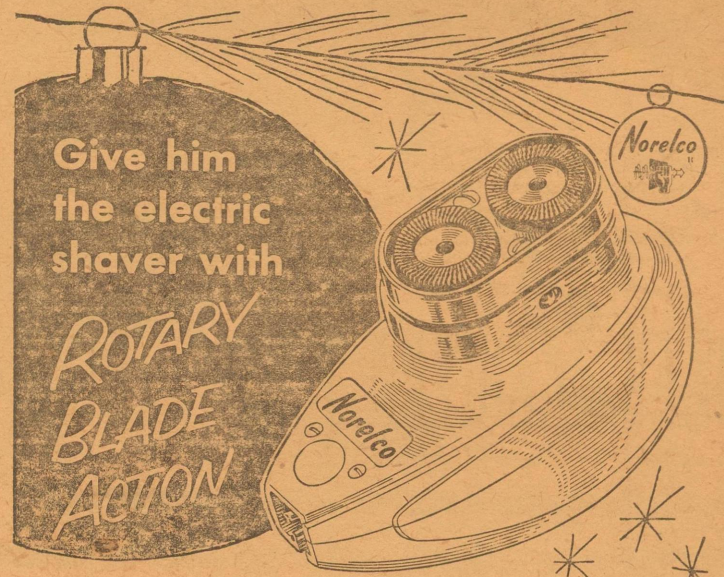

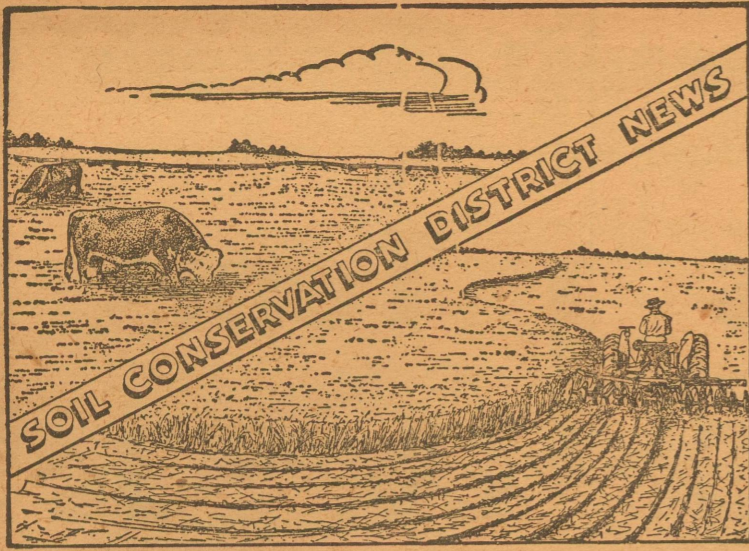

More than 100 ranchers visited D. C. O. Wilson's Coralina Ranch for the Eldorado - Divide Soil Conservation District field day on October 21. At noon all of those present enjoyed a fine barbecue dinner provided by Mr. and Mrs. Wilson. This was the third such meeting held by Mr. Wilson in co-operation with the Soil Conservation District. The other tours were held in 1949 and 1950.

The group saw what deferred grazing and proper use will do for rangeland. Mr. Wilson is a practicing disciple of the slogan "Save the soil and save Texas." He won this year's Lions Club award as the district's outstanding conservation rancher. His range improvement has come during the worst drought in history. He doesn't claim rest alone will bring the better grass back. Too many seasons have gone by with no rain and no improvement. However, he will say that it takes rest and rainfall. Neither can do it alone.

It wasn't many years ago that Mr. Wilson took a look at his grass and didn't like what he saw. Overgrazing was threatening to destroy his best range grasses and make a desert out of his rangeland. Unwanted and inferior grasses and weeds, which the stock left untouched, were crowding out his best grasses. At this time, Mr. Wilson and Bill Rountree, Work Unit Conservationist, mapped out a plan providing systematic deferments and proper stocking of the rangeland.

Mr. Wilson is assisted by his son-in-law, Walter C. Pope, in the operation of this ranch. Their range is lightly stocked at present. He feels more improvement is needed and when a good rainy year does come, he wants some grass there to hold the moisture. He questions the value of brush control and deeply feels the loss of an estimated 75 per cent of his oak trees to drought. He feels his trees and even prickly pear is needed to hold his scanty rainfall; at least until his grass alone can do it.

Bill Rountree and Max Schrader of the Soil Conservation Service conducted the ranchers on the tour of the ranch. The rainfall records of the ranch were discussed and a short demonstration on the value of pitting was held. It was shown that pitted land would store up to four times the moisture that bare land could absorb.

Schrader explained that grazing grass too short causes the roots to cease growth for periods of a month or better. Repeated overgrazing of these plants eventually cause them to die. Especially is this so if this is followed by a short drought. Grazing approximately 50% of the top growth makes the most productive grazing practice. The remainder of the plant provides the necessary soil cover for protection and holding the rainfall.

Louis Lehne of Menard won a jack-knife for guessing the amount of forage produced per acre on two plots of grass. These plots had been clipped, leaving a minimum on the soil for cover.

In making the trip over the ranch, the visitors could see what years of overstocking had done to the rangeland and also what a few years of good management
