The crusades for morality will occupy the attention of Baptists during the coming 12 months. About 10,000 attended the meetings each evening, and from 3,000 to 4,000 each morning. Delegates were present from all parts of the nation.

An outstanding number was the presentation of a pageant by the WMU, depicting the history of the organization during its 75 years' existence. The program was presented in the Coliseum.

Next Saturday the pastor will leave for Paris, where he will be engaged in holding schools on missions and stewardship in churches in the Paris area.

Special Halloween events included the PTA carnival in the Memorial Building, and the mid-night show at the drive-in sponsored by the Seniors.

Rev. H. B. Reynolds Offers Resignation At Fundamental Church

The Rev. H. B. Reynolds, pastor of the Fundamental Baptist Church since July 1, has decided to enter college for work leading toward chaplaincy in the armed forces. He expects to enroll at Hardin Simmons, at Abilene, for his undergraduate work, after which he will enter theological school. The entire course will require about 6½ years.

Rev. Reynolds expects to remain on the job here until late November, or until the church can find a replacement. He has been in the ministry nine years, coming to Eldorado from Jal, New Mexico.

Said election to call for \$35,000.00 in bonds."

In explaining the uses and purposes of the proposed home, Dr. Pennington this week stated, "The object of the old age home is intended to take care of the old people not able to take care of themselves, and also to take in convalescent patients following surgery or illness."

Proposed location of this facility is somewhere on the courthouse block. The county would be responsible for providing the staff.

Control Of External Parasites Is Subject Of New A&M Leaflet

College Station. External parasites of livestock and poultry are not only a constant menace but also are profit robbers. They lower production of meat, milk and eggs by sucking blood from the animals, transmit diseases and cause loss of energy by annoyance, says Extension Entomologist F. M. Fuller.

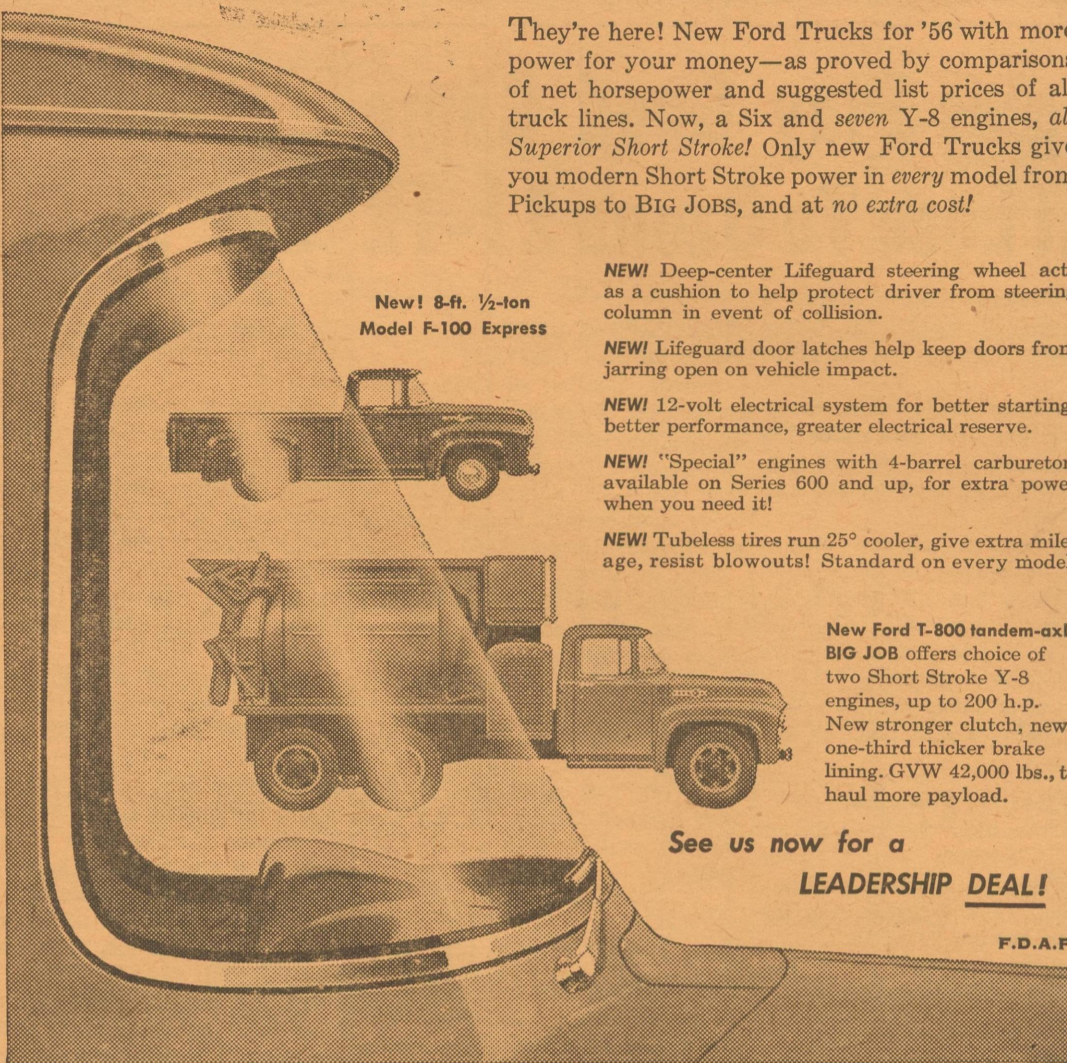
The major external parasites can be controlled by using organic insecticides and Fuller believes there is little excuse for allowing them to exist. He points out that losses caused by these pests can be the difference between financial success or failure for many farm enterprises. With the cost-price squeeze getting tighter, it is just good business management, he adds, to get the insects before they get your profits.

As an aid to stockmen, dairymen and poultry producers, the extension entomologists have prepared a leaflet, "Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" which gives in brief form methods and formulas for doing the control job.

The leaflet is available at the offices of local county agents.

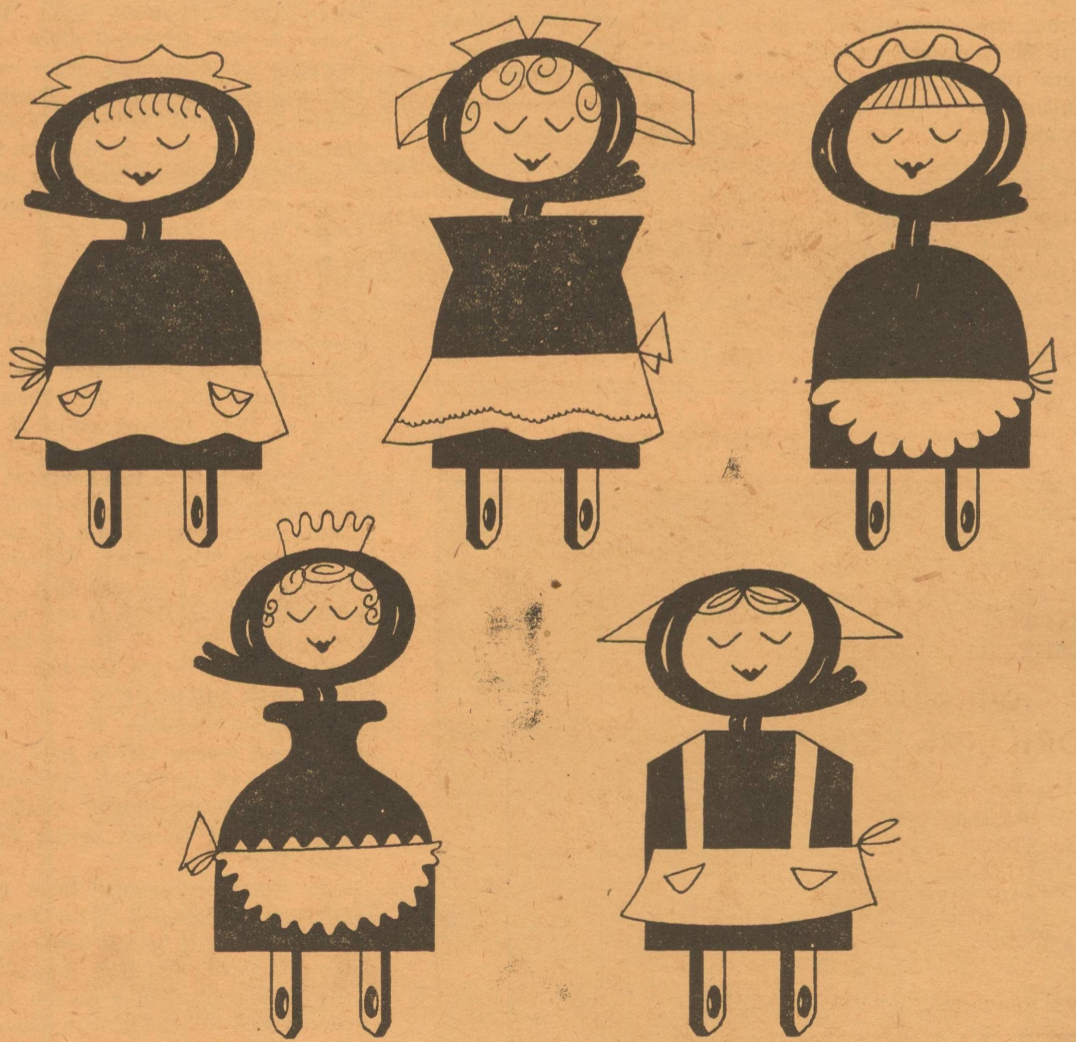

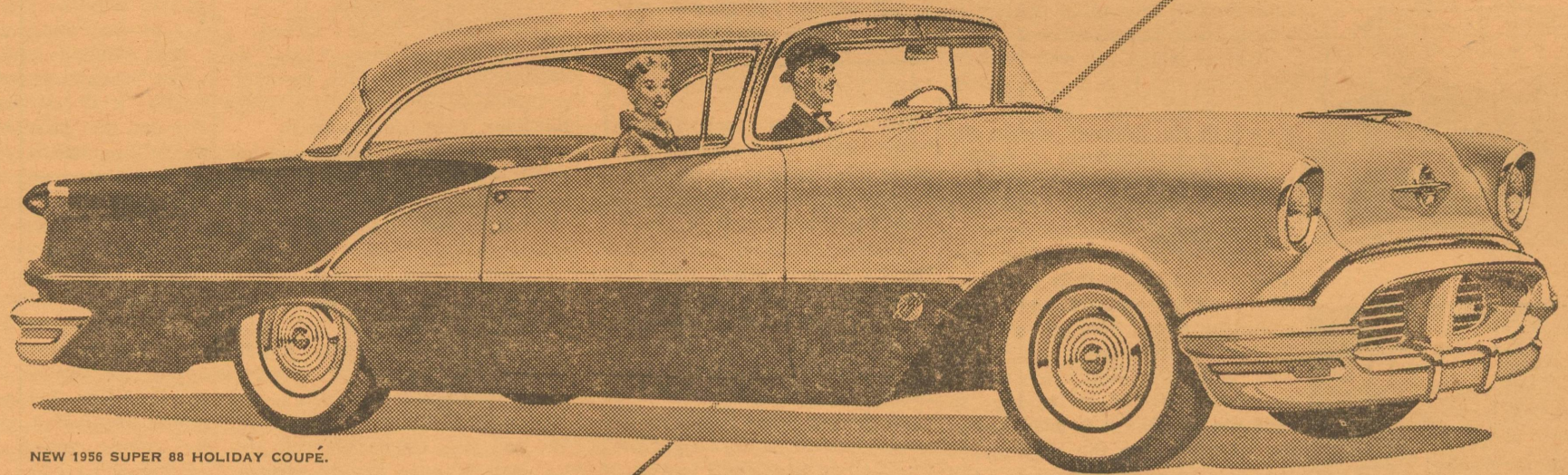

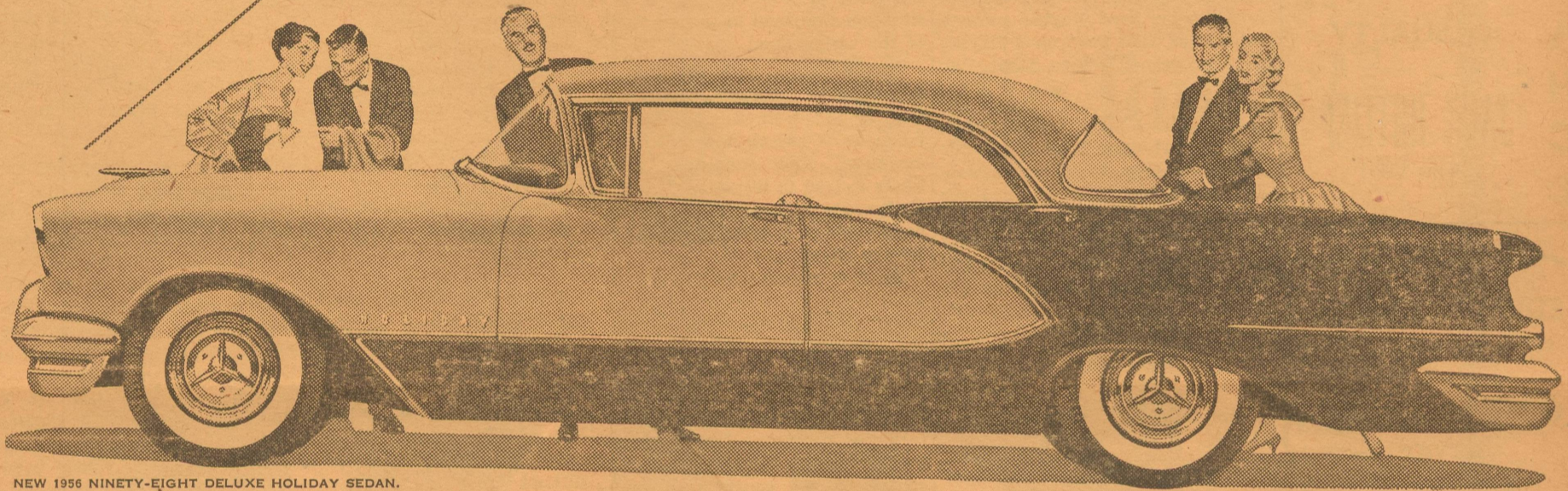

Market-Ready Turkeys Only Should Be Sold

College Station. Quality birds sold in top market condition are the turkeys which please the consumers, says F. Z. Beanblossom, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The number of turkeys to be marketed this fall is not much different from last fall. Retail prices aren't likely to differ much either, says Beanblossom. But, he adds, the competition with turkey marketing agencies in other states for sales in the consuming centers is a concern of Texas producers.

Turkeys which are well feathered, meaty and have a good distribution of fat under the skin are always in the greatest market demand. Rushing turkeys to market before they are properly finished depresses the whole marketing process, explains Beanblossom.

According to the specialist, the ideal market bird is fully feathered on the back, breast, tail and underneath the wings. Few undeveloped feathers in these areas means the bird will pick well. Housewives won't be annoyed by having to pull pin feathers. A good covering of fat under the skin makes the bird easier to process but most important, says Beanblossom, a well-finished bird has eye appeal for the consumer.

Producers can determine the correct marketing data by making careful observations of the entire flock and by handling a few individual birds from time to time. The degree of fatness can be checked by looking at the skin covering the breast, particularly in front of the thigh area, says Beanblossom.

Legal Verbiage Justified

Many persons feel that the "whereases," "aforesaid," and other legal verbiage is used by the lawyer for the purpose of confounding the layman.

Nothing could be further from the truth. In drafting legal documents, the lawyer attempts to draft them in such a way as to exclude all ambiguities. In the last analysis, a legal document means what some court at some future time shall declare what it means. As a consequence, it is the lawyer's duty to his client to attempt to draft the instrument in such a way that it can mean only one thing.

Most any paragraph of non-legal language contains numerous ambiguities. When a lawyer refers to the "deed aforesaid," he is attempting to make it clear beyond question that the deed he is referring to is the deed mentioned in a prior portion of the instrument. Likewise, when he prefaces a legal document with a long list of "whereases" he is simply reciting pertinent facts for the benefit of the court to show the facts of the situation that lead to the execution of the instrument.

The difficulty with drafting a document in layman's language is that to the trained analyst such language is susceptible of several meanings, and consequently is likely to lead to litigation. It is the draftman's purpose to avoid litigation which is usually expensive for the client.

Another reason why lawyers use legal language is historical in nature. Thus most deeds declare that the grantor "by these presents does grant, sell, and convey" the land in question to the grantee. Each of the words recited have a technical meaning. The words together have frequently been construed by the courts and consequently the lawyer knows in using them that their meaning is settled, and that they will operate to properly transfer the title. He would be inviting litigation for his client, if instead of using those words, he devised new language to express the same purpose. He could only say, "While I think the language that I have used will accomplish the purpose, I cannot be sure of it." As a consequence, the lawyer, in the interest of his client, naturally uses the time-tested language instead of experimenting with new language.

Austin, Texas, and possibly the nation, may have a new political group—the "moderates."

Sen. Lyndon Johnson started it when he commented that he was neither a liberal nor a conservative, but that he was a "moderate." Since then the term has cropped up with increasing frequency in comments by leading figures over the state. Governor Shivers has announced that he plans a tour into other states to urge selection of a "moderate" Democratic candidate for President. With a Johnson-for-president move gaining momentum, Shivers commented, when asked if Sen. Johnson fitted the middle-of-the-road pattern, that he seemed "more moderate than extreme."

The Governor emphasized that he will not be working for any specific candidate on his tour. He also has no view, he said, of trying to form a "coalition" of Southerners, as has been suggested. "I hope to get into the West, the Middle West and possibly the East," he said.

Creeping Harmony

Harmony in the Texas Democratic Party moved slowly. Speaker Sam Rayburn, leader of the liberals, has demanded a state delegation pledged to support the party nominee. Governor Shivers, conservative leader, has opposed an advance pledge to support "any nominee."

Rayburn, however, has spoken approvingly of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, recently named national committeeman with the hope of bringing the two factions together.

Meanwhile the conservative Democratic State Executive Committee has launched a drive to get 3,500,000 persons to pay poll taxes or secure exemptions, for the big turnout next year. It expressed hope for 30,000 delegates at the convention set for May 26 in Dallas. Rival liberalists have charged that the State Committee has "frozen" hotel space in Dallas with the design of keeping the liberals away.

Committee Clears Shepperd

In a closed session, a Texas Bar Association grievance committee voted to take no action on remarks Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd made about the Court of Criminal Appeals and Judge Lloyd W. Davidson.

Shepperd frequently has expressed himself as being opposed to closed sessions. He went to the meeting with a marked rule book containing passages on open and closed sessions of grievance committees, and requested that the hearing be open. The committee overrode the request.

Newsmen, sent by their respective newspapers to report the committee meeting, were told to leave the room before the committee

convened. No previous announcement of the session's being closed was made.

The hearing resulted after the election of Judge Davidson brought an about face in 104 indictments in turbulent Duval county. Shepperd commented that Davidson had expressed an opinion on the cases before they were presented to the court.

Following their four-hour session, the grievance committee said they had considered the matter and found that "no action should be taken. The matter is closed."

Court Gets Giles Appeal

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is to hand down a decision, probably within a month, on Bascom Giles' first conviction. Appeal was filed in the court on the two-to-three year sentence imposed on the former land commissioner by an Austin district court in July.

Slated, but not yet filed, is a perfunctory appeal on a two-to-six year conviction on the case in which Giles pled guilty. It is designed, according to the defendant's son, Attorney Rogan Giles, to "gain time."

New Secretary of State

Texas' third secretary of state in nine months has been appointed by Governor Shivers, effective Nov. 1. He is 34-year-old Tom Reavley, Jasper attorney. Reavley succeeds A. M. Muldrow of Brownfield who took the office last February after C. E. Fulgham of Lubbock resigned. Muldrow will return to business interests.

Reavley is a World War II Navy veteran, graduate of the University of Texas and a Harvard law graduate.
