City To Receive Water, Sewer Job **Bids September 18**

In a meeting Tuesday night the City Council of Eldorado approved the plans of their engineers for water and sewer extensions, and voted to issue \$160,000 of new bonds out of the \$175,000 recently authorized by a vote of the citizens.







Turkeys And Rice Are Included In September List Of Plentiful Foods College Station .- A record turkey crop is expected this fallabout 10 million head more than

a year ago. Heaviest increases in farm marketings over a year ago are due in September, placing turkeys at the top of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful foods list

for the month. Rice is another top feature on the list. While this year's crop is estimated to be about 13 percent less than last, carryover supplies are still heavy.

With the drouth forcing more cattle to market than last fall, beef also makes the September plentiful list. Since most of the cattle are off grass, supplies of intermediate and lower grades of beef will be especially heavy.

Good catches of tun coupled with a heavy carryover from last year have put canned tuna in oil on the list. Too, broilers and fryers, milk and other dairy products, fresh Bartlett pears, summer vegetables and peanut butter complete the list.






