Steps Taken to Provide Vaccination As Danger Of Rabies Threatens County

Threat of rabies in this locality has caused officials to make arrangements for vaccination of dogs, and to set up a place and time for the giving of the vaccination.

City and county officials, including health officers, were alerted this week as word came in that cases of rabies recently reported in Uvalde County have spread as far north as Sutton County. News of the proximity of the disease to Schleicher County has alarmed officials into taking action to prevent serious trouble in this county.

Wednesday, May 11, and Wednesday, May 18, have been set as the dates, and the Eldorado Feed Store is the place, with Bill McCravy and Roy Andrews giving the shots. The cost will be \$2.50 per animal.

It is pointed out that many farmers and ranchers are equipped to vaccinate their own livestock, and in this case they may buy the vaccine (a tag comes with it) and vaccinate their own dogs or other animals.

Eldon Calk, druggist, also is equipped to give the shots and issue tags if it is more convenient for the owner to bring his dogs to his place of business. He also will sell the vaccine to those who wish to administer it themselves.

The fact is stressed that vaccination and wearing of the tag is compulsory (in the city) and that dogs may be picked up and disposed of if they are seen without a current tag.

Those who may have had their dogs vaccinated once upon a time are requested to look at the date on the certificate, to be sure that the year's period of protection has not lapsed. County Health Officer Dr. Wm. Lindsey is backing the city and county officials in their effort to get 100 percent co-operation from all people of the county.

As far as the city is concerned, this requirement is not new—there is already a law on the books requiring vaccination of dogs in the city.

It will be remembered that several years ago, when there was a case of rabies in this county, that facilities were offered for mass vaccination similar to those now offered.

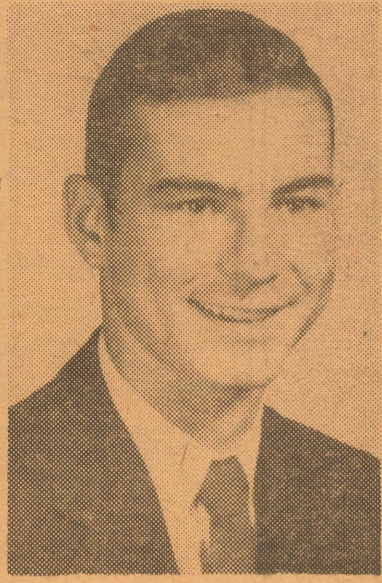

Phone Co. To Rebuild System of Lines In City

Fulfilling a promise made at the time of the rate increase, General Telephone Company is completing plans to re-build their telephone lines in Eldorado to provide a one-party service to every user who wants it.

After weeks of surveying and studying of the maps of the city, five company big-wigs met in Eldorado Tuesday and spent the day putting their final OK on the blue prints.

According to company announcement, work will start by June 1, possibly before. It will include re-building of the entire system in Eldorado.

Because of the heavy telephone load in Eldorado, many residents have been on two and three party

lines. After re-building the lines, the telephone service will include one-party service for all who desire it.

The improvements will be doubly welcome in several congested areas, especially in Glendale, where many were on party lines, and in the neighborhood of Paul Phillips where all of the residents have been on party lines.

The five company men who were here Tuesday were J. P. Willows, divisional plant superintendent, Gordon E. Lane, plant supervisor, John Teague, engineer, who with assistants has been here much of the time for the past month; James Clary, engineer, and C. M. Hines, divisional construction superintendent.

Noted Sheep Breeder To Speak At Sonora

Dr. Clair E. Terrill, internationally known sheep breeder, will speak during the combined field day and ram sale at the Sonora substation May 7. His talk will begin at 1:00 p. m.

Dr. Terrill, who is recognized as a top-ranking breeder in both the U. S. and Australia, is in charge of all sheep breeding work at the U. S. Sheep Breeding Station at Dubois, Idaho, where a breeding flock of about 2,500 ewes is maintained.

Dr. W. T. Magee of the Sonora station, said that of 112 rams tested during this year's progeny-testing work, 45 of the better rams will be sold at auction, following Dr. Terrill's talk. Visitors may spend Saturday morning looking over the performance-tested rams and their individual records. These rams will be offered for sale by the cooperators who retain ownership of the rams, while they are on test. Only the better rams will be sold, Dr. Magee said.

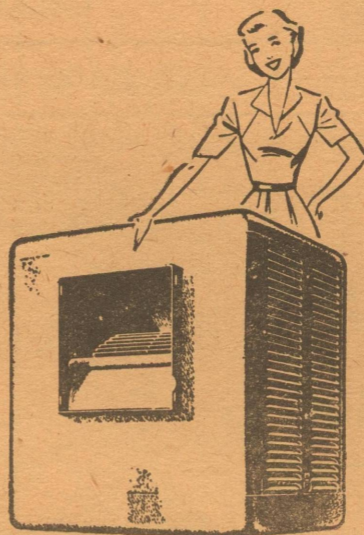

Subject to Senate approval is a two-cent gasoline tax increase, a one-cent per-pack increase in cigarette taxes, plus a tax on cigars, snuff and packaged tobacco. Also in the omnibus tax bill is a levy on trading stamps and uranium ore. A hike in beer dealers' license fees is imminent. Contemplated too is freezing of the present natural gas production tax at 8 per cent—originally due to drop to 7 per cent in 1956.

Labor Legislation
Three bills by Sen. George Parkhouse, all fought by organized labor, moved ahead in the House. The "Ford Motor" bill was softened, then passed, subject to Senate concurrence. It prohibits unemployment compensation benefits to workmen idled by a strike in other plants owned by their employer. It exempts the workman who makes a good-faith offer to return to his job.

Dust Storm Disaster
Alarmed by dust storms, John C. White, Agriculture Commissioner, says "Much of the land in West Texas is in far worse shape now than at any time in history, including the dust bowl era of the 1930s."
Following a tour of West Texas, White made recommendations to the State and Federal governments that steps be taken to remedy the drought situation.
