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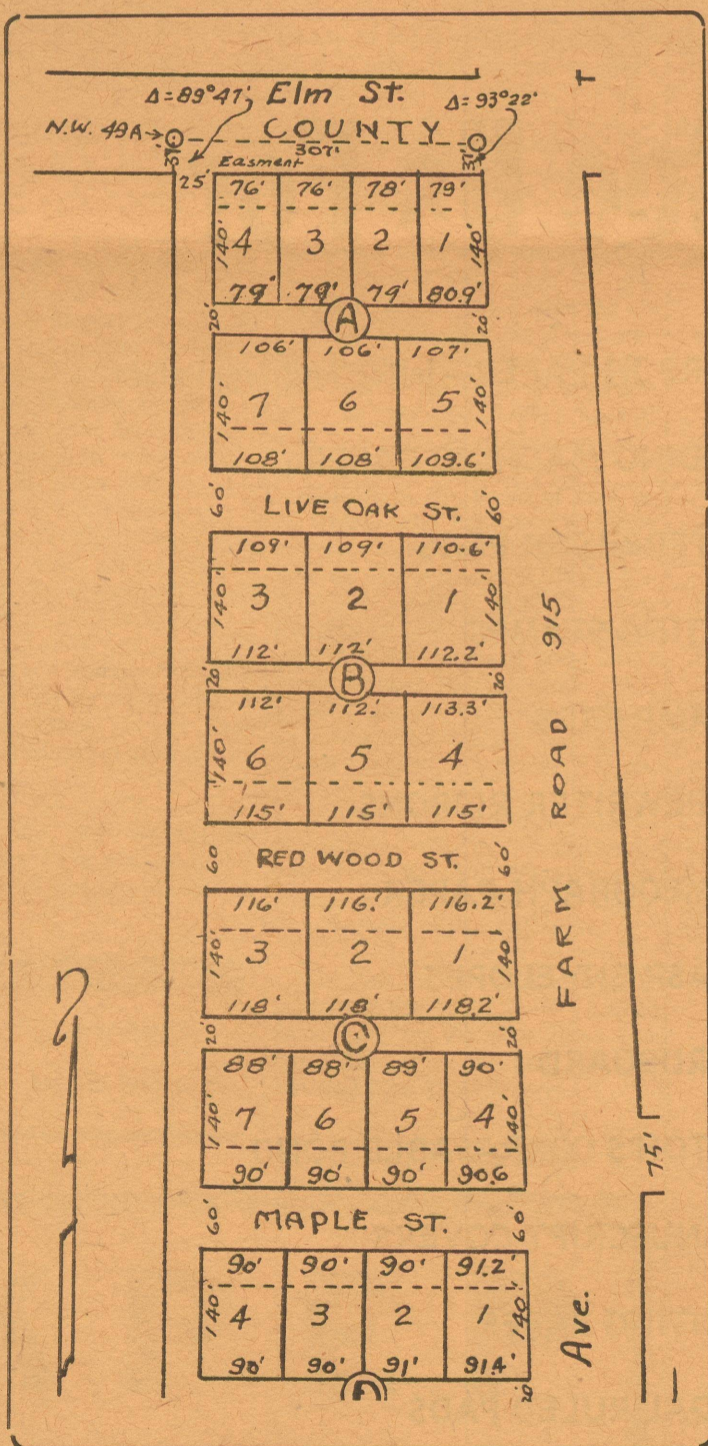

### Record Turkey Crop For Texas and Nation Coming Up This Year

College Station.—The nation's turkey producers are raising 16 percent more turkeys this year than last—29 per cent more heavy breeds and 19-percent less light breeds.

Texas producers are raising about 47 percent more birds than in 1955, reports John McHaney, extension economist. Production of light breeds is down 4 percent but heavy breeds are up 55 percent in the state.

McHaney says the expansion was caused primarily because prices during the last half of 1955 were 7 percent higher than for the same period in 1954 and feed prices were down by 10 percent. Too, he adds, turkey prices for the first half of 1956, which covers the main hatching season, were about 6 percent higher than for the same period in 1955 and feed prices averaged 7 percent less. These factors were enough to encourage expansion.

The economist believes that the commercial turkey industry will continue to expand especially if general economic activity continues at a high level. Two main factors are cited as reasons for the expansion — improved technology and larger supplies of feed and other resources. McHaney says the record number of turkeys raised this year is sure to sell for less money than last year's crop. In fact, he says, prices to growers will probably be much lower.

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### Stop For School Buses

Thousands of school children are now trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed "that is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or railroad grade crossing, or railroad grade crossing.

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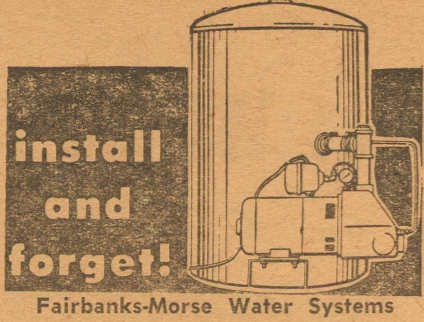
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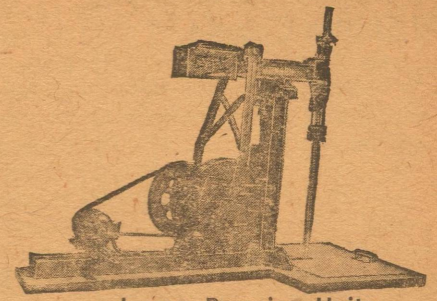
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### PASTOR ADDRESSES ELDORADO CLUB ON CITIZENSHIP

### Poultryman Beats Heat With Sprinkler System

Belton.—Jack Daniels of the Sparks community of Bell county has whipped the heat problem in the building which houses his laying flock.

County Agent Don Decker reports that Daniels has installed a sprinkler system which provides ample cooling for the house and has eliminated hen losses during periods of extreme temperatures. He also found that cool hens produce more eggs.

Decker said that Daniels made the installation himself and thus reduced the expense. Cost items included pipe, fittings and nozzles for the sprinklers. A single pipe was placed just below the rafters of the building with nozzles spaced at six-foot intervals along the pipe. Cone shaped nozzles with a capacity of 2½ gallons per hour were used. The system is operated continuously during the afternoon.

None of the water ever reaches the ground, said Decker. The mist evaporates and circulating air distributes the cooling effects over the house.

Decker advised other poultrymen who were having trouble in the poultry house because of the heat that they too might find the installation of such a system the answer to their problem. He suggests further, that before an installation is made, a visit to a farm where a system is in operation would be valuable.
