## Bond Issues to Be Voted On In Schleicher County April 7

Following recent presentation to Schleicher County commissioners of a petition calling for a bond election for a swimming pool, a two-fold bond election has been set for Saturday, April 7, by the Court.

Property-owning voters of the county will decide whether or not to issue \$35,000 in bond for a swimming pool, and whether or not to issue \$35,000 for an old people's home. Both sets of bonds would mature in fifteen years.

The commissioners were presented the swimming pool petition this month at their regular meeting; the petition for the old people's home was presented several months ago.

The official notices of these elections are on page two of this issue of the Success.

Those favoring the idea of a pool point out that the town and county have long needed the facility, especially since the county has almost no natural bodies of water for this purpose. It would appeal to the young people and children of the county. Opposition has been voiced chiefly by those who point to the bonded indebtedness the county already has, in addition to the problems and costs of maintenance which would go with a swimming pool. Personnel to oper-

ate and maintain the pool would have to be trained.

The Junior Woman's club and possibly other groups, as well as individuals, have been promoting the idea of a swimming pool for several months. Previously Dr. H. Z. Pennington circulated the petition for the old people's home and presented it to the court.

## Democratic Board Urges Large Voter Turn-Out

The County Democratic committee this week pledged their efforts to get out the largest possible vote in all primaries and elections taking place during this election year. County Democratic Chairman Edwin Jackson and his four committeemen, Dick Preston, Pete Ringle, Joe Wagley, and Jene Moore, urged all voters to vote in the coming bond, city, and school trustee elections, as well as in the Democratic primaries and the general election in November.

Voters were urged to ask their committeemen for any information on elections. "It is the desire of the executive committee, including the chairman, at all times to be ready to serve their people with any information they might be able to give, and voters are welcome at the county chairman's office. This committee is more interested in good citizenship than anything else." This statement was issued by the committee at their meeting Tuesday night.

Earlier they met with Judge W. R. Bearce and County Attorney T. P. Robinson Jr. for briefing on the bond elections which are set for April 7. Problems and procedures regarding the swimming pool and old people's home were discussed.

It was pointed out that this year each of the four precincts of the county will have one voting box, for the Democratic primaries, and that the precinct committeemen are automatically the election judges in their respective precincts. A fifth box will be for absentee voting.

Precincts with their judges and voting places for primaries, and number of voters who paid poll taxes are: Precinct 1, Dick Preston, Memorial Building, 859; No. 2, Pete Ringle, Page field shop, 55; No. 3, Joe Wagley, Rudd school, 65; and No. 4, Jene Moore, Reynolds school, 98. The total of 997 voters who paid poll taxes does not include those over 60, and those becoming 21 this year, who are exempt from the tax.

Preliminary plans were discussed for the precinct conventions, the first of which is May 5th, which are followed by county and state conventions. Special effort was urged to see that as large a turnout of voters as possible attend their respective precinct conventions.

A line-up of dates of interest to all Democratic voters would include the following:

- May 5—Precinct conventions are held to elect delegates to county convention.
- May 7—Deadline for candidates to have name placed on ballot.
- May 8—County convention elects delegates to state convention.
- May 14—County Executive committee meets to apportion costs of primary among candidates.
- July 8-24 — Absentee balloting for first primary.
- July 28—First primary election. Precinct conventions held to name delegates to county convention.
- August 25—Second primary.

## Politics To Pick Up; O'Daniel Back In Race

Radio listeners here Monday night heard W. Lee O'Daniel announce from Ft. Worth that he would again run for Governor after an 8-year absence from the political arena.

O'Daniel made an unexpected bid for Governor Saturday a week ago when he asked for an expression from the public. Monday afternoon in Fort Worth, he said he had received an "avalanche" of encouraging messages and would enter the race for Governor.

His platform will be the same as when he scored his first victory 18 years ago—the Ten Commandments—and his motto will continue to be the Golden Rule, O'Daniel said in a radio broadcast from Fort Worth.

Several hundred citizens of the county dropped in Sunday at the new brick veneer residence in the Benton development which Jack Shugart has built and placed on the market. The fine new home has many of the features of the modern de luxe residence, including wall-to-wall carpeting, numerous closets, three bedrooms with two baths, built in oven, etc.

Visitors called throughout the afternoon and expressed their admiration of the many fine features. Shugart has already laid foundation for another house of similar size, on an adjoining lot.

Irrigation wells in the county are working over-time as owners get them rigged up in preparation for a busy season. Henry Moore has two going, and his brother Jene just got his well rigged up for irrigating and is hard at it. Joe Kerklow, less fortunate, had a second disappointment when his well failed to measure up to expectations, and drillers have gone down to the Queen sand and are testing it out, hoping to make it a better producer.

Ray Bruton is irrigating. Perry Mittel has hired a hand and has irrigated quite a lot of land. Clyde Keeney has some nice greenery showing from the West Road—this is just touching on the story of irrigation as it unfolds this blustery spring.

A recent test on Clyde Keeney's well showed that it is even better than at first thought—it is making more than the 1000 bbl per minute at first estimated!

We have been informed by County Judge Bearce, that the commissioners court have voted to pay \$1 bounty on fox tails, in an effort to reduce the county's population of these animals.

Reason behind the move is that rabies outbreaks are reported in adjoining counties—wild animals spread the disease, and the more wild animals destroyed, the better.

## Large Crowd Of Men Hears Dr. Edington

A large and appreciative crowd of men from the various churches of the town heard an address delivered Monday night in the Presbyterian church by Andrew Edington, president of Schreiner Institute at Kerrville. The address was preceded by a barbecue in the church basement served by Presbyterian Men.

"Texas Presbyterians Together for Christ" was mentioned by Dr. Edington as a great Christian work, but that the fact that \$5½ million would be raised was secondary to the "togetherness" the members would experience.

He cited as being wrong the common belief that Christian education takes place only in the church school. All educational processes contribute, he pointed out, adding that one of the greatest dangers lies in loss of Christian teachers. He added that expansion in all fields of knowledge has made it increasingly difficult for teachers to stay ahead of their students.

Rev. James Spencer led singing before and after the address.

## Sale of Ranch To Result In Move of Well Known Foreman

The sale by Mr. and Mrs. Ray Willoughby of their Schleicher county ranch south of Eldorado will result in the moving of Sam McGinnes, foreman of the ranch for the past 20 years, and prominently known in Eldorado.

Mr. and Mrs. McGinnes will most likely move into Eldorado, where they already own some rent property, and where two of their sons already reside with their families. (Another son lives in Crosbyton and a daughter resides in Eden.)

Sam McGinnes took over his present ranch duties on August 1, 1936, and lacks about 5 months of rounding out a full 20 years on the job. He says he is due to vacate the ranch house by April 15. Formerly residents of Coke and Runnels counties, the McGinnes family moved to Eldorado over 20 years ago and lived in town for a number of months—moving to the ranch

when he got that job. Through the years the entire family have been identified with Eldorado school and church activities. Mr. Sam is a trustee and steward of the First Methodist Church in Eldorado.

The ranch, which consists of slightly more than 5,000 acres, was sold recently by Mr. and Mrs. Ray Willoughby to a Mr. R. J. Johnson of San Angelo. Johnson said he bought the ranch for a home and is to get possession on April 15. No livestock was involved in the deal.

The Willoughbys have owned well improved and considered one of the better pieces of ranchland in the county. Willoughby is well known throughout Texas and in the western states as one of the nation's top livestock leaders. He has served in various capacities of many livestock organizations. He and Mrs. Willoughby live in San Angelo.
