Wyndell Hall, principal of the Eldorado Elementary school for the past nine years, has turned in his resignation at the local school and announces that he has accepted a position in the Odessa school system. The resignations of Mr. and Mrs. Hall were accepted reluctantly by the school board in a called meeting last Thursday night, and Supt. T. E. Holcomb reported on the action as follows:

"Mr. Hall has been Principal of the Elementary School for the past nine years, and has done a commendable piece of work. The Administration regrets the loss of Mr. Hall, but wishes him much success in his new field. Mrs. Hall has been a teacher in the Elementary School for three years and has done a very creditable piece of work. The Halls will teach in the Odessa school system which offers opportunity for promotion and advantages of a two-year college for their children. Applications are being received and investigated to fill these vacancies."

County Commissioners In Session Wednesday As Equalization Board

In Eldorado Wednesday were representatives of 21 oil companies with property in Schleicher County, their purpose being to appear before the County Commissioners Court, sitting as a Board of Equalization.

The only increase of major importance was that assessed General Telephone, which received over 30 per cent increase in valuation.

It was brought out that there is an increase of around \$250,000 in the value of oil and utilities in Schleicher County, due mainly to the new wells brought in during the past year. There are now 244 producing oil wells as compared with 196 last year. Some of the wells are shut-in gassers and some have a gas-oil ratio which is too high, but there has been a substantial increase in the valuation along that line, because of the new wells.

RURAL ROUTE EXTENSION IS DENIED

Postmaster Waller has received word from the Post Office Department denying extension of Rural Route 1 to serve families in the southeastern part of the county. A petition was recently circulated requesting this extension.

In the Department's letter they stated, "the territory involved does not meet the minimum requirements for extension." This refers to the number of families per mile of route.

"I hope that at some later date these requirements may be met so that an extension can be made," said Postmaster Waller.

Eldorado has only one route, which serves a loop extending into the Reynolds Community.

City Lots To Be Sold For Delinquent Taxes

The second in a series of steps was taken here in district court this week, when the court rendered a verdict in favor of the plaintiffs in the matter of delinquent taxes.

Anyone reading legal notices will remember the first step when local tax gathering bodies—state, county, school, city—published a citation over a month ago against Ben Ellis and others for collection of delinquent taxes on 13 or more vacant lots in the City of Eldorado.

The citation called upon the owners or their unknown heirs to appear in the district court and show cause why judgment should not be rendered in favor of the plaintiffs for these delinquent taxes.

The court has now rendered judgment and the third step will come later when the lots will be offered for sale.

This is the first in a program of clearing up titles and selling lots for delinquent taxes.

Oil News

Fort McKavett Test

Tucker Drilling Co. of San Angelo will drill a 4,500-foot wildcat in Menard County, 12½ miles north of Ft. McKavett. The prospector will be drilled as the No. 2 L. E. Callan.

Location is 660 feet from the north and west lines of 1635-Frank survey.

The No. 2 Callan is also 1 3/8 miles north of the same operator's No. 1 Callan, wildcat failure plugged and abandoned in September, 1954, at 5,830 feet in the Hickory, on elevation of 2,209 feet. The project topped the Palo Pinto at 3,470 feet; the Strawn at 3,870 feet; the Strawn reef lime at 4,050 feet; the Ellenburger at 4,920 feet; the Wilbourns at 5,230 feet; and the Hickory at 5,600 feet.

It logged shows of oil and gas on a drillstem test between 4,215-295 feet in the Strawn reef lime.

Field Extended

The Huldale (Pennsylvanian reef) field of Schleicher County has been extended ¼-mile north with completion of Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 5 Davis, in 55-M-GH&SA, nine miles northeast of Eldorado.

No. 5 Davis is also 3/8 mile southeast of production in the Huldale, North (Pennsylvanian reef) field. It was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 432.02 barrels of 39.8 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ration 660-1.

Production was through a 14/64-inch choke and perforations between 5,625-40 feet. Pay section was washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

Tubing pressure was 450 pounds; casing pressure, 750 pounds. Top of pay was picked at 5,625 feet, on elevation of 2,830 feet.

Prospector Set

F. Kirk Johnson will drill a 4,000 foot wildcat in Schleicher County, 10 miles southeast of Eldorado and 5 1/8-mile east-northeast of the opener and lone producer in the H. A. T. (Wolfcamp) field. The prospector will be drilled as the No. 1 R. M. Thompson Jr.

Contract is for rotary drilling. Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 29-A-HE&WT.

The H. A. T. (Wolfcamp) field opener, Plymouth Oil Co. No. 1 H. A. Thompson Estate, was finaled in December, 1953, for a daily flowing potential of 67.40 barrels of oil through perforations between 3,406-410 feet.

4-H Club boys were well represented at the Area Wool Show held at Junction June 16th. Seven fleeces were placed in the money.

In the aged ewe fleeces Jimmie Whitten placed fourth, Bob Steward fifth, Jim Whitten seventh, and Bob Steward ninth.

In the yearling-ewe fleeces Joe Stanford placed sixth, Mike Moore seventh, and Bob Steward tenth.

The team of Jimmie Whitten, Dick Runge, Mike Moore, and Joe Stanford placed second in grass judging. The total score for this team in this contest was higher in wool and mohair than the state winning team scored in the state contest June 14th at San Angelo, but was good for only third place.

Jimmie Whitten was high individual in grass judging.

The Schleicher County 4-H will exhibit and be represented well in strong competition this week at the Sonora Wool and Mohair show. This team will judge wool and mohair, grass, grass plots, and livestock.

Road Bonds Okayed

Commissioners Court of Pecos County Monday held its regular meeting for June, acting on routine matters of business, and authorizing the issuance of \$240,000 in road bonds which were approved last month by county voters for construction of roads and streets in Imperial, Sheffield and the Ira-an area.

The Court approved a request for designation as a county road of a road in use in the Imperial area for many years, and known locally as the "Pump-Crossing" road. It serves an area between Imperial and Grandfalls. Hal Burnett requested public road designation. —Ft. Stockton Pioneer.

18th Annual Show Is Set Tuesday

The Eighteenth Annual Lions Club Wool and Mohair Show, an all-Texas show for 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters, and adult producers will get under way Tuesday afternoon at five o'clock with registration at the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company warehouse. At that time all entries of wool and mohair must be in the warehouse.

The greatest event of its kind, the show is sponsored by the Sonora Lions Club and is backed by citizens of Sutton County and friends of the wool industry throughout the state.

Over 130 fleeces of wool and

mohair and 30 bags of wool, more entries than ever before, had been received in the wool house as of Monday. A large part of the wool and mohair that is in the warehouse is from local growers. —Devil's River News.

Vacationers back from an 8500-mile automobile trip into Canada and through the Eastern United States are Mr. and Mrs. Will Whitten, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Watson, and Mrs. W. L. McWhorter who made the trip in Mrs. McWhorter's 1955 Cadillac.

The Watsons stopped in Kilgore for a visit with relatives, arriving home Tuesday, the others arriving here the preceding Friday. They had been gone from home five weeks, and during that time had crossed into Canada and back again four times. They had one flat on the entire trip.

While this trip included more interesting cities and places of historical interest, they state that their last year's trip into Vancouver was more scenic because of the mountains and higher altitudes.

They entered Canada at Winnipeg, and touched the entire eastern part of the country, through Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and back toward home through six New England states, with stops at New York City and Niagara Falls.

They stayed most of the time in tourist courts, but if these were not available they found nicely furnished rooms in tourist homes, at which there were signs all along the way.

The men, who had been looking for a place to fish, happened into a fishing village in Nova Scotia, where they found some commercial fishermen with whom they made a trip lasting from 4:30 a.m. to noon. In that time they caught

2000 pounds of fish! They state that it was between seasons for some of the catches, such as lobster.

Incidentally, the five tasted several kinds of fish they had never eaten before, and while they were not too enthused about them, thought the experience enjoyable.

In Canada they found Ottawa, the national capital of Canada, the most impressive of any of the many cities they visited. They enjoyed visiting the buildings of Parliament, built on a spacious plaza, the boat tour around the city and other spots interesting to visitors from the States.

They found that they could get around well with their English everywhere except in Quebec, where they contacted few English-speaking people. Of great help were the road signs and restaurant menus printed in both French and English. They noticed that breads were always served cold, and that drinks were not served with meals!

Interesting to all of them was Prince Edward Island, especially the Anne of Green Gables scenes around which the book was written.

Near New York City, they spent two nights at a suburban tourist court, and took a train into New York where they took a tour of the city. They saw the city from the Empire State Building, and took a ferry trip out to the Statue of Liberty.

Back in dry Schleicher County they remember that it rained on them in varying amounts every day they were gone except six!


PROMPT SERVICE ON

AUSTIN—A luncheon that did not happen in the governor's mansion on Monday had statewide repercussions. It could affect the fate of Texas' Democratic delegates at the presidential convention next summer.

Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler completed a six-day speaking tour of Texas to Houston. It was billed as an effort to restore harmony between the liberal and conservative Texas Democrats.

Mrs. Hilda Weinert of Seguin, loyalist national committeewoman, joined in inviting Butler to Texas. But she boycotted his numerous banquet meetings because, she said, the loyalist Democratic Advisory Council's chairman, Judge Jim Sewell of Corsicana, took over, and froze out contacts with conservatives.

Gov. Allan Shivers invited Butler to a luncheon with state officials at the Mansion, to be held June 20. Butler replied that his schedule was "too tight" but he'd be glad to see Governor Shivers at any city where he was billed to appear.

That angered liberalist John McKelvey of Electra, who had arranged the reconciliation conference of Shivers and Butler in Washington in May. He resigned from the Democratic Advisory Council.

Austin politicians were studying the effect of Butler's speaking tour. Some of them thought there had been considerable "double talk," at Butler's statements could be interpreted to suit any view.

At Waco last week, Butler abandoned the "open door" theme of trying to lure back Democrats who had voted Republican in 1952. He invited the Democratic Advisory Council, his host on the tour, to "organize" the 6,000 Texas precincts with loyal leaders, for next year's showdown.

A significant feature of Butler's tour was that four prospective candidates for governor on the liberal ticket basked in the photographer's flash-bulb limelight.

At Dallas, Supreme Court Associate Justice Will Wilson appeared in his former home city as master of ceremonies at the Butler rally of over 1,000 liberalists. John C. White, commissioner of Agriculture, sat at the head table.

Ralph Yarborough of Austin, strongly rumored as ready for a third try as the governor candidate of the liberals, started out with Butler at Lubbock and showed up at nearly all his meetings. And Senator Jimmy Phillips of Angleton showed up at a Waco rally for Butler. Present also were several other senators who aren't prospective candidates for governor—and half a dozen House members.

Butler's Houston appearance was before the state convention of the Young Democratic Clubs. Virtually all the potential candidates for governor on the liberal ticket showed up there too. White delivered the keynote address at the opening business session and Yarborough also spoke.

Land Office Flaws

A 95-page audit documenting investigations of irregularities in the Veterans Land Board has been released by State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

Cavness emphasized throughout his report the need for additional field supervisors and investigators who can check continually to prevent irregularities in the one hundred million dollar loan program.

The audit covered the period from Sept. 1, 1951, to Jan. 4, 1955 (the last day Bascom Giles was commissioner of the General Land Office and chairman of the Veterans Land Board).

Land Inquiry Shifts

After winding up its sixth week of investigation before Justice of the Peace Travis Blakeslee in Austin, the court of inquiry into over-all operations of the General Land Office moved to Corpus Christi.

Twenty land office geophysical inspectors stationed in Corpus Christi will be questioned there this week.

Rains Boost Crops

Unusually favorable moisture conditions throughout Texas have

brightened the crop outlook considerably, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Feed crops have made good development, according to USDA reports. Corn prospects are promising. Cotton prospects are "very promising."

Rains in scattered areas of central, eastern and northern Texas interrupted the harvesting of commercial vegetables, tomatoes in Central Texas and onions in North Texas.

Crops larger than last year are predicted for cantaloupes, onions, potatoes and watermelons.

Defense Alert

William L. McGill, director of the state's civil defense organization, reports Texas' 1955 "alert" successful and highly realistic.

Had it been the real thing, Civil Defense Co-ordinator R. E. Dysart said, there would have been no casualties in Ft. Worth, but more than one-fourth of Houston's population would have been wiped out. Lubbock would have been a victim. El Paso would have been saved. Also Bergstrom Air Force Base near Austin.

Turnpike Bonds

Biggest issue of "municipal" bonds in Texas history, was sold in Austin at an interest rate fractionally above 1.9 per cent.

Several investment groups joined in buying the \$58,500,000 revenue issue of the Texas Turnpike Authority—first of its kind in Texas—and re-offering them to the public.

The money will build Texas' first toll road, between Dallas and Fort Worth.




Wheat Referendum Is Set For June 25th

The referendum to determine whether or not the marketing quota program will be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop will be held June 25.

Jack Wade, chairman of the Schleicher County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, advises that the referendum will be held in the county ASC Office, now located in the Wiedemann building, west of the court house. Voting hours will be from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Each grower has his farm's 1956 wheat acreage allotment, and has received a leaflet explaining the program operations. Farm allotments are based on a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres, the same as this year.

Chairman Wade explains that if the vote is favorable, the program will be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop, and the price support for the crop in the commercial wheat area will be 75% of parity. The national average support level will be \$1.81 per bushel. A farmer who exceeds his farm wheat allotment or 15 acres, whichever is larger, will be subject to marketing quota penalty equal to 45% of parity on his excess production.

If the vote is unfavorable, the support will be 50% of parity or about \$1.19 per bushel. In either case, only the wheat from farms where the wheat acreage allotment is not exceeded will be eligible for price support.

Chairman Wade points out that at least two-thirds of those farmers voting must favor the quotas if the program is to be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop. If more than one-third vote no, the wheat marketing quota program will not be in operation for the 1956 crop.

In a similar referendum held a year ago, the national vote was close, 208,623 for and 76,023 against—a favorable vote of 73.3% compared with the necessary 66.6 per cent. In Texas, the vote was 10,856 for and 1,299 against.

WHEAT ALLOTMENT for FARMS

Farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for grain for any of the years 1953, 1954, and 1955 may apply for a 1956 wheat acreage allotment, according to Jack Wade, chairman of the Schleicher County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. To be considered for an allotment on a farm which had no wheat seeded for grain for any of those years, the farmer must apply in writing to his county ASC committee by July 15.

Blank application forms are available at the county ASC office for use in filing requests for allotments.




