County Gets Its First Drenching of Year On Sunday

The long looked-for drenching rain finally came to Schleicher County late in the day on Sunday. It came unexpectedly toward the close of a warm, pleasant Sunday —not a particularly cloudy day.

Starting as a gentle shower, the rain increased in intensity, until over two inches fell in less than an hour.

Much of the cotton growing areas of the county were benefitted and it is understood that planting will become general just as soon as farmers can get into the fields.

The chief reaction of Schleicherites to the rain has been surprise. For so many years what looked like rain clouds have headed up and dissipated without any moisture that residents of the county had become pessimistic.

There was nothing different about the clouds on Sunday, except that they produced rain! Many home owners had spent the weekend watering their yards and shrubbery and gardens as usual-now all are expecting the parts of the county visited by rain to green up at once!

Not all of the county received rain in sufficient amounts-but much of the county did, and will be benefitted

Most noticeable effect of the rain was the lifting of morale of residents of the county. It is the consensus of opinion that better times are ahead—and that more rains are heading up.

The rains came during a week of general precipitation over West Texas. In consideration of the damage that the floods have done in parts of West Texas, this county has considered itself fortunate in that rain was beneficial and the losses not general.
