The maid of honor was Miss May Runge, and bridesmaid was Allene Dickson of San Angelo. The groom was attended by his father as best man.

Groomsmen were Bill Nilsson of San Angelo, brother of the groom, and Steve Powell of Fort Worth. Acolytes were Ned Atabery, the groom's nephew, of Hobbs, N. Mex., and Jim Runge of Eldorado. The organist was Edward Aldwell of Sonora.

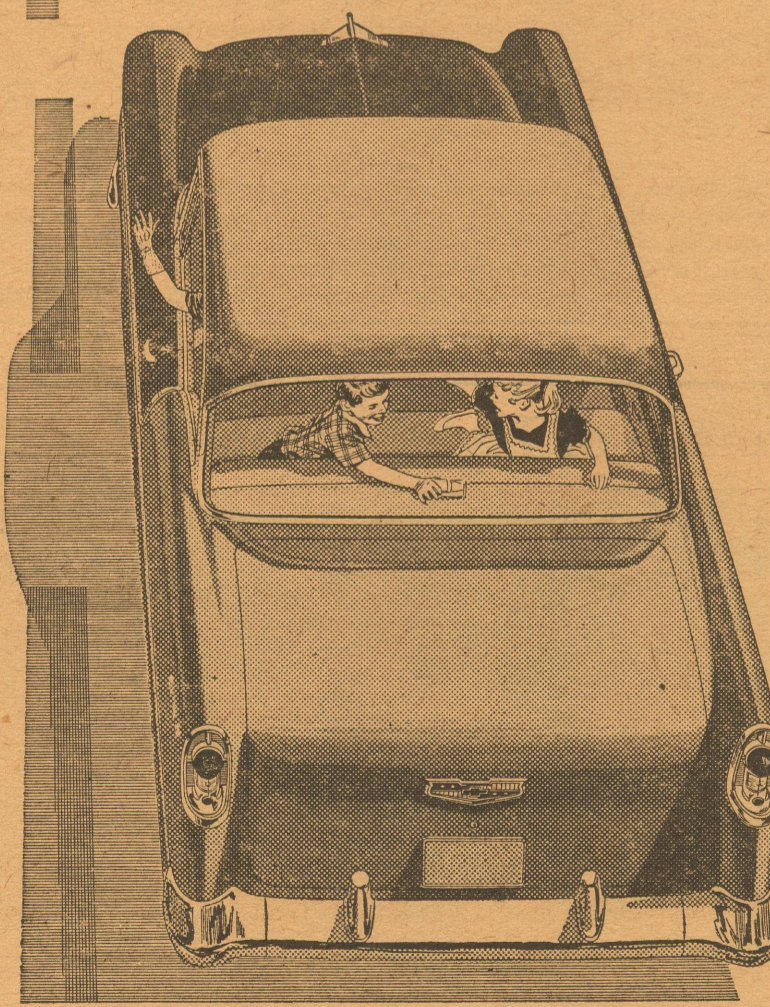
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ORETHA POWELL BECOMES BRIDE OF L. DANNHEIM

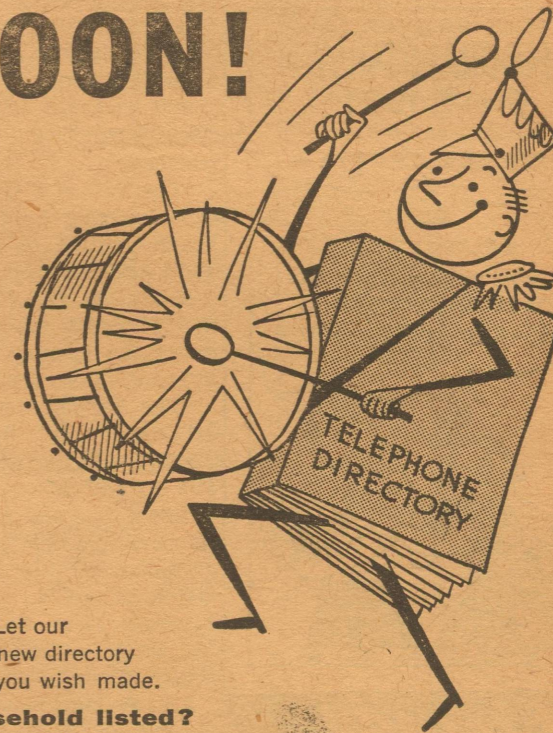

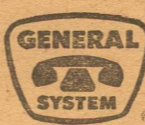

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Many farmers in the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District are now preparing for the coming growing season by installing soil and water conserving practices on their farms. These farmers know that in the average, or more often, less than average rainfall year every raindrop must be made to count.

It is the years of low rainfall that good soil and water conserving practices make themselves felt most. During periods like this, a system of good terraces, contour farming and leaving a little stubble on the fields makes the difference between making a small crop and complete failure.

Among the many conservation practices in common use contour farming with a system of terraces is not only the most popular but also the most profitable. It takes only a small increase in yield to pay for a terrace system in the first year of use.

W. O. "Whip" Faull has just recently completed terracing a field for Lester Henderson. Just last week Whip started terracing a field on his own farm. The Soil Conservation Service laid another terrace out for District Supervisor B. E. Moore. He plans to build this in the near future.

Unless climatic conditions turn very favorable this fall and winter we will be faced with a serious wind erosion threat next spring. A large part of the District has had a near complete crop failure this growing season. This soil is going

into the windy season with little or no cover for protection.

Those farmers with a fair feed crop should consider leaving a good bit of the stubble for protection. On the fields which grow little or on crop this year it will be worth your time to plant a crop of small grain for cover. After all, September and October are two of the very best months as far as our overall average rainfall is concerned. The odds are with the farmer in these months. It will pay you to help hold your soil down.





WEATHER CYCLES NOT FOUND IN RECENT STUDY

College Station.—Predictions of rainfall cannot be made on the basis of weather cycles of "wet and dry years." Recent studies of 31 locations in the high and rolling plains of Texas show that cycles play little or no part in annual rainfall figures dating as far back as 89 years.

Drs. R. J. Hildreth and Gerald W. Thomas of the Texas Agricultural Experiment station who made the studies, state that an optimist can find traces of cycles at some locations, but no statistical significance of cycles is revealed in the records.

"Average or normal rainfall seldom occurs," Dr. Hildreth said. "The records indicate that farmers and ranchers in the high and rolling plains should figure that more years—52 to 69 percent—will be below average in rainfall than years above average."

Prolonged drouths have occurred on the high and rolling plains at least two or three times during the period weather records are available. The famous drouth of the 1930's, which led to the dust bowl period, shows up in records at most locations. Another bad drouth period occurred around 1917. At most locations the recent drouth began in 1951 and is the longest and most severe on record. Records go back to 1866 at Abilene.

In most cases, it is not the first year of low rainfall that is disastrous, but the 2, 3 or 4 years in a row of low rainfall. During the dust bowl period Amarillo had 8 consecutive years of below average rainfall.

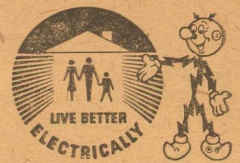



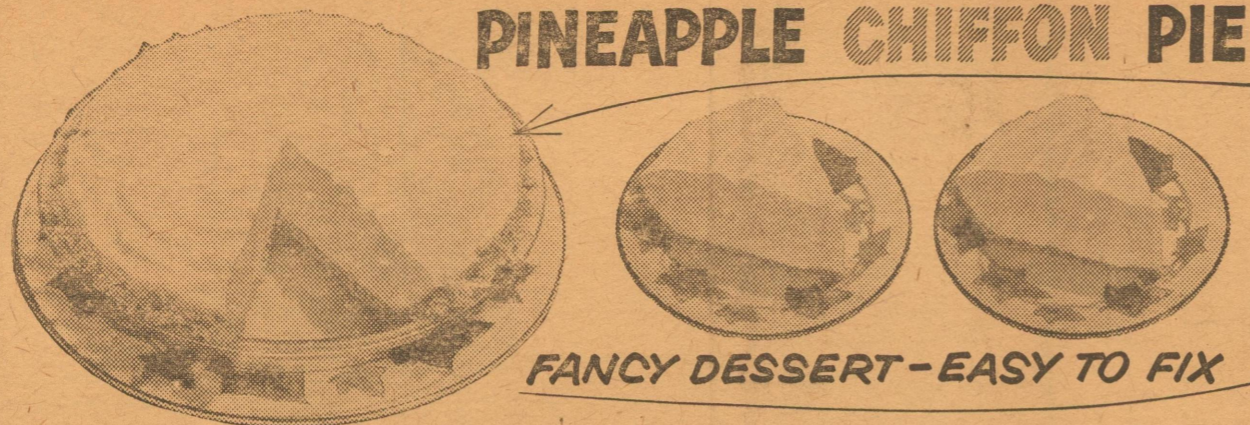

PINEAPPLE CHIFFON PIE

1 cup fine graham cracker crumbs
 ¼ cup melted butter
 1 pkg. lemon gelatin
 1 cup boiling water
 9-oz. can crushed pineapple, not drained
 ½ cup Pet Evaporated Milk

Mix crumbs with butter and press in bottom and on sides of a 9-inch pie pan. Chill until needed. Dissolve gelatin in water. Stir in pineapple. Chill until mixture starts to thicken. Chill milk in ice tray until almost frozen around the edges. Whip ice-cold milk in cold quart bowl with rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Put into crumb crust. Chill until firm, about 3 hours.
