Teams in the district which have been working for district honors this summer season include Barnhart, Big Lake, San Angelo, Ozona, Miles, Sterling City, and Eldorado.



Reagan Valuation Up

Reagan County's budget for 1956 amounting to \$461,976.50, was approved by the county commissioners' court in its regular session last week, it has been learned from County Judge W. D. Hudson. The judge stated that the county's valuation for 1955 totaled \$27, 400,000, a little more than \$3 million over that of last year. The county's income for the year has been estimated at \$478,299.77. Of this amount the sum of \$406,000 is expected from ad valorem taxes. and \$72,299.77 from fees of office and auto registrations. -Big Lake Wildcat.






