Double-Header Polo Games Scheduled Tomorrow Night

ABSENTEE VOTING UNDER WAY SINCE FIRST OF THIS WEEK

Absentee voting in the First Democratic Primary scheduled for July 28 started Monday of this week in the office of Patton Enochs, county and district clerk. Previously the ballots were delivered by Success printers to Edwin Jackson, county Democratic chairman.

Any qualified voter who expects to be absent July 28 may vote absentee, it was stated. Ballots also can be mailed to students and servicemen who are considered residents of the county, and who are otherwise qualified to vote.

Deadline for absentee voting is July 25, which is three days prior to the day of the Primary.

Schleicher Field Gets Extension

The O'Harrow (Canyon) field of Schleicher County has been extended one location south and west with completion of Ashmun & Hilliard, Ltd., of Midland and Fortune Drilling Corp. of San Angelo No. 1-J O'Harrow, in 55-1-GH&SA, 15 miles northeast of Eldorado.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 108 barrels of 39.5 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 600-1. Production was through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 4,782-4,794 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing cemented at 4,916 feet on total depth of 4,964 feet.

Top of pay was picked at 4,762 feet on elevation of 2,413 feet. Pay section was washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

Tubing pressure was 200 pounds, with packer on casing.

FIELD DRAWS STEPOUT

Southern Minerals Corp. has filed application to drill its No. 4 V. J. Powell one location north and east of production in the Tillery (Pennsylvanian sand) field of Schleicher County, 3 1/2 miles northwest of Fort McKavett.

The project will be drilled with rotary to 3,800 feet. Ground level elevation is 2,241.30 feet.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 444 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of the south half of 3-A-AB&M survey.

The project also is one location south of Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 2-B Powell, which has set casing for completion.

Attendance May Pick Up; Four Churches Air-Conditioned

If the temperature has anything to do with church attendance, the total should pick up from now on — four of the city's major churches have air-conditioned their sanctuaries.

First Baptist is the only one of the four with a refrigerated system. Two Carrier 5-ton units have been installed in the auditorium and were used for the first time at the Murchison funeral last week, and again at all services Sunday. The members report the sanctuary comfortable and pleasant, and are pleased with the system.

The Eastside Baptist Church has the distinction of having the first air-conditioning, beating the others by many months. The air-conditioning ducts were installed in the auditorium and in all of the classrooms on the two floors when the church was built last year and only after the opening of the con-

Conditioners were in operation. Ducts from the two conditioners carry in the air and distribute it throughout the building.

Two air conditioning units have been in operation about a month at the First Presbyterian Church. There are two 6500 units with short ducts. Both units enter at the basement and open through vents in the floor above. It will be possible to air condition the sanctuary and the basement at the same time or separately as need arises.

Methodists barely got their large unit in operation in time for services Sunday. The unit has 15,000 cu. ft. capacity, and cooled air enters at the front of the church through three vents. It was in operation Sunday for all services and has been pronounced very satisfactory. A little work, such as installing the grills over the duct openings, remains to be done.

CORRAL ROOM IS RE-DECORATED; PROJECT FINISHED

Under the leadership of the Home Demonstration Clubs of the county, assisted by the civic clubs of Eldorado, the Corral youth room in the basement of the Memorial building has been renovated and improved.

One of the principal features of the project has been the installing of acoustic boards on the ceiling to improve the sound in the room. The project includes completely renovating the walls and furniture and cleaning and repairing the interior.

It is explained that the room is to be used by various groups in addition to the young people. Through arrangement with the county judge, children's parties, club meetings and other gatherings may be scheduled to be held there.

Mrs. Vida Kreklow, county home demonstration agent, supervised the work, and the young people donated many hours of labor toward it.

Building Burglarized; Co-Op Wire Is Stolen


Gaining entrance by prying off a hasp on the rear door, burglars Monday night entered the building owned by Carrol Ratliff next door to the Success office, and made off with a number of coils of copper wire belonging to the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op. The building has been rented by the Co-Op for the past several months for storage of supplies. Co-Op employees discovered the loss when they came to work Tuesday morning.

Also missing at first was the Co-Op's own 1 1/2-ton Ford truck, which had been parked in the building the day before, and which the burglars had used to carry the wire coils out. The truck was discovered later Tuesday morning near the city dump, and was undamaged.

Co-Op officials estimated the loss at about 2,000 pounds of wire, which cost about \$1200. The loss was not covered by insurance, it was stated.

Officers were investigating.

"It takes nothing but rest," stated Mr. D. C. O. Wilson in discussing the grass fattened lambs he shipped out June 6. Mr. Wilson, whose Carolina Ranch lies a few miles west of Fort McKavett, was referring to the deferments he had given his grassland the past few years.

He says, "It doesn't take much rain if you have rested your grass to get it started. You have to have a good cover on the ground first." The Wilsons, of course, know that it takes proper use and sound management along with rainfall to get good improvement in their grasses.

Mr. Wilson is a far sighted conservationist. A few years ago he compared his grass with what he remembered it to be like as a boy. It was then he decided to do something about it. Wilson became a cooperater with the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation district in 1949, and has coupled the complete deferment of his ranch with light stocking in other years to gain the improvement in vegetation he has today.

Mr. Wilson is assisted in the operation of the ranch by his son-in-law, Walter C. Pope. They have often been discouraged by what seems to be a nearly complete lack of rainfall. But, drought or not, they have achieved considerable improvement in grass the past six years.

In September 1955, they purchased 250 cut back ewes and 120 cut back lambs. The lambs weighed 43 pounds and of the ewes Mr. Wilson says, "There wasn't a smooth mouth among them."

On June 6, 1956, they shipped their sheep out. The lambs were

held without water 24 hours and weighed 97 pounds. They had previously sheared 6 1/2 pounds.

The ewes sheared an average of 7 1/2, and produced a 128% lamb crop. The ewes were sold by the head.

Last November they purchased 320 Hereford and 60 Angus calves. Most of the Herefords came from Foster Brothers at Sterling City, and the majority of the Angus from Hargraves at Paint Rock. When purchased the Herefords weighed 535 and the Angus 420. They estimate the present weights to be 700-750 and expect a daily weight increase of at least a pound.

The gains on all of their livestock have been made without supplemental feeds of any kind.

Wilson and Pope will tell you the number of stock on the ranch is small in relation to its size. They say it's just a drop in the bucket when compared to the operations on other ranches.

They know the same gains could have been made on a larger herd of livestock. Their plans, however, were to gradually restock the ranch to its capacity. The livestock program last year was directed toward finding what results could be secured under the present rainfall and range conditions. Light stocking with regular deferments will be the rule for the immediate future. They are still striving for additional improvement in their grasses.

Wilson's livestock program this past year confirmed their belief that sound range management is the key to success in the ranching business. They have found that range management provides them with plenty of feed during drouth, and that maintaining a good cover on the ground is the main element of survival for the livestock operator.

The old grass and litter cover on their soil has a dollars and cents value to them. The better the ground is covered the greater the rainfall they can handle without excessive runoff. Good grass and plenty of it provides them with the maximum return on each pound of beef or wool produced. They foresee year around grazing for all of their livestock. The annual feeding of livestock is not included in their program.

They are very pleased with their results, so far.

Soil Bank Program Gets Under Way

College Station. Soil Bank Acreage Reserve agreements are now available for signature in county ASC offices, R. G. Shrauner, chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, has announced. Farmers may obtain full information there on how they may participate in the Acreage Reserve part of the Soil Bank this year.

"The Acreage Reserve is the first part of the program to get into operation for 1956," the chairman explained. "While farmers may sign an agreement anytime before July 20, those who want to participate in the program should call at the office soon. Ask about the last date for plowing or disking a cotton crop in order to reduce

the acreage below the farm allotment."

Besides permitting farmers to incorporate into the soil, by plowing or disking an acreage of cotton within the allotment, the 1956 Acreage Reserve contains several other special provisions which enable farmers to take part in the program this year.

Thus, a farmer may earn a payment for underplanting cotton if he can certify that he underplanted either in anticipation of complying with the program or because of adverse weather conditions and if

he designates an equivalent acreage in the Acreage Reserve; or the farmer may comply with his farm allotment for cotton and earn a payment if he does not harvest an acreage of the crop because of destruction by natural causes. Land placed in the Acreage Reserve must not be cropped, cut for hay, or grazed during 1956. Noxious weeds must also be controlled.

Payments on cotton acreage designated for participation in the Acreage Reserve will be based on 15 cents per pound on either the normal or appraised yield—de-

pending on how the land qualifies under the program, but not less than \$6 per acre for destruction due to natural causes or for plowing or cutting the cotton crop.

In order to participate in the Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank, a farmer must generally comply with all allotments established for his farm.

"Keep The Change"

If you've seen "Mac" Johnson this week, chances are he's told you his waitress story. For those who haven't heard:

"Mac" recently stopped at an out-of-town diner. He ordered the chef's special—and his waitress (brand new on the job) made every possible mistake. She confused the order, spilled the soup, dropped the rolls, brought him a wrong dessert.

Despite it all, "Mac" left a substantial tip. But she smiled and handed the money back. "Keep it, Mister—you've sure earned

it more than I have," she said. From where I sit, that girl deserves credit for admitting her shortcomings — something not everyone is big enough to do. 




