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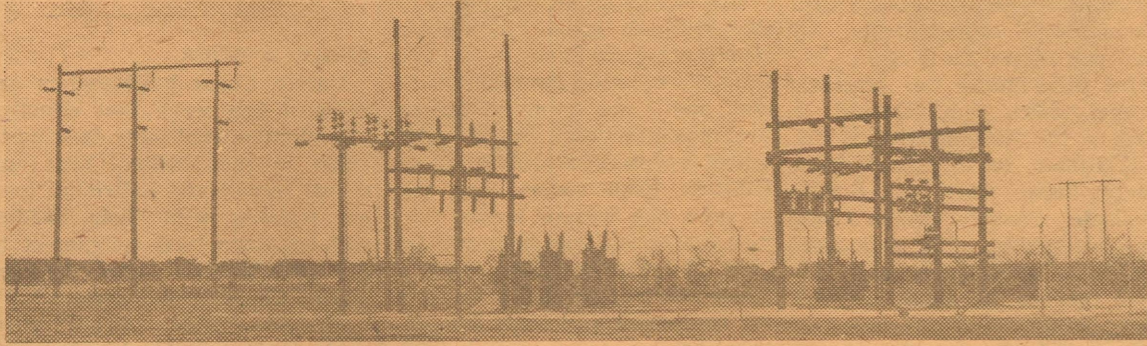

## 12th Annual Meeting Coming Up Tuesday For Co-Op

### Sub Station Represents Big Addition To Co-Op During The Past Year



The Strauss sub-station of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op was completed and energized in April of this year. The station, lo-

ated eight miles south of Big Lake, is one of the latest additions to Co-Op facilities.

The biggest part of the Co-Op

growth during the past year has been in the industrial area, with Co-Op electricity furnishing the power to pump scores of oil wells.

## Baptist Church Narrowly Averts Disastrous Fire

Early discovery and quick action by the Eldorado fire department probably saved the First Baptist Church in Eldorado from complete destruction by fire Sunday night.

During the evening services some of the choir members began smelling smoke and their director, Lavelle Meckel, investigated and found a small room on the upper floor smoking and on fire. He reported it to the minister who promptly dismissed services. As the congregation filed out, the fire department arrived, having been summoned by W. L. Whitten a few minutes earlier when he happened to be passing outside the church and noticed the blaze.

It is thought that the fire started from spontaneous combustion in a small room used as a storage place for Bible school supplies. The walls and ceiling were badly charred, showing the intensity of the heat, but water damage was negligible as was smoke damage to the rest of the church.

The opinion is given by many that had the blaze taken place at a time when it would not be discovered promptly, that the entire plant would have gone up in flames.

Insurance adjusters were in Eldorado Monday checking damage, but no estimate was made at that time. The building was fully covered by insurance and will be repaired immediately.

The First Baptist Church is the largest of the local denominations and carries on an active program throughout the week. The entire membership is grateful to the fire

department for their prompt and efficient action.

David Kuykendall and Vernon Everett stayed in the church building throughout Sunday night to be on watch for any recurrence of the blaze.

The Rev. Smith of Brownwood has been serving as interim pastor of the church since May, when the Rev. J. C. Hancock left for his new church in Houston. The congregation has not yet replaced Rev. Hancock, although some action has been taken in recent weeks by the pulpit committee.

The main church building was built in 1929, and in about 1950 or '51 an addition containing a number of Sunday School rooms was added to the back. The most recent addition to the church plant is the modern brick parsonage which was erected on the site of the old frame parsonage, which was moved across the street and is now used as a church nursery. The church also owns the corner lot from which the old two-story Bearce apartment house was moved a few months ago.

### S. S. Payments Available Now For Handicapped

Monthly insurance payments can now be paid to the handicapped son or daughter of a retired or a deceased worker, according to Floyd E. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo office of the Social Security Administration.

"This is the first year that payments can be made to a dependent child who is incapable of self-support due to a physical or mental disability.

"Payments can begin for January of this year to a person of any age who was disabled before he reached age 18," Ellington says. Such payments are made on the social security account of a parent of the disabled person. The parent must be an insured worker who has retired or died.

### Post Script

It seems to us that the Sinclair Plant continues to give our town and county a shot in the arm at rather regular intervals. In the past few days several families, estimated from 15 to 20, have quietly moved to town and have begun various jobs connected with plant expansion and the new gas gathering system being built throughout this area.

These people are connected with several different companies that all seem to be closely associated in the different phases of construction. We have run across the names of Pioneer Pipe Line Co., Pioneer Gathering Co., Poor Construction Co., Permian Construction Co., Proctor Engineering Co., and there are others. Some of these people will be here for several months and it all adds up to a bigger and better town and an increase for every kind of business in Eldorado.

Ted Hoss, head man for Sinclair's production division in a vast area lives here and probably knows more native citizens than many who have lived here for years. He moved here in April and has made many friends, but is the hardest man to catch for an interview that we have seen. He covers an extensive territory for Sinclair in his day's work. Recently a roustabout crew has been transferred here from Midway Lane and consists of at least three families and perhaps more will move later. They are working under Mr. Hoss. More about this later.

This will be the only date that the vaccine will be given without charge.

The 12th annual meeting of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op will take place next Tuesday evening in the Memorial Building and on the courthouse lawn at the barbecue pits.

This meeting serves a dual purpose: it gives members opportunity to learn of progress being made by their Co-Op and to take part in selecting officers, and it provides social contact which is most valuable.

The Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op has developed into a wide-spread unit. It is composed of an area served by 1604 miles of line, with 1210 meters. All who are served by the Co-Op are a part of the huge Co-Op family who are invited and urged to attend the meeting next Tuesday. This is an annual gathering to which ranchers and farmers and other users bring their families.

The barbecue, which has been set for 6:00 p.m., will take place on the courthouse lawn at the tables and pits. Orland Harris will be prepared to serve well over 600, some of whom will travel quite a distance to be present. Some of the Co-Op members report never having missed an annual meeting. A number report meeting many people they have never seen before, and in doing so developing friendships which they follow up later.

At 8:00 all attending will go to the Memorial Building where there will be annual reports and officer election. The business session will be followed by the showing of three short films.

The nominating committee this year consists of J. M. Treadwell, chairman, and Carroll White, E. D. Shurley, and Bill Seahorn.

For the first time in several years the committee is submitting a change on the slate of directors. Jeff Owens will be submitted as a replacement for E. L. Tankersley of Mertzon, who has announced that he is resigning. Others to be submitted will be J. Forrest Runge, Joe B. Edens, W. W. Sheen, Frank Bond, R. A. Harrell and John Childress. Nominations may also be made from the floor, report Co-Op officials.

Big Year Closes

As is shown by the announcement made by the Co-Op on page 3 of this issue of Success, this has been a year of expansion. Some expansion takes place each year, as users increase their consumption and then, too, there are some in semi-developed areas who have finally gotten around to connecting up. To the north, south and east, there is no substantial growth beyond this, as the Co-Op has built as far as it can go without getting into areas served by neighboring Co-Ops. The new growth is mainly to the west where expansion has taken place.

## New Building In Offing For Co-Op

As the big S. W. Texas Electric Co-Op family makes preparations to come together next Tuesday for their annual meeting, it can be revealed that plans are under way for a fine new office building which will probably be ready for the annual get-together in 1958.

Application is on file, according to Co-Op Mgr., McCormick, with the R. E. A., in Washington, for funds for the construction of the new building, as well as for additional line construction.

Tentative plans call for a building with an over-all size of 44x168. Offices will occupy a space of 44x68 feet, and the balance will be for warehouse purposes. Adjoining

this main building will be a vehicle shed.

The structure will be modern in every respect, and will carry out a type of architecture approved by Texas Co-Operatives. Cost will probably be in excess of \$100,000 and it will be an outstanding addition to the Eldorado business district.

Location will be on the lot across from the telephone office, now used by the Co-Op as a storage space for poles and transformers. This lot was bought by the Co-Op several years ago from Mr. and Mrs. Bert Page.

It seems to have been the history of all Texas Co-Ops that they go into business using rented

quarters, and after eight or ten years they construct their own quarters. The local Co-Op was considering a new building about two years ago, but dropped the idea for that time. The management explains that it was a good thing they did, because growth since that time would have made it inadequate for present operations.

The Co-Op now is paying rent on three buildings. When the new home is built all operations will be concentrated at one place, resulting not only a big saving in rent money, but in a big saving in time for employees.

Also included in the loan application will be funds for a warehouse to be built in or near Ozona.

### Released From Gonzales

Gonzales.—Santos Pina, Jr., six-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Santos Pina of Eldorado, has been discharged from the Gonzales Warm Springs Rehabilitation Foundation. A polio victim since 1956, Santos was first admitted to the Foundation on July 3, 1956, and has been receiving intensive rehabilitation treatment since that date. This was his third admission.

The Foundation is a non-profit, State-chartered center established some 15 years ago to provide the best possible rehabilitation services for the handicapped citizens of Texas. It is fully approved by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals which demands the highest treatment standards.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Schleicher County chapter, has participated in providing treatment for Santos at Warm Springs.

# COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

## Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

How would you combat fire on your farm while waiting for the fire department to arrive?

The answer lies in how well you are equipped with first aid fire fighting tools and how well everyone on the farm is trained in their use.

Here are some of the "first aid" considerations that could mean the difference between a well protected farm or ranch and disaster: (1) Extinguishers of adequate size and placed at convenient locations in all danger areas—the barn, machine shed and storage tanks of gasoline or kerosene; (2) Reliable extinguishers are those approved by nationally recognized laboratories. They should be checked regularly and recharged according to manufacturer's instructions; (3) Teach everyone who works on the farm how to use the extinguishers. (4) Garden hose sprayers and water buckets are effective as fire extinguishers and should be spotted in handy places in and around build-

(5) Ladders to reach the highest roof tops and windows should be readily accessible at all times. (5) For grass fires, always be ready with pump tanks or sprays, fire swatters, brooms and burlap bags and water to wet them.

Creep feeding lambs is a paying proposition when pastures are poor and ewes are thin. It is the least useful when pastures are good. Creep feeding permits ewes to remain in better condition and improves the finish of lambs, often permitting earlier marketing; lambs tend to be more uniform in size and finish; shrinkage will be less at weaning time. Creeping also aids in developing breeding stock and lambs sold as feeders. Lambs are easier to get on full feed, making for a shorter feeding period.

Oats with a protein supplement of 10% cottonseed meal if the lambs are receiving milk is an

excellent creep feed. If the creep is being used to fatten lambs, grain sorghum is an excellent feed.

The extent to which clean wool production can be increased or lowered by nutrition is still somewhat a mystery to sheep research workers. It is thought to be in excess of 30% but is known to vary with individual sheep.

Staple length can be influenced as much as 30% by varying the levels of feeding. This fact often misleads us in the selection of rams, especially highly fed rams.

Wool tends to become coarser as the protein and carbohydrate intake is increased. This is essentially the reason why our range sheep have fine wool and farm flocks have medium wools.

Staple length and fiber diameter together influence clean wool production. Short staple and extreme fineness tend to go together as affected by nutrition, while long staple and coarser fibers are commonly associated. The short, fine fleeces are light in weight, while the longer, coarser fleeces tend to be heavier.

Our goal in sheep selection is to produce a sheep which has the longest stapled fleece and yet maintains the necessary degree of fineness. It is very possible, after a few years of selection, to build a flock up to a point where 90% of the flock will produce fleeces with a staple length of at least 3 inches and a quality of 64s or better.

Seldom can one observe a home and its surroundings without finding some form of insect life. Insect life changes from season to season. Some feed on fabrics, contaminate food and attack dwellings, while others bite and annoy humans, carry diseases, cause secondary infections and are a general nuisance.

### Home Demonstration Agent's Column

Ruth Baker came by the office the other day and brought me her collection of Schleicher County Home Demonstration Club year books. She has a perfect set, no book is missing. Just as a matter of interest I've been checking on what the women were thinking and doing in years past and these things were being done.

Twenty-three years ago in July the demonstrations were being given by Mabel Howell, H. D. Agent, on "Canning of Garden products." F. M. Bradley was county judge and O. W. Wade, R. C. Edmiston, J. Forrest Runge and T. C. Meador were commissioners. C. Snell was county farm agent.

Mrs. Silas Burke was president of the Adams club, Mrs. W. D. Swift of the Alexander club, Mrs. J. F. Kinser, Bailey Ranch; Mrs. Forrest Runge, Cliff; Mrs. Gordon Alexander, Country Women's club; Mrs. John Williams, Eldorado club; Mrs. R. A. King, Mayer; Mrs. Raymond Dickens, Reynolds, and Mrs. Henry Mittel, Vermont club.

As a goal for each club woman working on improving her bedroom, one goat or sheep hide was to be tanned for a rug.

The scholarship fund contribution to help send a 4-H club girl to college was 5 cents.

And on and on through the years from 1934 through 1946. Then a break for ten years with no Home Demonstration work being carried in the county, and then a 1956 book shows up. The total picture is the same, a record of people who think and do for the improvement of the individual, the home and the community. Methods may change but the reason for such an educational program will endure as long as people want to learn.

There is something just a little special about cooking out of doors. Steak, hamburgers or chicken take on an extra good flavor when cooked over an open fire.

The Poultry and Egg National Board has developed a simple sauce which is good on barbecued chicken.

**Basting Sauce for Chicken**  
¼ cup water  
1 cup vinegar  
¼ lb. butter  
1 tablespoon salt.

Heat all ingredients together. Split chicken in halves, brush with sauce, laying skin side up when placed on the grill. Keep fire low to avoid burning and cooking too quickly. Turn the birds every 10 or 15 minutes and baste each time they are turned. To test for doneness, twist the drumsticks; it turns out of the thigh joint very easily when chicken is done—and chicken must be done.

These days of clothing workshops for 4-H girls have their times of fun as well as times of pure, concentrated work. Judy Hext helped the beginners the

other day and I heard her get so tickled that she could hardly stand it. She told me later that Marcia Mund had said the girl next to her after some discussion about the sewing machine, say, "You push the cloth through and I'll stand here with my foot on the button."

One morning we had an exercise on learning the names of some of the parts of the machine. One of the most interesting names at least, if not parts, was the feed dog. Later on Joan Griffin seemed to be having all kinds of trouble and I asked her what the matter was and she said, "I simply can't get the thread to go through the dog's teeth."

Mrs. Victor Sauer, 4-H leader for the Reynolds girls, Linda Sauer representing the same club, Judy Hext representing the Eldorado Sr. club and I are going to Menard next Tuesday for an electrical school sponsored by West Texas Utilities. ### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 27 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

#### Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 45-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any one time more than 15% of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and the election held pursuant to this Amendment shall be required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 45 of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

#### Section 1. That Section 45a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 45a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until such less such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on an account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957, and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Assistance to the Needy Aged; Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for Aid to the Blind; and Five Hundred, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments of \$5,000. They shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.



### NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows: "Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as may be necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds' and shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund. If any year (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.

#### available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 62, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for any purpose lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Board, Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to be due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1982 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1982, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds; except that such amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval of the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

**Texas Egg Law Becomes Effective On August 22**

College Station. — The Texas Egg Law, which becomes effective August 22, may be "just what the doctor ordered" to assure Texas consumers that high quality eggs are being placed on the market for sale. The effect of the law will not only be felt by consumers, but by producers and other industry men as well, according to F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist.

This law, says Beanblossom, provides primarily for inspection and careful labeling of all eggs that are to be sold on grade. The eggs are inspected primarily at retail outlets and if sold on grade are labeled according to size and quality. Ungraded eggs must be so labeled.

It shall also be unlawful to sell or advertise shell eggs below the quality of grade A as "fresh," "selected," "cage," "infertile" or "newlaid" or other words of similar import. Producers of eggs who sell only the production of their own flock are exempt from the law unless they sell on the basis of grade, then their eggs must meet the standards specified by the law.

The deadline for obtaining licenses by dealers, retailers, wholesalers, brokers and processors is October 20. There is no fee to any retailer, as defined by the law—that is, any person selling or offering for sale, eggs to consumers only in this state.

Actual enforcement of the new law will start on February 17, 1958.

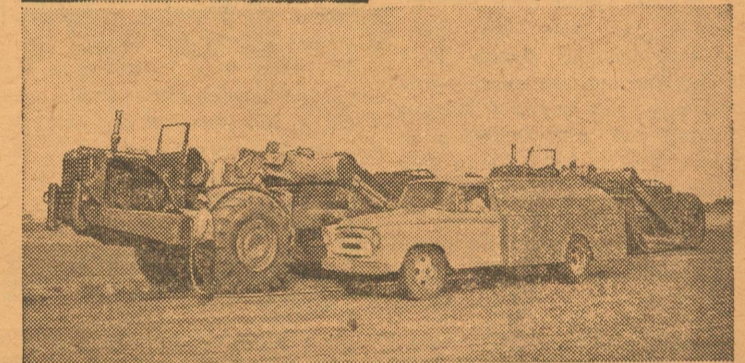
