Medallion Approved for Col. Black House

The ranch house of the Black Ranch, one of Schleicher County's first permanent ranches, has been awarded a Texas Historical Building Medallion, according to Millard Cope of San Angelo, member of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. The Medallion is a part of the state program for historical preservation.

The Black Ranch was founded and the ranch house erected by Col. William L. Black before Schleicher County was created. The house is located near the Menard county line.

During the War Between the States, Col. Black, a Confederate, was wounded at Shiloh, and later ran the Union blockade to ship cotton to England. He was captured, eventually released, and became a paymaster in the Confederate Navy. He was again captured and imprisoned at Fort Alcatraz where he kept the prison's books and eventually was pardoned.

Local Officers Named For National Foundation

Ronald Zink, state representative of the National Foundation, was here this week helping local chapter officers organize.

Dan Sebasta is new county chairman, succeeding W. R. Bearce. L. L. Baker is treasurer, Dr. John D. Blackburn is local medical advisor, and C. J. Hahn is to be local director for the March of Dimes campaign, coming up in January.

The National Foundation has branched out in recent years into concern with birth defects and arthritis, after its work of many years with polio.

Land Bank Reduces Interest To Borrowers

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has announced that effective on January 1, 1963, it will reduce temporarily to 5% the interest rate on all outstanding loans which presently bear a rate in excess of 5%. The contract rate on new loans will continue to be 5½% but interest on loans closed on and after December 1, 1962, will be billed temporarily at 5% until further notice by the bank.

In making the announcement, Hal Weatherford, president of the bank, said that of its \$260 million of loans outstanding more than \$100 million bear contract rates in excess of 5% and that the savings to Texas farmers and ranchers by this action will be more than a half million dollars in the year 1963 alone. Weatherford said this is the fourth time the Bank has voluntarily reduced the interest on its outstanding loans.

The Houston bank makes long-term farm and ranch loans thru 73 Federal Land Bank Associations located throughout Texas. The one serving this area is the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora. A. E. Prugel is the manager and the other officers and directors are Frank Bond, pres.; Sonora; Chas. E. Davidson, Jr., vice pres.; Ozona; Pleas L. Childers, Jr., Ozona; B. E. Moore, Eldorado; and James Williams, Eldorado.

Postmaster Carr Urges Early Christmas Mailing

If you have not already done so, now is the time to think about mailing early for Christmas.

Postmaster Bernard Carr today expressed his appreciation for your excellent cooperation so far on his 1962 "Mail Early for Christmas" Campaign. He said, however, that only by stepping up all Christmas card and gift package mailings immediately, will it be possible to process and deliver your cards and gifts by Christmas Day.

The Postmaster said further, "It looks like the Christmas mail this year will set an all time record, so let's not disappoint a single friend or loved one at Christmas time by putting off our Christmas mailings to the last minute."

He offered these good suggestions that are easy to follow—Be sure your return address and the recipient's name and address is plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Always use zone numbers. Avoid abbreviations of state and city names.

Pack your Christmas gifts in strong corrugated cartons. Use plenty of stuffing material to insure safe delivery. Seal packages with heavy paper adhesive tape and tie them with good, strong cord. Be sure to ask about Parcel Post size and weight limitations when you go to the Post Office to buy stamps.

Speaking about stamps, the postmaster said, "Use four-cent stamps on all your out-of-town cards. By sending your cards First Class mail they will be delivered promptly and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on the Christmas card envelope."

Try to get all of your Christmas presents mailed before December 10th. Christmas cards for out-of-town delivery should be sent before December 15th, and those for local addresses should be mailed at least a week before Christmas. The postmaster reminds us that we can make it a merrier Christmas for everybody if we will "Mail Early—and Often!"

Beginning this coming Monday, December 10th, the post office will stay open a half hour later than usual, until 5:00 p.m. Window service will also be provided on the two Saturdays preceding Christmas, December 15 and 22, until 5:00 p.m.

Christmas Eve and Christmas Day are designated as holidays for the post office to be closed; however, Postmaster Carr stated that present plans are for the office to be open a short period on both of those days in order to distribute Christmas packages.

New postal rates are going into effect on January 7th. The increase of concern to most people will be the hike from 4c to 5c for mailing a letter out of town. Other classes of mail are affected, and details will be announced early in January by Postmaster Carr.

Range Management Meeting Coming Up

L. Huss, and outstanding personnel of the Soil Conservation Service. Two topics covered in this session will be "Financing Range Improvements" and "Ranching with and without Conservation."

Hotel Friday at 8:00 p.m. Featured will be awards to outstanding ranchers and students, as well as an appearance by Miss Mohair of the Universe, Miss Nancy Friend of Ozona.

The Saturday morning session will begin at 9:00 a.m. and will include papers and speeches by outstanding students of the colleges in Texas with curricula in range management—Texas A&M, Texas Tech, and Abilene Christian College. Several other papers, one of which is "The Screwworm Program," will be presented.

Saturday afternoon the 12th Annual Meeting will conclude following talks by several professors and Soil Conservation Service men, as well as a talk by Foster Sims Price, Sterling City rancher.

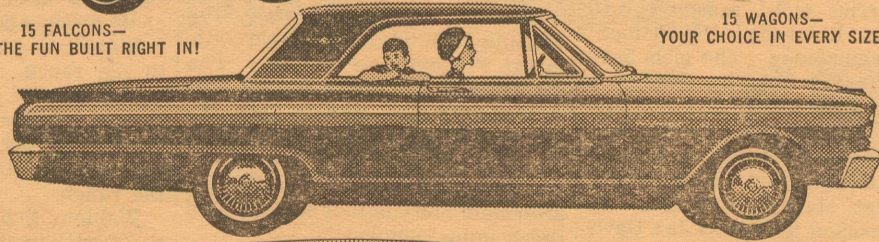

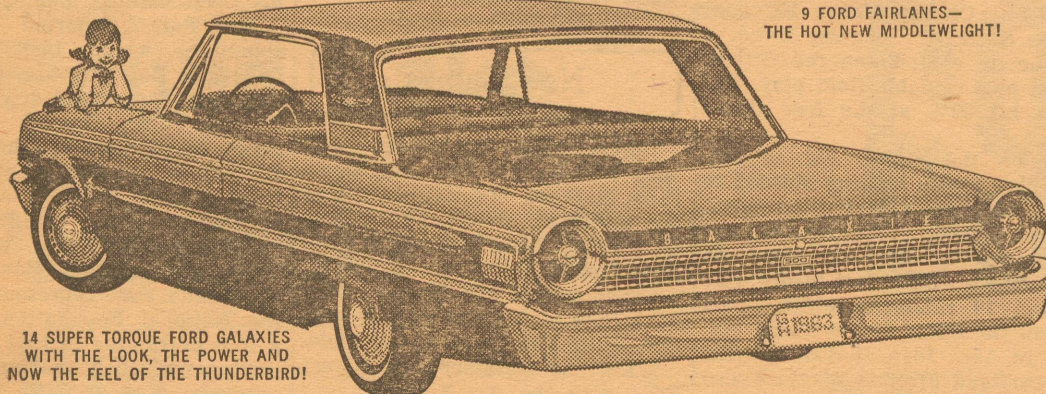

Cuban Crisis Brings Up Question Of Draft Status

Austin.—During and since President Kennedy's proclamation of arms quarantine around Cuba, and the resulting emergency period, some men who have no legal obligation for draft registration or military service have been asking draft boards about their "obligation."

If you were born on or before August 30, 1922, you are not registered with a draft board and you have no legal obligation to register. Furthermore, you have no responsibility to keep a draft board advised of your current address.

If you were born after August 30, 1922, you are legally required to be registered, unless you are not yet 18 years old.

If you are registered and have reached the age of 35, you are no longer liable for military service under present law; but you are still obligated to keep your local board advised of your current address.

Some men are no longer liable at ages 26 and 28. At these three ages, where a man is no longer liable for service, he is classified V-A, and the little classification notice he is required to carry in his pocket is so marked.

An increasing number of people are asking draft boards for the meaning of the Selective Service classifications. These follow:

I-A: Available for military service.

I-A-O: Conscientious objector available for non-combatant military service.

I-C: Member of the armed forces, Coast and Geodetic Survey, or Public Health Service.

I-D: Qualified member of the armed forces reserve, or student taking military training, including ROTC and accepted aviation cadet applicants.

I-O: Conscientious objector available for civilian work contributing to maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest.

I-S: Student deferred by law until graduation from high school or attainment of age 20, or until the end of his academic year at a college or university.

I-W: Conscientious objector performing civilian work in the national interest, or who has completed such work.

I-Y: A man qualified for military service only in time of war or emergency.

II-A: Occupational deferment, other than agricultural and student.

II-C: Agricultural deferment.

II-S: Student deferment.

III-A: Extreme hardship deferment or a man with child or children. Any man who prior to August 25, 1953, had a child or children and lived with them in his home, and so advised his board, is eligible for Class III-A. Any man who acquired a child or children on or since August 25, 1953, is not eligible for Class III-A because of them, unless military service would result in extreme hardship to them, or certain other dependants.

IV-A: A man with sufficient prior active service, or who is a sole surviving son of a family of which one or more sons or daughters already have died in line of duty in the armed forces.

IV-B: Certain public officials deferred by law.

IV-C: Deferment of certain aliens.

IV-D: Minister of religion or divinity student.

IV-F: Physically or mentally unfit or morally unacceptable.

V-A: Over the age of liability for military service. If a man receives certain deferments resulting in classification in Classes I-D, I-S, I-Y, II-A, II-C, III-A, IV-B, and IV-F before he is 26 years old, his liability for military service will be extended from age 26 to ages 28 or 35, depending upon the deferment received.

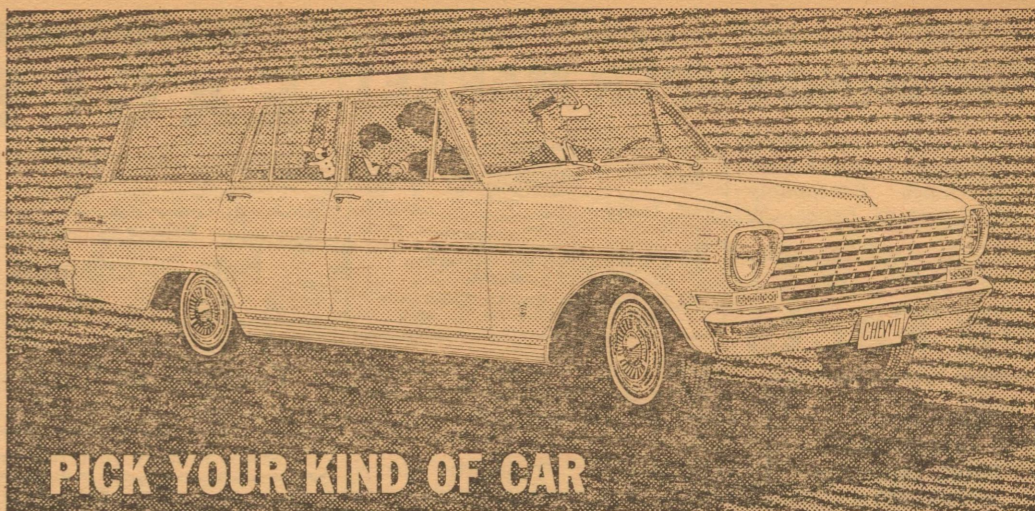

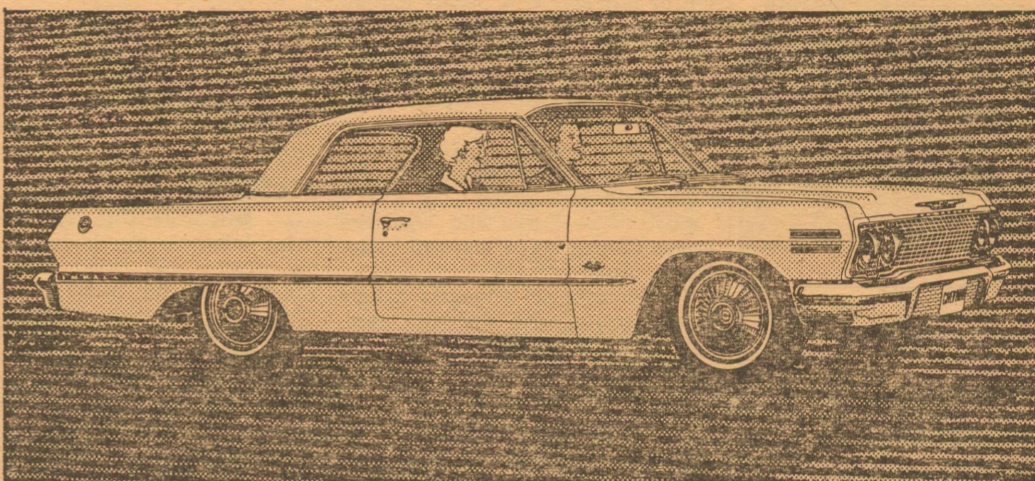

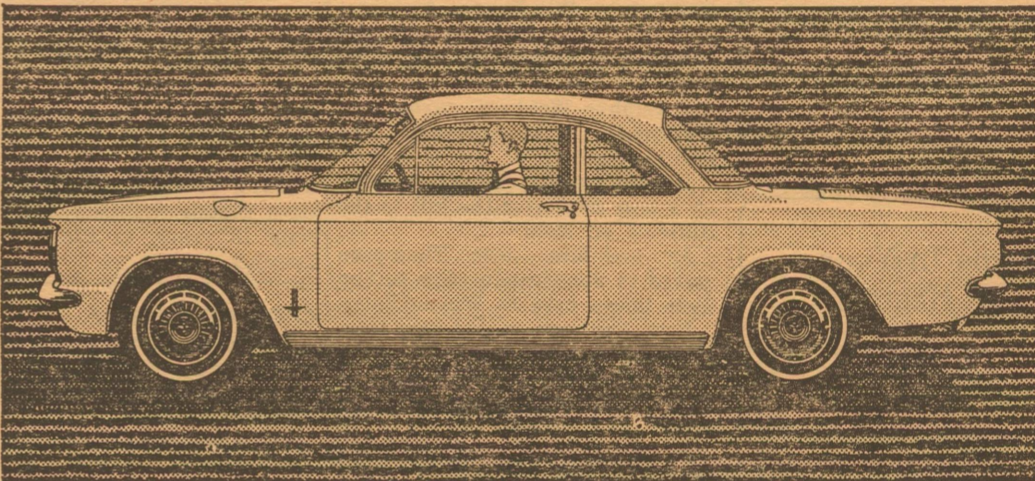

County Extension News

W. G. Godwin, Co. Agent

December 11 is an important date for all county cotton growers. On that date, growers of the county, state and nation will vote on whether they want to continue to use marketing quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop.

If two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum favor quotas, they will be in effect on the 1963 upland cotton crop and marketing penalties will apply to any "excess" cotton produced on a farm and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 per cent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with acreage allotments.

On the other hand, if more than a third of voting growers oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas or penalties applicable to the 1963 cotton crop, and price supports will be 50 per cent of parity to those farms complying with acreage allotments.

Allotments are not affected by the referendum. They will remain in effect whether or not quotas are approved.

All producers are urged to vote at the ASC office December 11th. Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m.

It will take financial support from all producers spraying, inspecting livestock regularly, treating of screwworm cases, and the collection and sending in of screwworm cases. It is most important during the mild weather that we are having that all producers continue to send in screwworm cases, because the animal health research foundation must know the situation by ranches in each county to do the most effective job on an allotted budget. Timing of the release of flies is very important.

Let's all co-operate and when the screwworm battle is licked, and it will be, for the methods used have been proven, then the foundation can turn and give full attention to eliminating some other costly livestock pest or disease.

Travel broadens the mind of some people. For others it merely lengthens their conversations.

The hunting season is the best ever in the county, with most all hunters having grand success, bagging many fat deer and many turkey.

There are five factors that effect the life of deer and man has and still is contributing to these factors: namely (1) the eradication of predators, (2) the elimination of the screwworm which up until '62 took approximately 80% of the fawn crop, (3) severe winters, and (4) drought, and (5) cover shortage.

Reduced to an economic fact, deer are living longer and eating more. To support deer population 6 pounds of green feed must be available per 100 lbs. of live weight.

Austin.—Twenty changes in the state's two per cent sales tax are recommended by the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy.

Some changes would result in decreased revenue and some would mean an increase. But the total outcome of a legislative put-and-take would produce an additional \$10,500,000 a year from a tax that is expected to bring \$170 million into state coffers this year.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas is chairman of the commission. Other members are Hugo H. Loewenstern of Amarillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin; Senators Louis Crump of San Saba and Jap S. Fuller of Port Arthur; Representatives Charles Sandahl of Austin and Charles Wilson of Trinity.

Parkhouse predicted that if spending in the next biennium is in line with the present level, no additional taxes would have to be levied.

A large addition to income—if recommendations are adopted—would come from applying the state sales tax to motor vehicles sales in place of the selective excise tax now levied on vehicles.

Commission recommended repeal of the exemption of farm machinery and equipment, but suggested that feed for farm work animals; herbicides, defoliants and desiccants, and all fertilizer sales be exempt.

Some other recommendations were:

1. Apply sales tax to all clothing sales, which would up revenue \$10 million a year.

2. Exempt vending machine sales of less than 25 cents, and all sales of less than 25 cents for retailers who derive 50 per cent of receipts from such sales.

3. Exempt sales made to state banks, since sales to national banks are exempt.

4. Exempt all sales of alcoholic beverages.

5. Permit grocery stores to pay sales tax in proportion to purchases of taxable & non-taxable items. Grocers with annual receipts of less than \$100,000 would pay sales tax on the assumption that 85% of receipts are from exempt items.

Election Changes

The Election Law Study Committee released a 221-page report on proposed changes in Texas election laws.

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, chairman of the committee, said the main goal is to remove conflicts and deficiencies from the present code. The more palatable suggestions will be included in one bill for legislative consideration. More controversial items will be presented separately.

Public will have a chance to challenge the proposals on December 6 and 7 when an open hearing will be held in the Senate chamber. Committee also will hold hearings at that time on a voter registration

law and a proposal to change the dates of primary elections.

Some of the 120 proposed amendments concern:

1. Having voters check preferred candidates on paper ballots, instead of scratching those opposed.

2. Requiring write-in nominees and runoff candidates to pay the same fees as other candidates.

3. Fining voters who cast a ballot in one party's primary and then vote in the runoff of another party.

4. Requiring campaign expense reports by newspapers, magazines, billboards, printers, radio and TV stations, on all advertising contracts.

5. Requiring all voters over 60 years of age to get annual exemptions.

6. Permitting different parties to hold primaries in the same building, as long as there is no means of direct passage between polls.

Run At Standstill

The "run rate" at Gatesville State School for Boys has been reduced to zero since September 4, when the new \$2,000,000 Mountain View School for serious offenders was opened.

School was dedicated last Saturday in a public ceremony featuring an address by Gov. Price Daniel.

Weldon Brewer of the Texas Youth Council said the "run rate" has been cut down gradually over the past five years.

In 1958-59, when the average monthly population at Gatesville was 1,115 boys, there was a monthly average of 51 escapes. In 1959-60, with 1,197 boys, there were 44 escapes a month. In 1960-61, with 1,364 boys, there were 31 escapes. In 1961-62, there were 1,502 boys with only 24 escapes.

Since the 200-plus inmates most likely to run were moved into the double-fenced Mountain View campus, there have been no escapes.

"A walled home may seem cruel to some people," Brewer remarked. "But it's a very humane arrangement when you realize that the boys within are able to take part in a training program and group recreation."

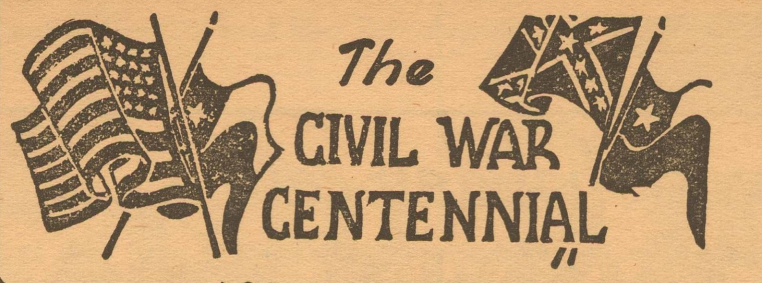
Before the new school was opened, the boys who broke out had to be confined to a small room.

Guards on Gatesville's 40 acres do not carry guns.

Bracero Calls Down

Texas cotton farmers reacted to a U. S. Department of Labor wage standard of 70-cents an hour, for braceros hired to chop cotton, by resorting to almost exclusive machine harvesting.

While 45,000 Mexican contract laborers were hired in August of 1961, only 16,000 were used in August this year, and they also harvested vegetables and grain.

This department has been notified by Gen. Donald A. Ramsey, commander-in-chief of the Confederate High Command, that Pickett's Charge will be commemorated in befitting fashion during the centenary of the Battle of Gettysburg next July.

The commemoration will be in the form of a flag ceremony with Confederate forces beginning their "charge" where Pickett's began a century ago. They will cross the Emmitsburg Road and march upward to the stone wall which has been called by many "The high-water mark of the Confederacy" for it was here that Pickett's charge faltered and his men fell back. After crossing the stone wall, the Confederates will meet the men in Blue and the two groups will then march to the visitors center on the Gettysburg Battlefield where the flags will be presented to the United States Department of the Interior, National Parks Service.

Some fifty regimental flags will be carried in the "march" as the re-enactment has been styled. Each will have five or more color guards from the 300 or so members of the Confederate High Command.

To make the observance more realistic, Confederates will camp on the Gettysburg Battlefield where Pickett's men bivouaced a hundred years ago. Tents are to be provided and meals will be served on July 2, 3, and 4. On the nights of July 2 and 3, special programs

of Civil War music are planned for the Confederates featuring Marijohn Wilkin, a Texan whose album "Ballads of the Blue and Gray" has been a best seller, and Merle Kilgore, author of the famous television theme song for "Johnny Rebel."

The re-enactment has been approved and scheduled for the One Hundredth Anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg and Lincoln's Gettysburg Address Commission

and the National Park Service, but the idea originated with the Confederate High Command which will be a major participant in the observances.

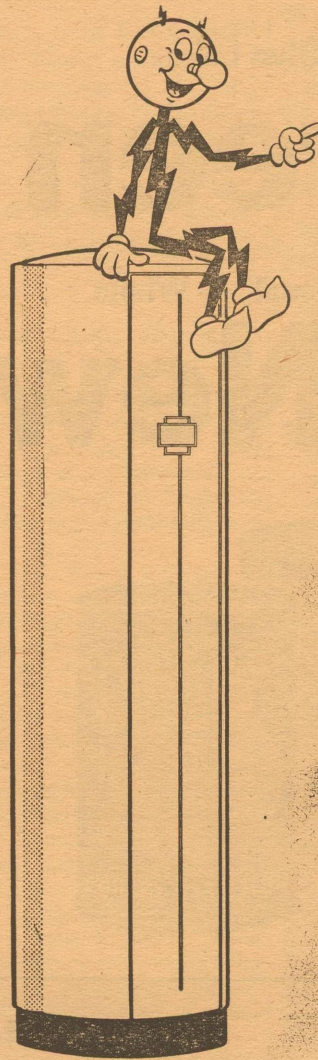
It has been estimated that about 100,000 persons will witness the "charge", whose proceeds will be given to the Gettysburg Battlefield Preservation Association. The Association is dedicated to the reclamation of land on which the battle was fought but which is now in private hands.

Recommended Reading For This Week: Much of the literature of the Civil War is of the non-fiction variety, but occasionally there comes along a novel or two worthy of the attention of those who enjoy and appreciate the romantic side of the conflict. Such novels are *Unvexed To The Sea* by Gerry Morrison, published by St. Martin's Press; *Weep No More* by Janet

Stevenson, published by Viking Press; and *Theirs Be The Guilt* by Upton Sinclair, published by the Twayne Publishers.

Unvexed To The Sea is a stirring novel of the Vicksburg campaign reminiscent of the famous novel of the Atlanta campaign called *Gone With the Wind*. *Weep No More* rescues from oblivion a true Civil War character, Elizabeth Van Low, called "Crazy Bet" who risked her life as a spy for the Confederacy. *Theirs Be The Guilt* is a recent re-publication of Upton Sinclair's *Manassas*, first published in 1904.

And an old standby novel of the Civil War period which can still be purchased from the publisher, Charles Scribner's Sons, after nearly 20 years is *So Red The Rose* by Stark Young. Brought out in 1934, the book is a masterpiece of literature even compared with today's newer novels of the same period.



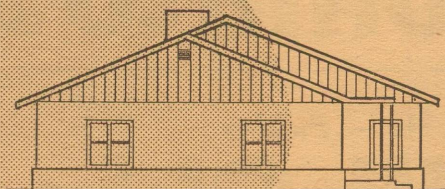
