School Opens Tuesday With Enrollment of 526

A complete faculty, good enrollment, and prospects for a good school year are indicated, as the school nears the end of its first week.

The elementary enrollment the first day, Tuesday, was 305 with 32 enrolling in the colored school. The enrollment in the 7th and 8th grades was 75, and High School was 114. This makes a total enrollment the first day of this year of 526.

Assembly Program

The Eldorado Public School opened Tuesday, Sept. 6th at 9 a.m. with general assembly in the high school auditorium. The auditorium was filled with an overflow of people standing in the hall as the parents, students, and teachers gathered for the beginning of the 1955-56 school year.

Superintendent T. E. Holcomb was in charge of the meeting and Rev. M. C. Stearns gave the invocation. Bob Ratliff led the assembly in the pledge of allegiance. The high school quartet, composed of Dale West, Monetta Bradshaw, Barbara Spencer and Gaynelle Belk, sang accompanied by Mrs. Oliver Teele. Ila Jean Boyer and Willa Higgins gave a saxophone duet accompanied by Francis Parker on the piano.

Joe Andrews, high school principal, introduced the high school teachers and made announcements of interest to the high school students concerning home rooms, division of classes and schedules. He also announced that high school classes will begin at 8:30 each morning with activity period from 11:30 to 12:15. This period will include pep rallies and assembly programs.

Charles Love, grade school principal, introduced the grade school teachers and announced meeting rooms for grade school students for the division of classes.

chairman, announced that the first PTA meeting will be September 20 at 7:30. There were 201 parents and teachers who paid their membership dues in the PTA Tuesday morning.

New Owner Takes Over Oldsmobile Dealership

In a deal which was brought to a close late last week Joe Wagley became the new owner of the Jones Motor Company and is now in charge of the business.

The two parties concerned in the deal spent the weekend inventorying the stock and appraising the equipment, and Wagley was open for business Tuesday morning under the name of Wagley Motors.

Wagley came to this county in 1943 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Wagley, from Dimmitt, where they had ranched and where Wagley attended High School, arriving here in September. The following year he was married, and he and his wife Callie now have two children.

The new owner announces that he will operate the business as his predecessors have done, maintaining sales and show rooms and complete parts and mechanical departments. An experienced mechanic will be in charge of the back room.

Wagley has been active in the work of various civic organizations. He owned and operated an Humble Station several years, then started selling insurance, which business he carried on along with ranching operations, until he made the deal with the Jones Brothers this week.

Joneses Natives of County

John R. and Ray Jones were reared here, and in October, 1931, opened for business in the present Cameron location, purchasing it

from O. W. and Clarence Evans, who were operating a garage and Chevrolet dealership.

Later they moved to their present location. In 1936 they became dealers for GMC vehicles, and in 1937 added Oldsmobile. During World War II, when cars were removed from the market, they closed the business for 40 months, while John R. served as a civilian employee in the ordinance department, and Ray became a member of the Navy reserve. After the war they returned here to re-open the business.

They have been operating their own mechanical department, occasionally employing help. They opened their Olds dealership when there was only one car of this make in Schleicher County and there was not a dealer in San Angelo.

They have built up a good following of customers over the years.

In preparation for selling the business later, the brothers several years ago bought a 1440-acre farm near Drumwright, Oklahoma, to which they expect to move. They also have been disposing of their rent units, the last sale having been to Joe Griffin, who has purchased the Jones renthouse formerly occupied by the Frank Van Horns.

The men expect to rent the business building to the new owner. The Joneses own eight lots in that block, on two of which the building is located.

For county agricultural agent the Court set salary of \$2820 with travel allowance of \$1800, and for county home demonstration agent, salary of \$2500 with travel allowance of \$500, as their part in maintaining these offices.

At their August 22 session the resignation of James Williams as deputy sheriff, tax assessor and collector, was accepted effective Sept. 1, and he was allowed two weeks' paid vacation Sept. 1 to 15. Dwight Wiedenmann was appointed deputy effective Sept. 1 at salary of \$275 per month with \$50 travel allowance.

The same session saw the Commissioners authorize the county judge to receive bids for sale of the county-owned DW10 Caterpillar motor scraper, and D8 Caterpillar tractor; these bids to be opened Sept. 12. It was also decided to accept bids for the labor contract on four miles of FM right-of-way fencing.

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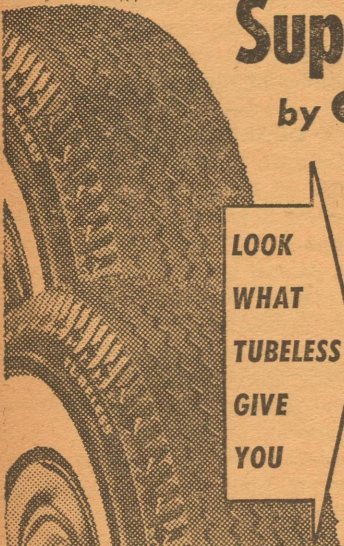
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News From Our Neighbors

The judge stated that the county's valuation for 1955 totaled \$27,400,000, a little more than \$3 million over that of last year. The county's income for the year has been estimated at \$478,299.77. SPOT OILING OF JOHNSONGRASS METHODS GIVEN

Johnsongrass can be killed to the ground by application of 1/3 teaspoonful of a herbicidal oil to the crown of each stem. Eradication of established johnsongrass can be obtained in a single season by repeating the treatment at 7-10 day intervals.

Best results are obtained when treatments are begun before the stems are 6 inches tall and before the stems are glazed. The oil is used most efficiently when it is applied to the lower 1/4 inch of the stem. Treatment of the foliage is unnecessary and wasteful. Six or more consecutive oil treatments are needed to eradicate the grass.

This practice is successful in controlling scattering infestations of established johnsongrass in cotton and most other crops. It is faster, easier, and far more effective than hoeing. Avoid treating the stems and foliage of crop plants. They are susceptible to the oil at the rates used. A careful operator can treat the crowns of the grass as close as two inches to cotton stems without injury to the crop.

Treatment should begin as early in the season as practical. Treat all live johnsongrass each time a field is oiled and do not hoe the crowns that have been oiled.

Many naphtha oils and oil mixtures are satisfactory for the crown treatment of established johnsongrass. Diesel fuel oil or kerosene fortified with 1% pentachlorophenol by volume is usually as effective in killing johnsongrass as the naphtha type oils used alone. A mixture of half diesel fuel oil or kerosene and half naphtha is satisfactory.

Two types of sprayers are satisfactory for crown treatment of johnsongrass. They are: (1) knapsack sprayers equipped with piston type hand pumps and (2) gravity flow sprayers. Knapsack sprayers cost \$25 to \$30 each. A suitable gravity-flow sprayer can be constructed for about \$10.

Naphtha costs about 20c per gallon. Diesel oil and kerosene cost about 13 cents in 500-gallon lots. Bulletins and blueprints for the gravity-type sprayer will be available at the county agent's office in about ten days.

Roads Expanded To Meet Needs of Growing County

With the drouth not yet completely broken and the money situation a little tight, a bright spot in the overall picture here is the growing network of modern roads which lead through the county.

Residents of Schleicher County need to be reminded that ten years ago the only paving the county boasted—and that included the city of Eldorado too—was U S Highway 277. This provided all-weather facilities to Sonora and San Angelo, and that was all.

Gradually the major projects have been carried through to completion, until today five main spokes lead out from the city—to San Angelo, Sonora, Big Lake, Mertzon and Menard.

Here is the story:
The first West Road completed major improvement was the completion of the East-West Highway from Eldorado to Menard, and from Eldorado to the Crockett county line. This now provides a first-class highway east and west.

The election for the Eldorado-Menard stretch of highway was ordered in September, 1945, and bids were advertised in October, 1946, the October 13 bond election having carried. A few weeks later work orders were issued for the first stretch, and clearing of right-of-way began and equipment began to arrive shortly afterward. The first five miles of this west road were topped in May, 1947, bids for the next stretch were advertised in June, 1947, and contract was awarded to Burnham Construction Company of Georgetown, in mid-July.

Cold weather delayed work that winter, but in January, 1948, topping was under way. The Commissioners followed completion of this road with making of plans for extending the road to the west toward Big Lake. In November the first 8-mile strip from Menard was okayed, also a 3.8 mile strip from Menard to Ft. McKavett.

In July it was announced that the next 14-mile strip to the Crockett County line had been okayed, also that a gap of 13 miles in Crockett had been approved.

In early September, 1949, the first 8 miles was being surveyed out, bids were opened January 10, 1950, and an Angelo firm awarded the contract. Fences had to be moved and built and the CoOp had to move some poles.

Three months later this strip was ready for topping. In October contract was let on the next 14 miles—and the entire road to Midway Lane was open by the fall of 1951. Most highway maps now show this road.

Mertzon Highway Next

Talked of for years before it became a reality was a highway connecting the county seat towns of Eldorado and Mertzon. Work on this highway began in 1953 in Schleicher County.

At the other end of the project bids were let in September, 1953. With some delays, this project was carried to conclusion last year.

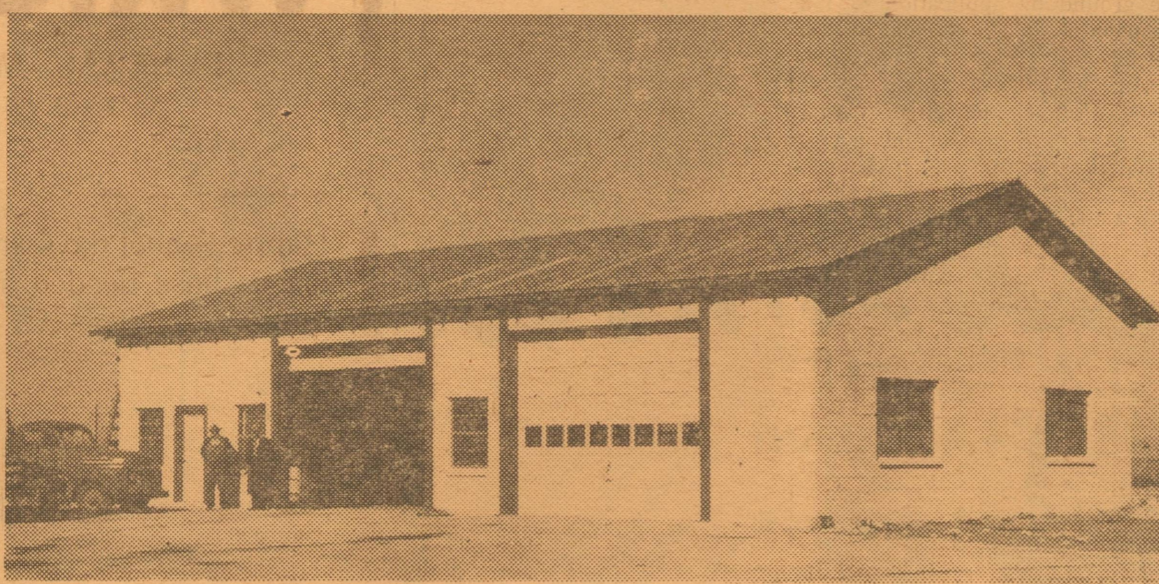
Reynolds Road

Completed this year was the road from the West Highway to the Reynolds school house. Strictly a farm-to-market road, this highway provides an all-weather outlet for many farmers. Remaining to be completed is a link connecting this strip with the new Mertzon Highway.

In 1953 the side road leading into the Hulldale Field was black-topped and other improvements made to provide an all-weather road for oil employees in that busy field.

Busses Need Roads

What sparked the road development may have been the school annexation program, whereby the

school provides transportation for all students in this county, under a county-wide plan.

It became the aim of alert citizens of the county to improve the roads of Schleicher County up to such a point that children could be transported in all kinds of weather. This is now "practically a reality. Not all roads are paved, but most have been widened and caliched.

Development of the road system will continue through the coming two years, according to announcement made by officials. At the Sutton County line, a 9-mile strip will lead northeast to the end of FM 864 at the Menard County line, thus closing a gap.

A new designation is an 8-mile strip into the Bailey Ranch community. It is expected that this paving will be continued west later to provide modern road facilities for others in that part of the county.

A network of roads leads through the oil fields of this county. Such fields as Cooper Gas area (Page), Neva West, Hulldale and Toenail Trail have all-weather roads, most of which have been built by the oil companies.

Schleicher County operates its road work under a county-wide system, with a supervisor in charge. Four new dump trucks were recently added to the county equipment.



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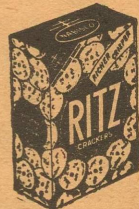
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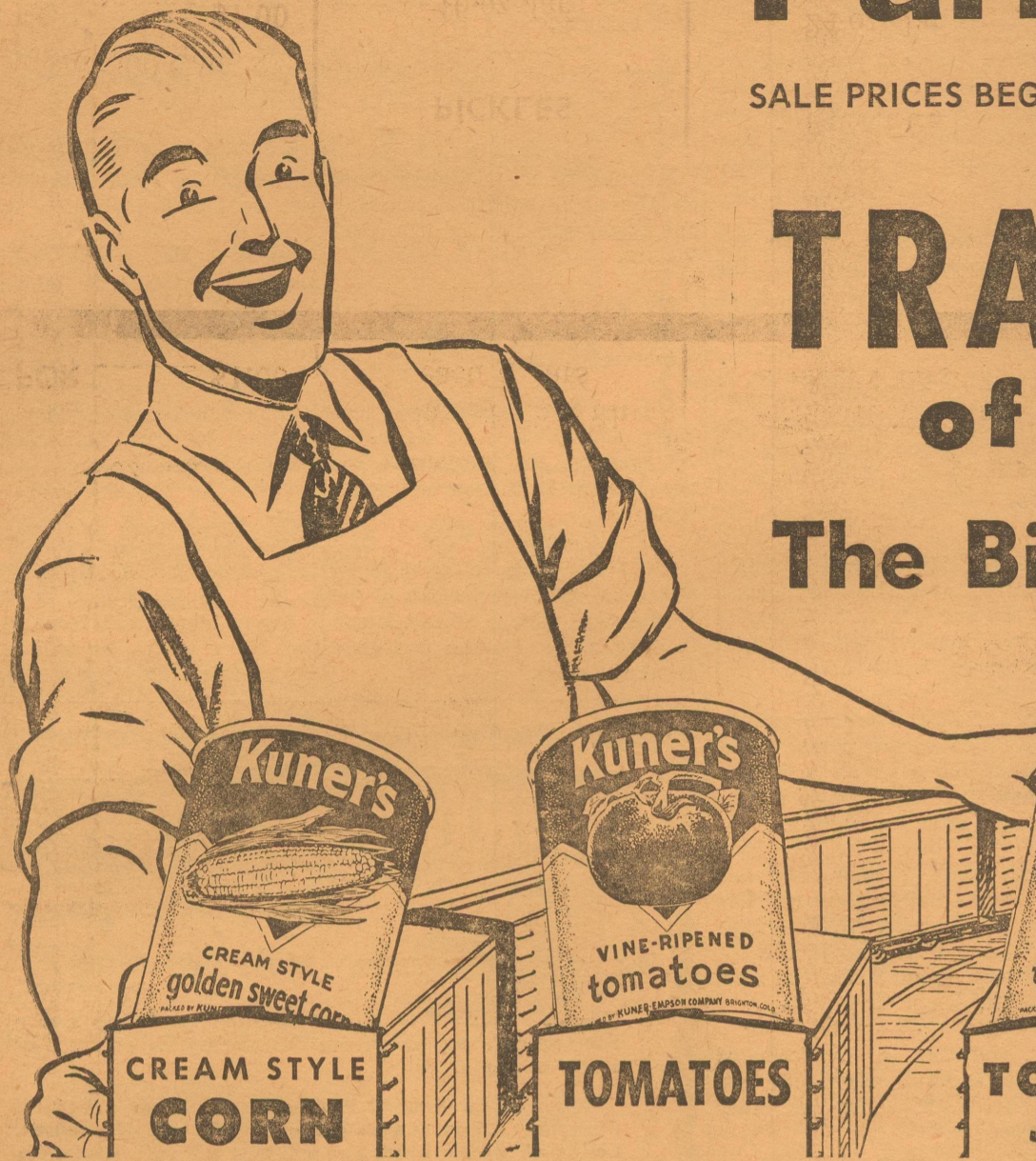
