

The Perry Mittel water well, about one mile north of town on the Mertzon highway was producing water last Nixon Jr., Mrs. Jess Walston. night at a rate of about 600 gallons per minute, after having been treated with 5,000 gallons of acid Tuesday.

The testing crew came on the job Monday and spent all day rigging up. Pumping got under way Tuesday and after a number of hours, production settled down to a modest 128 gallons per minute\_far below the expecta-tions of the owner and many other observers. Acid was ordered late Tuesday and was put into the well by 10:00 o'clock that night.

Pumping started again yesterday about 4:00 p.m., and by 6:00 o'clock last night the volume was holding steady at the above figure-600 GPM.

#### Pumping will continue today (Thursday).

At least 20 cars of visitors were at the well yesterday while pumping was going on.





"Flower Arranging is Easy" is MP-135 and the publication covers such items as equipment needed by the flower arranger; making cut flowers last longer; basic rules for arranging and design terms for flower arrangements.

"Propagation of Ornamental Plants," B-816, covers the methods and hows of propagating ornamental plants. All three are authored by A. F. DeWerth, head, Department of Floraculture and Landscape Architecture, Texas A&M College System.
