

# Soil Conservation **District** News

Ranchers in the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District should start now in preparing to make the most of their future rains. Heavy grazing and the drought have left many pastures nearly de-void of grass and large areas com-pletely bare of any kind of cover. It is these that are going to take

a very long time to come back. Areas which lack cover absorb only a third as much rainfall as grass covered soil. They have greater extremes in temperature making it more difficult for young seedlings to survive. Rain falling on bare soil packs it more tightly, permits at least 2-3 to run off, and exposes it to the hot sun, where it oses what it managed to salvage from runoff to evaporation.

It takes years for this type of range condition to cover itself over with grass. If the rancher doesn't give nature an assist, it may never produce enough forage to pay for itself.



oare areas start should give some thought to giving nature an assist.

There are several effective means of getting good cover on bare flats. The most effective means found to date are pitting and planting these areas and giving them plenty of defermentespecially during the growing season. This is essential in that young grass plants must be given plenty opportunity to survive.

Pitting of bare native rangeland s designed to keep that rainfall where it wil do the most good. It provides a reservoir of moisture for plant seedlings and makes that rain drop go farther. Moisture penetration tests following rainfall have shown that the penetration will be 3-4 times as great in the pits as compared to unpitted areas

a few feet away. A field tour by Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District supervisors J. Forrest Runge, Ben Hext Nov. 5th., observed the results of range pitting at the Weldon Davis Ranch west of Eldorado. Weldon pitted 25 acres of his land the middle of last April and at the same time he planted a mixture sideoats grama, buffel, blue panic, sand dropseed, green spran-geltop, and K. R. bluestem. He had inches of rain since planting and has a stand of grass that compares favorably with the amount of seed planted. As Weldon stated, I've had lots of people tell me there never was any grass on these areas and never would be." He also pointed out that pitting benefitted the organic matter in the soil by keeping plenty of weeds and other growth on the soil for protection and litter. It's this litter that is so essential in holding moisture and providing a seed bed. There was a vast difference in the amount of cover on unpitted and pitted areas. Weldon further said that these areas were costing him money and they aren't producing a thing. So he plans on getting good cover and grass back on his nude areas

The SCD supervisors also discussed mounting the pitting plow on rubber tires so that it could be more easily transported. For any information on your conservation problems contact your local office of the Soil Conservation Service.
