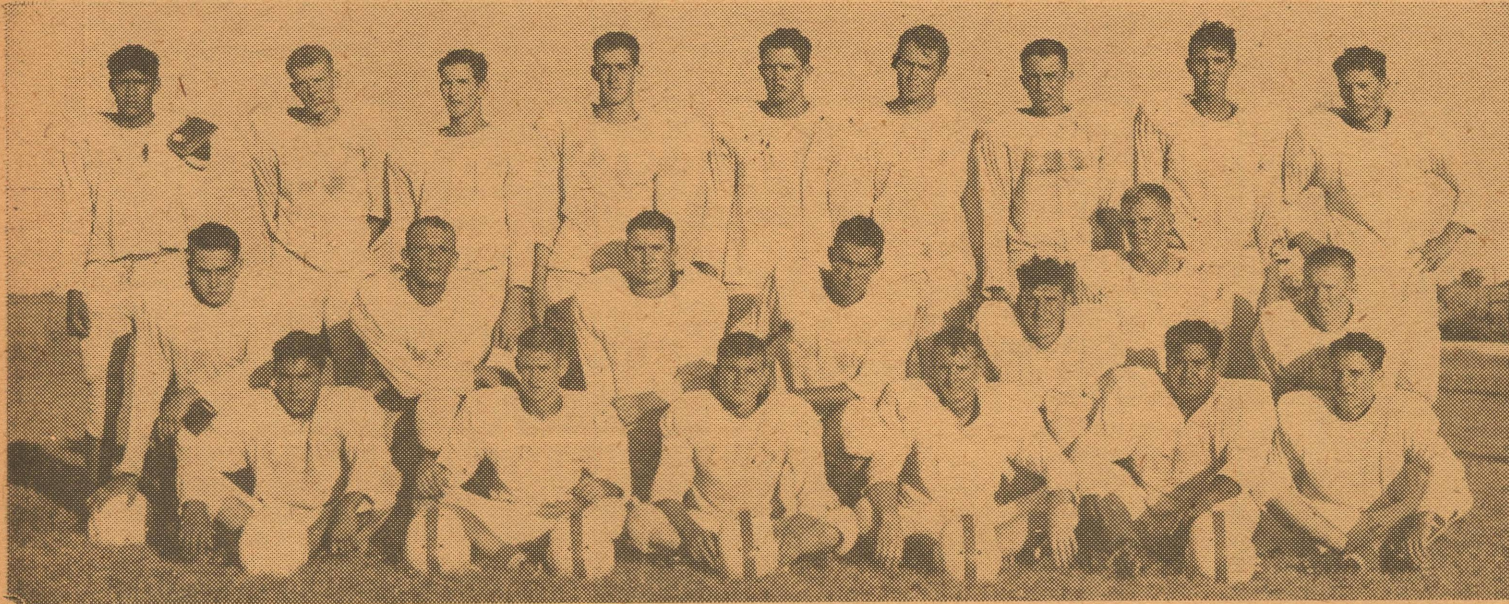

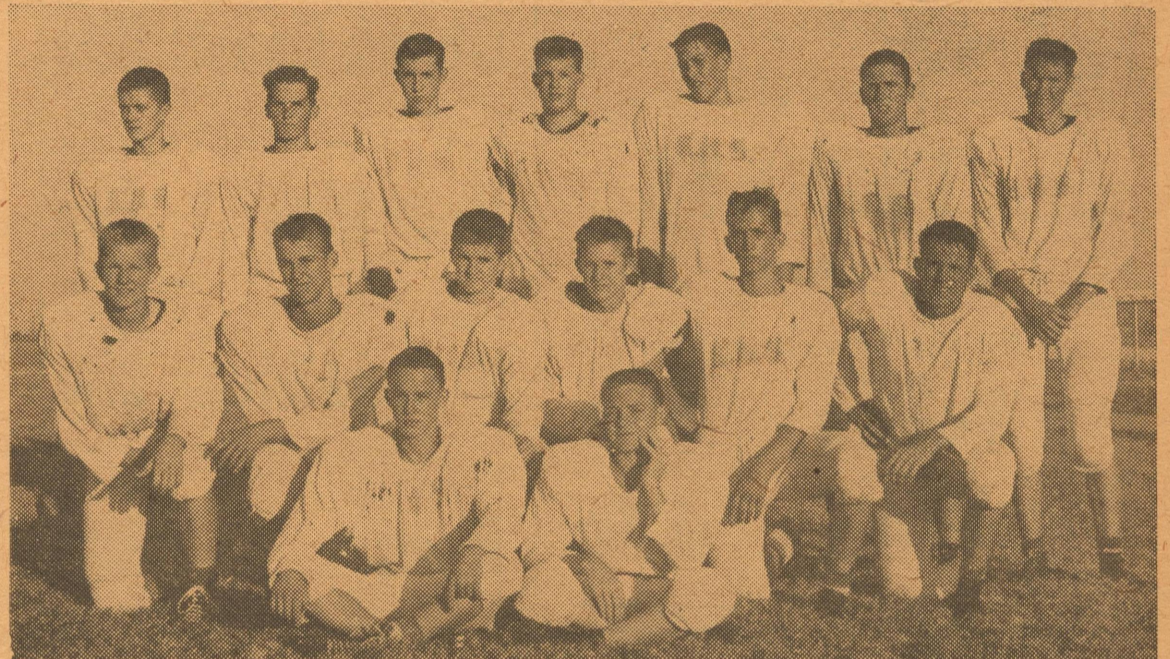

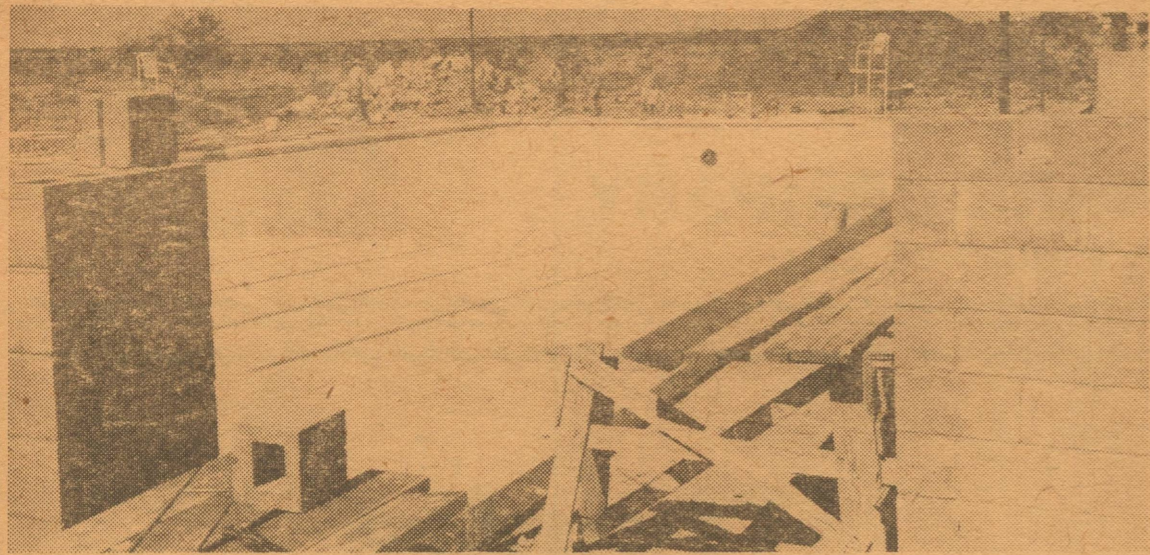

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

The use of salt and meal for feeding cattle and sheep during drouth periods or during the winter months has been one topic much discussed by ranchmen everywhere.

Research shows that it is definitely harmful to feed an excessive amount of salt in any emergency ration. At the same time many ranchers take a ration of meal and salt and livestock do well—show no harmful effect at lambing or calving time.

What are some of the reasons for the above results? There are two definite factors entering into the picture. First, the amount of dry grass available for livestock on meal and salt. Second, the distance meal and salt.

The above reasons are why County Agents and research men won't say not to feed salt and meal but want to know under what conditions it is fed and how much dry matter is available—pointing out all the while what could happen. It is a practice—you may or may not get good results.

The practice of keeping as many twin ewe lambs as possible for replacements in the flock has very little bearing upon getting a higher percentage of lamb crop each spring.

Only twin lambs were selected and records kept for the expected increase in percentage of lambs born. A like number of singles were selected from the same flock. Both were under same pasture conditions and management.

The plane of nutrition has more to do with twins in ewes than any other factor.

A change in environment once in a while works wonders; it makes one appreciate the good things the hometown offers.

Your cattle, or other animals, will prefer steps too! Man has used steps for hundreds of years but only recently has he discovered that livestock much prefer them to conventional inclined, with cleats, type chute.

While the dimensions of the

step can be varied to fit the length and height of the incline, a 3-inch riser and 12-inch tread appear to be quite satisfactory for all types of livestock.

An individual fleece of wool will vary from the same sheep from year to year depending upon the plane of nutrition.

When you select sheep for wool production and weight and the qualities of the breed you have selected an individual that will transmit these qualities provided an equally good ram is selected—but the plane of nutrition will show in the individual fleece as to amount of grease, strength in fiber, fineness, weight of fleece.

The length of staple will vary some but not to the extent that some of the other factors vary that go to make up an attractive fleece.

Ministerial Alliance

Blest Be the Tie That Binds

The author of this famous hymn, one of the best loved of all Christian songs, was John Fawcett, born January 17, 1739 in Yorkshire, England. Fawcett was a tailor's apprentice for six years, from age 13 to 19. When he was 16 years of age, he was converted by a sermon preached by George Whitefield and was later ordained a Baptist minister. He was called to pastor a small church at Wainsgate. In 1772 he was called to a large and famous church in London. He accepted the call, preached his farewell sermon, and had his goods loaded on wagons when his congregation gathered around him, showing their love through their tears. He just could not leave them—so he unloaded his wagons and within hours wrote the hymn:

Blest be the tie that binds
Our hearts in Christian love;
The fellowship of kindred minds
Is like to that above.

The underlying current that brought to the surface of Fawcett's experience and gave birth to this hymn was Christian Love.

Christian love can and will overstep high mountains, span deep rivers and traverse plains. Why do we not see more of love? Perhaps it is because we have become too selfish and self sufficient. We are trying to disprove the statement of Paul, "And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." But, instead of disproving it we are destroying ourselves. I Corinthians 14:1a, "Follow after Love." In other words, "Catch up with Love." We are 'way' behind.—JCH.

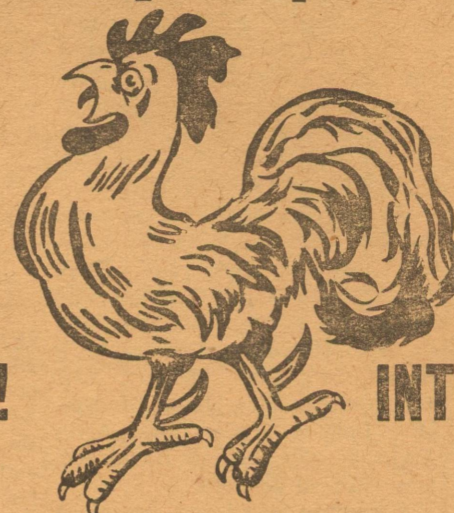

Pecan Pie

2 Tablespoons Flour 2 eggs
3-4 cup sugar 1/2 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
1 teaspoon salt 1 cup broken pecans
1 cup dark corn syrup 3-4 teaspoon vanilla

Mix in a bowl the flour, sugar and salt. Mix in well the corn syrup. With a fork, beat in eggs one at a time. Mix in the milk, pecans and vanilla. Pour into a 9-inch pie pan lined with unbaked pie dough made with pie crust mix. Bake near center of 375 oven (high moderate) for 50 minutes, or until firm.

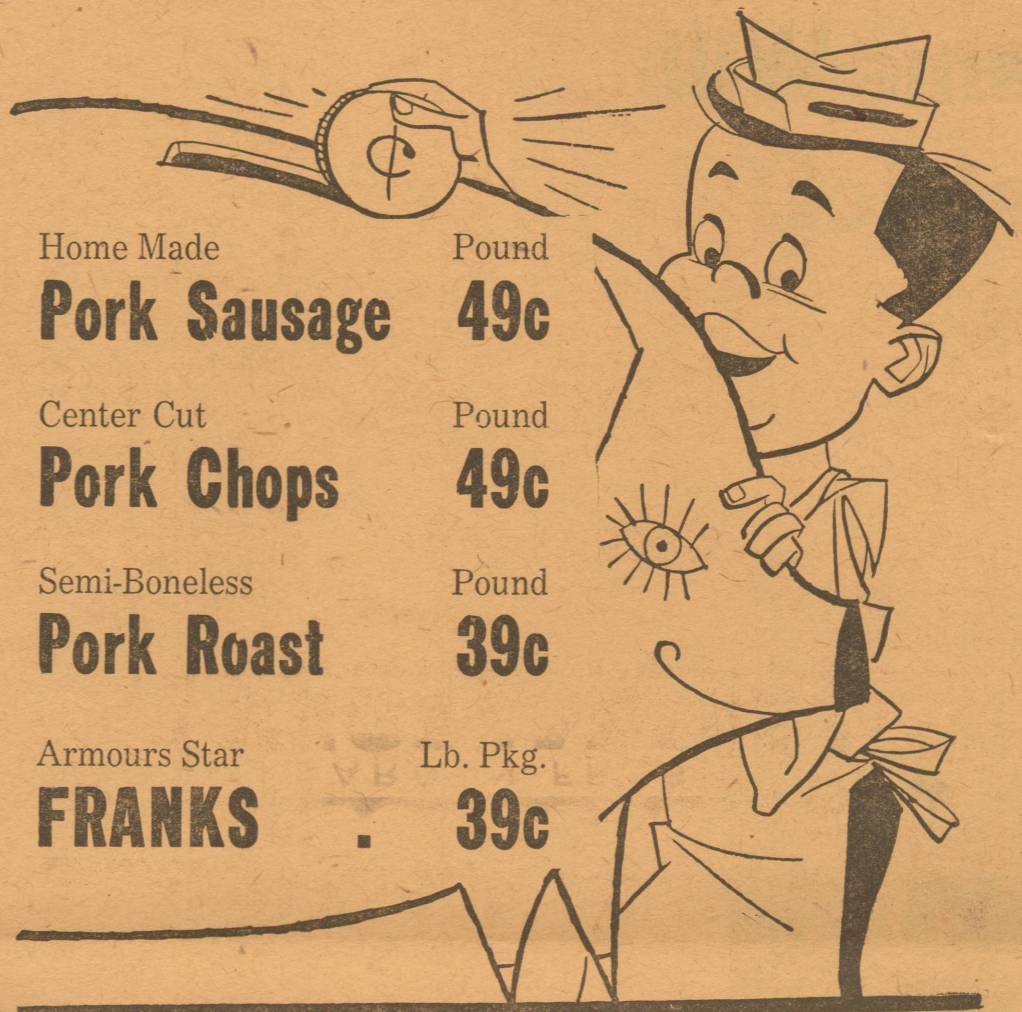
