5,302 feet.

Pay section was acidized with 6,000 gallons. Tubing pressure was 1,400 pounds; with packer on casing.

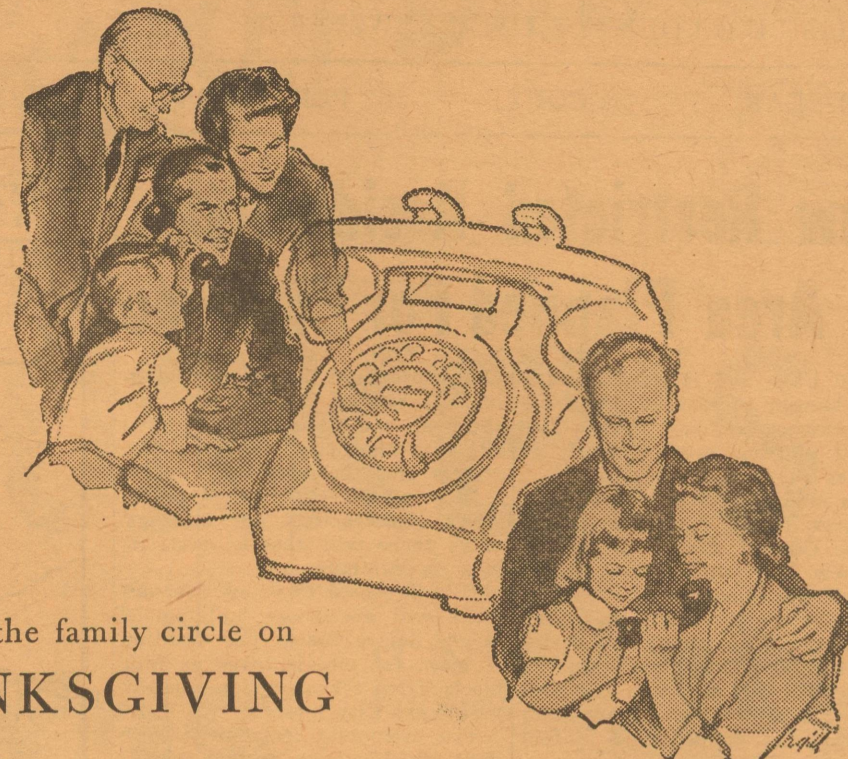
Granny Drives But Won't "Shift"

HOLIDAY TURKEY TO BE PLENTIFUL; PRICE REASONABLE

Turkeys for the Thanksgiving holiday trade will be 10c per pound cheaper for the Eldorado consumer than they were a year ago, according to figures found in the columns of the Eldorado Success for this week a year ago.

On November 19, 1953—a week prior to Thanksgiving, turkey toms were advertised at 59c per pound in Eldorado, and hens at 69c compared with 49c and 59c prices being quoted today.

An abundance of high quality turkeys at lower prices will be ready for holiday dinners this year, according to F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist. The number of birds on the market will be even larger than last year.

The specialist says with the abundant supply, families can afford to be selective when shopping for turkey of their choice. He suggests the shopper look for quality birds, well fleshed and finished and processed to give good flavor. "Don't waste money buying a bird with too much fat," he advises. "Get a bird with enough fat to insure good flavor."

If the turkey has been killed, bled and dressed properly, the meat will look white rather than pink in color and there will be no pin feathers and bruised marks on the flesh. "Ask to see the dressed bird to check for these signs," Beanblossom says.

The trend is to lighter birds—around eight pounds and up—making turkey a practical dish for small families at Thanksgiving and Christmas and for other occasions as well. Buy a larger bird if a home food freezer or other storage for extra meat is available. The turkey will come in handy for later meals, too.

Shopping for high quality turkeys is not only efficient consumer buying, Beanblossom concludes, but helpful to the poultry market in providing the kind of turkeys most in demand.

EARLY XMAS MAILINGS URGED BY POST OFFICE

The Post Office Department is again stressing the early mailing of Xmas mail this year.

Parcels for distant states should be mailed prior to December 11th, to insure delivery before Xmas Day. Xmas greeting cards for both local and out-of-state delivery should be in the mails not later than December 14 for sure delivery by Xmas.

Mail should always be addressed to street and number and where zone numbers are in use, this should also be included in the address.

Xmas cards which are mailed unsealed may go for two cents anywhere within the United States and possessions. This is for greeting cards only and does not include any message in addition to the printed greeting. It is advised that three cent postage be used on all greetings going to an addressee that is not definitely known to be still living at the address given. This will insure forwarding whereas two cent postage does not. Sealed greetings will go for two cents to local addresses within the city but if for delivery to an Eldorado rural route address or out of town three cents will be necessary.

To facilitate handling of greeting cards, patrons are urged to separate and tie out cards for out of town and cards for delivery in Eldorado. These should be handed in to an employee at the window.

Patrons are advised to pack and tie securely all parcels to insure delivery in good condition. On all late mailings we urge you to use special services such as Special Delivery and Special Handling, so that deliveries will be made before Christmas.

How To Take Care Of Fresh Venison

beware! A corps of Texas hunters has taken to brush and mountain-side.

Preservation of the meat after the prize buck has fallen is the practical side of deer hunting, says R. E. Callender, extension wildlife management specialist. Venison is a palatable substitute for domestic animal and is processed similar to beef or lamb, says the specialist.

Bleed and remove the viscera immediately after the animal is shot in the field, he says. Wipe the carcass dry with clean rags and if the animal is shot badly it's wise to wash the inside with water first. In either case, dry the carcass.

The animal should stay dry and be cooled immediately. If cold storage isn't available, prop open the carcass and hang it from a tree to chill at night. During daylight hours wrap the carcass in a tarp or blanket and remove to a shady spot, Callender adds.

He says transport the buck inside the car or in the trunk—not on the fender next to the warm engine. Wrap the carcass for protection, especially from flies.

The thick, plump rounds of the carcass process the best, Callender says. The shoulder, neck and lower portion of the ribs, when boned, make good sausage.

If the processed meat must be transported over long distances it will keep better if frozen solid. But, reminds Callender, frozen meat must always be used soon after thawing.

Health Dept. Head Warns Against Colds

Austin — You catch a cold from a person who has a cold when you take in more of his cold germs than your body defenses can destroy. This is apt to happen when you are tired, and somebody is coughing or sneezing around you, says Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

Avoid taking in large masses of the germs by staying away from the person who has a cold; by staying out of crowded places during a cold epidemic; by washing your hands before you eat and after contact with a cold-infected person, or articles he has handled. Keep your general health high by getting plenty of sleep; by eating regular well-balanced meals and

drinking plenty of water; by getting some outdoor exercise every day; and by letting sunshine and fresh air into your home, office or factory.

Don't lower your resistance by getting too tired, over-heated or chilled. Avoid sitting in dried out, smoke-, dust- or chemical-laden air. Dress according to the weather and the temperature in which you must work.

Go to bed if you possibly can at the first sign of a cold. If you can't stay in bed, get as much rest as possible. Protect others by covering your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze, and by washing your hands frequently, especially before handling food, cooking utensils or dishes.

Don't try to treat yourself. If

your cold symptoms persist or if you develop fever or chest pain, call your doctor and follow his advice.
