ing the west side of Eldorado is the scene of a new oil discovery this week which may set off a chain action of development that could reach into the city itself.

The Pico Drilling Comany set a derrick on the location Saturday, Nov. 3 and commenced drilling. Exactly one week later, Saturday, Nov. 10th the operators encountered a pay formation at 2190 feet, and made a drill stem test. Unofficial reports were that there was a blow of gas, and over 180 feet of mud-cut oil, and no water.

Bob Murray of Abilene, owner of the lease, came in by plane Sunday and gave orders to drill to 2460 feet and set 7-inch casing at that depth and complete.

Casing began arriving yesterday morning and it will probably be set today. Tentative plans are to complete the well as a pumper and move the rig east one location and start another hole.

After the casing has been run into the hole and cemented, the next operations will be (1) perforating opposite the pay zone, and (2) swabbing to induce the oil to flow.

The next few days will see a great many visitors at the location as interest is running high as testing time approaches.
