No doubt the little girl was right because it isn't any trouble for a bulldog to make an ugly face. But the bulldog probably didn't do it intentionally. And even if he did, the little girl did not gain anything by competing with him in making faces.

Finding fault in others is about the easiest thing we do. It doesn't require any talent, any self-denial, any brains, or any character. Fault finding is a destructive habit and reveals a low moral level of living. Emerson said, "If you would lift me you must be on higher ground." The fault finder cannot lift; he, can only pull others down.

But we are usually eagle-eyed to see another's faults and deformity. Jesus asked, "Why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eve, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? If we even admit to any specific sin, we still maintain that it is only a mote in our eye but that it is a beam that is in our brother's eye. We confess our little faults only in order to persuade other people that we have no great ones.


And how terrible do these sins appear to us that we have not committed. A very wise man would always reply when he heard any person being loudly condemned: "Yes, that does seem very bad to me, because that's not my way of sinning."

How irritating it is to have an unfriendly person meddling in your personal life, but how lovely it is to know that someone has a personal interest in you! Tolerance comes, not from malice or mere indifference, but from genuine sympathy. How absurd it is to pass over all the valuable parts of a person and dwell on his faults!

Actually, we ourselves are not free from faults. But, when we overcome our faults our lives become more productive of good, as a field becomes more fertile when the weeds are plowed under. Not only can our faults be uprooted but also can be choked out by good deeds. "Overcome evil with good." Do not think of your faults, and even less of the faults of others. Look for the good and the strong. Rejoice in it and imitate it, and your faults will drop off in due season, as leaves fall from a tree.


