Decorating of City Underway As Holidays Approach

Sheriff Calls For Observance Of S-D

"S-D (Safe Driving) Day, sponsored by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety," says Sheriff Sweat of Schleicher County, "has been set for Thursday, December 1, today."

Sheriff Sweat points out that this year, as last, the purpose of S-D Day is to prove to people everywhere that motorists and pedestrians can reduce accidents by their own actions. "The challenge to Schleicher County residents," adds Sweat, "will be: Not a single traffic accident during the 24-hour period—in daylight or darkness."

"It is the moral and civic responsibility of every highway user to accept this challenge," continues the sheriff. "If we of Schleicher County can show that by safe and sensible driving on S-D Day this year we can not only accept, but overcome this challenge we will have taken a major step towards greatly reducing the traffic accident toll in West Texas."

"In 1951 after 50 years of automotive history the one millionth traffic death was recorded in the United States. At our present rate," says Sheriff Sweat, "only half as long will be required to kill the second million."

"Our traffic death rate can be reduced and residents of Schleicher County can, by a concerted effort, and with the highest regard for safe driving principles and the highway code, show their willingness to co-operate."

Sheriff Sweat reminds all motorists that excessive speed is responsible for the majority of traffic fatalities and asks all drivers to drive within the established speed limits on highways and in restricted areas. "To disregard this maxim, is to exhibit a selfish and irresponsible attitude by placing your own and the lives of our fellow men in jeopardy," he said.

Blaylock of Eldorado; two brothers, Bert Blaylock of Robert Lee and W. A. Blaylock of Eldorado; and six sisters, Mrs. V. L. Coppel of Post, Mrs. Ira Coppel of Concan, Mrs. H. E. R. H. Blaylock Jr. was born Nov. 17, 1917 and lived in Schleicher and Coke counties most of his life. He accepted God as his savior at the age of twelve. He spent four years in the U. S. Army during World War II, most of the time in Algeria, and was discharged with the rank of Sgt. T-4. After his return from service he was employed on the W. A. Blaylock ranch in this county, until about four years ago when he moved to San Angelo, where he had employment as a truck driver.

The report of the fatal accident as related by members of the family is as follows. Blaylock was driven home by his boss at about 7:20 p.m., last Friday. He got out and started around the truck to go home. A passenger car driven by a service man from Goodfellow AFB crashed into the truck and knocked it into the yard. Blaylock was caught between the two vehicles and killed instantly.

The new calendar has a total of 1451 names. September, with 155, has the most, while March, with 100, has the fewest.

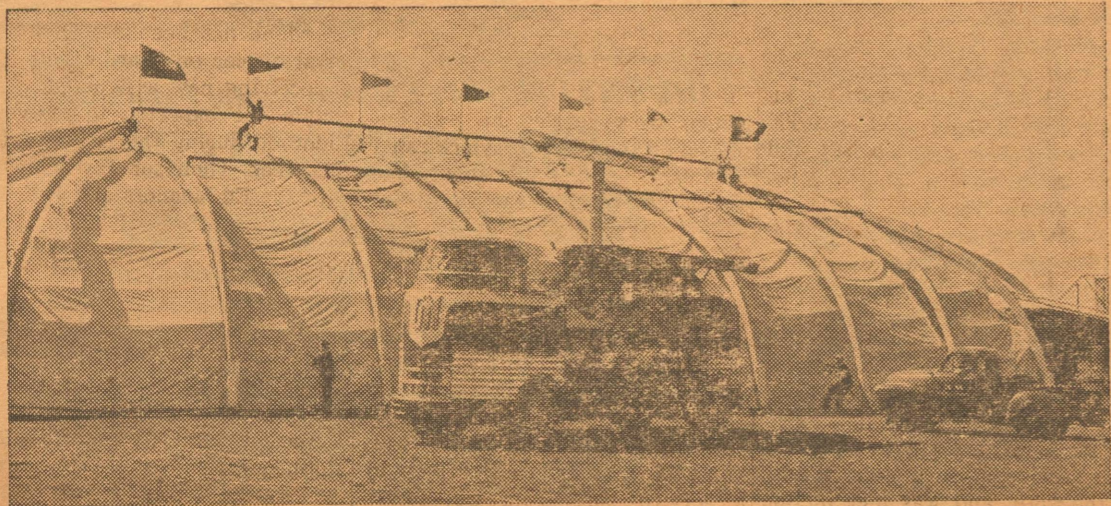

Park Is Dedicated

Plans for the future development of Big Bend National Park were outlined by Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay when he dedicated the vast mountainous area Monday morning.

He told a crowd of some 1200 persons and a radio audience of thousands that "future plans contemplate the establishment of an attractive village in an oasis near the river in the vicinity of Hot Springs. Here the Park's principal visitor accommodations would be concentrated.

"Motels, cabins, stores, and other visitor facilities would be created and operated by park concessions.

"Another development is contemplated for the Santa Elena Canyon area with provision for expansion to meet the growing needs of the future." —Alpine Avalanche.

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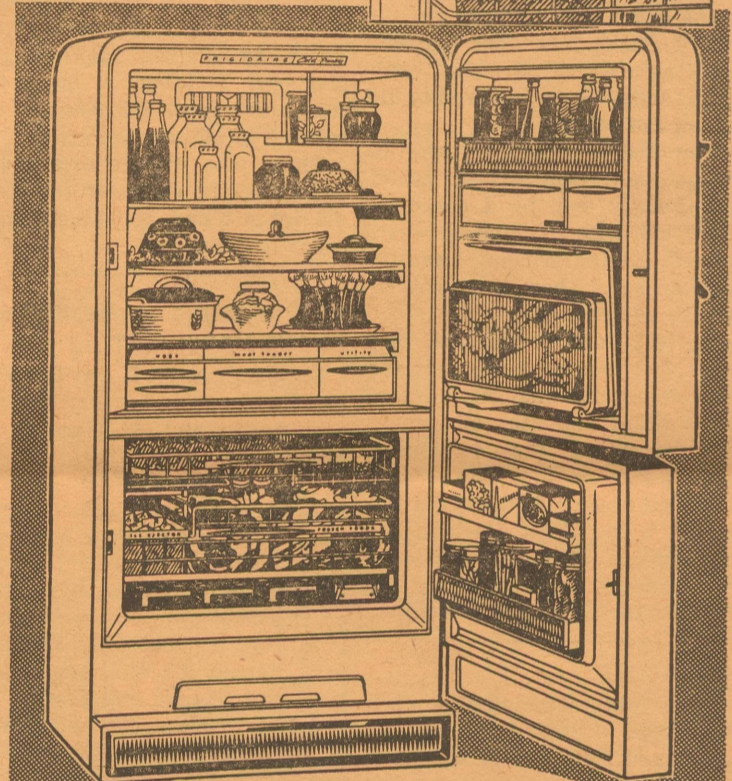

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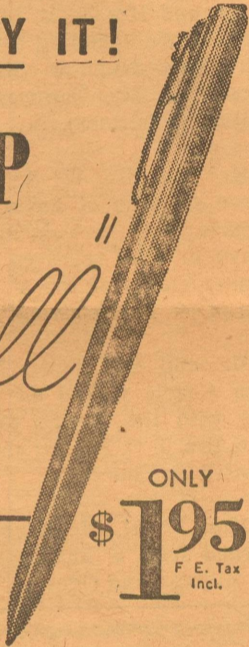

Postmaster Urges Early Christmas Mailing

Postmaster Waller announced today that there has been a steady increase in the flow of Christmas cards and parcels during the past few days. He urges that everyone heed these few things:

All parcels addressed to folks in other states should be mailed by December 5th. Those within the state should be mailed by the 10th. Stressing the need for everyone to cooperate on his 1955 "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, Waller says that by following these three simple rules you're certain to have your gifts delivered before Christmas Day: Wrap them securely — Address them correctly — and Mail them early.

He also stressed the importance of mailing Christmas cards First Class for these reasons: First class postage assures preferred handling. May be sealed, may contain writing, and will be forwarded or returned without charge. None of these privileges or services go with third class mail.

When Christmas seals are used in connection with mailing cards or parcels they should be placed on the back of the card or parcel so as not to conflict with the address side.

Just to refresh your memory on the rates on Christmas cards, the rates are: unsealed without any written message, two cents each anywhere. Sealed with or without written messages, are two cents within Eldorado and three cents on the rural route or out of the city. Again I stress the mailing of out-of-town cards with three cents postage.

pronunciation of each of the individual speech sounds in the English language, the speech class of the high school have been studying phonetics for the past six weeks. Phonetics is the study of the vowel, diphthong, and consonant sound and the writing of words, using symbols to show the sound of the word rather than the spelling. 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TEXAS LAND VALUES SHOW STEADY INCREASE

College Station. A report by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on current developments in the farm real estate market as of July shows a continued upward trend in market prices of farm land in Texas this year.

Farm land values in Texas rose 6% between March and July 1955, bringing them 8% above their general level as of July 1954.

Nationally, a continued moderate advance in dollar value of U. S. farm land during the first half of 1955 brought farm real estate values back to their previous peak reached in late 1952, following the Korean outbreak.

Compared with a year earlier, farm land values in 36 states showed gains of 2% or more this July and the national average increase was 5%. Largest increases occurred in the central Corn Belt, where gains ranged from 5% to 8%. But similar increases occurred in Texas, Louisiana, and Florida. Only three states, Maine, Vermont, and Wyoming, reported values significantly below a year earlier.

The strength in land values, according to the Department of Agriculture, appears to be based in part on strong demand for additional land to enlarge existing farms and permit more efficient use of farm machinery. More available credit is also given as a factor, plus favorable crop prospects at mid-1955, and a generally favorable outlook in the national economy.

More than two-thirds of the farms and farm tracts sold in 1954 and the first half of 1955 were bought by farmers, and farmers who already owned some land were the principal class of farmer-buyers.

Austin. Pieces of the Texas political puzzle begin to fall into place. Who will run for what may be largely developed by the end of the year, months ahead of the usual schedule.

State Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton held a press conference Monday in Austin to announce formally his candidacy for governor.

Interested observers also are watching for an announcement from Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd. But chances are it won't be of a political nature. Reports have it that Shepperd may announce his retirement from politics at the end of his present term, to accept a position in West Texas.

For now, Shepperd said "no comment," when asked about his plans, but promised an announcement "later." At present he says he has plenty to do, filling his job as attorney general. "I've got some hot potatoes cooking, and I intend to finish cooking them," he commented.

Another possibility is that former University of Texas Chancellor James P. Hart would announce his gubernatorial plans in mid-December.

Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson is being talked more and more as a candidate for attorney general. State Sen. Searcy Bracwell of Houston is considered a prospect either for this post, or for lieutenant governor.

And a one-sentence card in the mails prophesies: "Obie Jones will be your next state treasurer." Jones is a state representative from Travis County.

Daniel Drive Groves Movements to persuade U. S. Sen. Price Daniel to run for governor apparently are breaking out over the state.

In Navarro County, Democratic leaders who split over Shivers and Yarborough and over Eisenhower and Stevenson united in signing a petition endorsing Daniel. A similar situation developed in Childress.

A poll of the heavily conservative Dallas County Democratic Executive Committee by the Dallas Morning News showed Daniel a

strong favorite.

Observers felt this increasing activity indicated Daniel has given his supporters encouragement.

Lindsey To Leave Politics

House Speaker Jim Lindsey apparently has rejected the lure of higher political office. He is to succeed Gen. Ike Ashburn as executive vice president of the Texas Good Roads Association on Jan. 1. Ashburn, retiring from that position, will take over as chairman of the board.

Lindsey will complete his present term in the legislature, he said, but will not seek elective office next year. Elected speaker before his 28th birthday, he had been considered a possible candidate for attorney general.

Tax Portion For Schools Asked

Texans attending the White House (Conference on Education this week planned to plug for a new school-financing idea developed in a report on the preliminary state conference held in Austin recently.

Their goal: "A percentage of all federal income taxes collected in each state should be left in the state for school support."

Another possibility suggested in the report was to extend the tax-supported educational period for all students from 12 to 14 years.

Teacher Retirement Pushed

Some 8,000 Texas teachers bypassed traditional turkey dinners to spend their holiday studying professional objectives. Topping their convention agenda were plans for an organized campaign to gain voter approval for the teacher retirement constitutional amendment which will appear on next November's general election ballot.

Passage of the amendment is necessary, said the Texas State Teachers Association resolution, "to insure teachers for the flood of additional pupils enrolling in Texas public schools."

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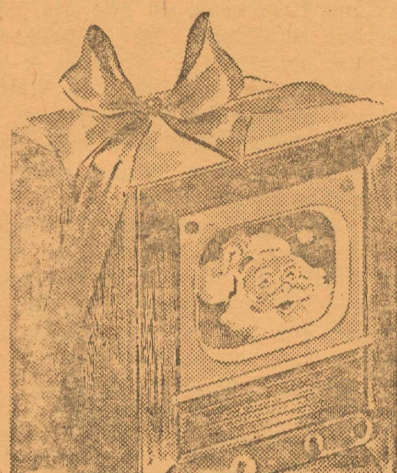
Your Rights In Court

The average person has only a vague idea concerning his rights in court. When unjustly charged with an offense, even a simple traffic violation, he is prone to feel

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that all is lost. Our laws, however, provide a number of protections to insure against conviction of the innocent.

Probably the most fundamental right of the accused is summarized in the well known adage, "Every man is innocent until proved guilty." It is up to the prosecuting authorities to prove that the person on trial is guilty—and not the obligation of the person accused to prove that he is innocent. The prosecution must prove your guilt beyond a reasonable doubt, or you will be acquitted. The mere fact that you have been given a ticket or accused of a crime is not even evidence of guilt.

Another important protection is the right to have a witness whose testimony you may need subpoenaed to appear in court and testify. Many people are reluctant to go to court when their own rights are involved, and unless you had a means for compelling their attendance and testimony, you often would be unable to prove the facts necessary for success in your case.

It is the duty of every citizen to testify if he has information important to a law suit and is called upon to do so. The courts can and do enforce attendance in court and the giving of testimony.

Certain other safeguards are valuable to you. A person may refuse to testify in any proceeding if he had a reasonable belief that his testimony could be used as a basis of a criminal proceeding against him. This does not mean, of course, that a confession given freely and voluntarily cannot be used in evidence. But it does mean that an accused cannot be compelled to take the witness stand. Nor can his failure to testify be commented upon by the prosecution.

These are but a few examples of the numerous safeguards our courts provide to protect the innocent against false accusations of crime. But many of these rights would be valueless without the assistance of a lawyer, who has been schooled in legal principles and rules of statute or decision involved, to invoke these rights. The "right to counsel" must be granted to every accused person brought before any court in the state. In capital cases, if an accused person cannot afford to pay for legal counsel and desires it, the court must appoint a lawyer to represent him.

Every person charged with an infraction of the law has the right to consult counsel before making any plea. This applies to cases in every court—including justice of the peace courts, municipal courts, traffic courts and district courts. It does little good to consult a lawyer after you have pleaded guilty and paid the fine, for then the damage has been done.

The courts are open to you any time one of your legal rights has been denied or any of your property has been unlawfully taken. This is one of your most precious rights. The courts are the only peaceful means of enforcing your rights.

Poultry Houses Need Winter Ventilation

College Station. The wide fluctuation of temperature during the winter months must be met with corresponding adjustments to provide correct ventilation in the poultry house. These needed adjustments, says Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman, can be made rapidly, and with little expense, in properly constructed houses.

He says some poultrymen close up at least three sides of the poultry house tightly by nailing building paper or sisal-kraft paper over all the open areas. This practice cuts off all chances for needed cross ventilation on warm days and darkens the house excessively. He recommends the use of panels made of a glass substitute such as cello glass on all four sides of the house to enclose the top three or four feet of wall space. These panels should be hinged at the top so they can be raised on the mild days and closed during bad weather.

He points out that it is necessary to control drafts during cold weather but at the same time, some ventilation is needed to keep down moisture accumulation which causes wet litter. Wet litter is especially undesirable in the laying house for it means dirt will be tracked into the nests and up will come an increase in the number of soiled eggs.

In view of the large investment in an economically sized poultry flock, Wormeli says the loss from decreased growth and production due to improper winter time ventilation can be heavy and justifies making sure the house is properly ventilated. Of course, he adds, the best time to provide the needed equipment for proper ventilation is when the house is constructed but the expense for glass substitute panels on older houses will soon be paid for by the increased production from a flock of comfortable hens.
