Death Claims Mrs. Gunstead, Wife of Success Publisher

Mrs. Fred Gunstead, 60, a Texas newspaperwoman for the past 30 years, died Friday morning at 10:50 in Memorial Hospital in San Angelo. She had sustained a stroke three weeks previously and had had a heart attack early this year from which she had failed to make satisfactory recovery.

Mr. and Mrs. Gunstead had owned and operated the Eldorado Success newspaper for the past 12 years.

Her Early Years

Alice Ary was born near Potosi, Wisconsin, June 15, 1897, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Ary. When she was about five years of age the family moved to Guttenburg, Iowa. Here she completed grade and high school.

She went to Grinnell College at Grinnell, Iowa, for two years, and then completed work on her Bachelor of Arts degree at Upper Iowa University at Fayette, Iowa. She went to graduate school for one summer at Columbia University, New York. In 1945 she earned her Master's degree from North Texas State College at Denton, Texas.

She taught school in the states of Iowa, Arkansas, and California, and was married to Fred Gunstead in California during the 1924-25 school term, and the couple moved to Electra, Texas, in 1925.

In 1926 the Gunsteads moved to Pilot Point in Denton county, Tex., to become owners and operators of the Pilot Point Post-Signal. During the World War II period Mrs. Gunstead re-entered the classroom as a teacher in schools in Pilot Point

and Tioga. In 1945 the Gunsteads moved to Eldorado to become publishers of the newspaper here.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Gunstead is survived by one son, Bill Gunstead of Eldorado; one daughter, Mrs. Wm. Sauer of Van Horn; and two grandchildren, Paul and Louise Sauer. She is also survived by three brothers, Lester C. Ary of Cherokee, Iowa; Harold Ary of Muscatine, Iowa; and Lee Ary, of East Peoria, Illinois. She was preceded in death by two sisters who died in childhood.

She was a member of the First Methodist church in Eldorado and taught the Wesley adult class in the Sunday School for several years.

Funeral Services Held

Funeral services for Mrs. Gunstead were held at 3:00 Sunday afternoon in the First Methodist church, with the pastor, the Rev. R. Russell Heaner, in charge. Mrs. Ernest C. Hill was organist and Bob Burkart sang a solo, "Crossing the Bar."

Interment was made in the Eldorado Cemetery with Ratliff Funeral Home in charge. Pall bearers were W. H. Hale, E. H. Topfiffe, Albert McGinnes, Glenn Parker, Raymond Schrank, and E. C. Peters.

In addition to the Wm. Sauer family of Van Horn, Mrs. Gunstead's brothers, Lester and Lee Ary, attended the funeral services from out of town.

Commissioners Meet In Regular Session Monday

At their August 12 meeting Schleicher County commissioners voted that the amount of \$14,630.73, deposited in the state treasury in Austin to credit of Schleicher County Lateral Road Fund, be used for the construction and maintenance of the county's lateral roads. The funds will be properly credited to Schleicher County's Lateral Road Account.

The court also voted that the county auditor be authorized to advertise for bids for refrigerated air conditioning units to be installed in Schleicher County Court. They also entered into agreement with Sinclair in regard to the company's laying of an 8-inch line in the Huldale area. Also the court voted approval of the 1952 budget.

The meeting was recessed until later in the month.

Work is under way on digging a water well on the Permian location about two miles north of the old Reynolds school. This is the point to which Pioneer Gathering will deliver the gas it collects in Schleicher, Sutton, and Val Verde counties.

Annual Meeting of Co-Op Reveals That Two-Way Radio Service Will Be Installed

Members and guests of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op held their 12th annual meeting on the courthouse lawn Tuesday, as scheduled. The barbecue at 6:00, at which Orland Harris served 546, was followed by the meeting at 8:00 at which reports were given and directors were elected.

W. W. Sheen called the meeting to order and J. Forrest Runge read the minutes of the previous year's meeting.

For the first time in several years a change in the slate of directors was submitted by the nominating committee. Jeff Owens replaced E. L. Tankersley of Merton, who resigned. The rest of the slate represented all parts of the Co-Op area: J. Forrest Runge, Christoval; Joe B. Edens, Eldorado; W. W. Sheen, Menard; Frank Bond, Sonora; and R. A. Harrell and John Childress of Ozona. Louis D. Gayer, attorney for the Co-Op, presided at the election. The membership voted to accept the slate of directors as nominated, following motion by P. K. McIntosh.

In his manager's report Don McCormick pointed out that the

prompt service to which Co-Op members have become accustomed, in regard to outages, will be even better as soon as two-way radio equipment is put into use. The equipment will be installed within a few months and will cost about \$14,000.

Many Co-Ops are already using two-way radio which provides quick communication between the home office and crews in the field in regard to any service interruptions.

McCormick also pointed out that on September 1, Fred Butler and another man will move to Big Lake to serve that area of the Co-Op's lines. For some years the Co-Op has had several men stationed in Ozona.

Another facility in the offing for the Co-Op is a new building, for which a loan application is on file. The structure will be modern in every respect, occupying an overall size of 44x168 feet. Offices will occupy a space of 44x68 feet and the balance will be for warehouse purposes. Adjoining this main building will be a vehicle shed.

Location is to be on the corner lot which the Co-Op already owns, across the street from the telephone office.

When asked by Mr. Sheen if they wished to continue having the annual meeting and barbecue, as in the past, the membership agreed to do so.

S&M Electric Supply Co. at San Marcos donated two electric heaters for a drawing, and these were won by Mrs. Jack Logan and B. F. Hartgraves.

The showing of three films on safety was the concluding feature of the evening. Highway Patrolman Herman Moore of Sonora discussed them as they were related to safe driving, safety in the home, and safety in the school.

San Francisco. — Dr. Weldon B. Gibson, associate director of Stanford Research Institute, and Edgar R. Baker, managing director of Time-Life International, have returned from extensive world tours on behalf of the International Industrial Development Conference.

The conference, sponsored by Time-Life International and Stanford Research Institute, will be held October 14-18 at San Francisco's Fairmont Hotel. Attendance which is by personal invitation, is expected to be over 600.

Both Gibson and Baker, co-chairmen of the IDC, met with business and government leaders in trade centers throughout the world. They discussed foreign trade and

investment with executives in the Far and Middle East and in free Europe.

"Most businessmen were in agreement as to the impact a meeting such as the International Industrial Development Conference might have on the world economic picture," according to Dr. Gibson. "They feel that both trade and investment can be stimulated by a meeting in which men from all parts of the free world can discuss common problems."

The central theme of the conference—private investment—covers both large and small scale industry and includes both domestic and international capital.

This is the first world gathering of business leaders to consider all forms of industrial development that contribute to beneficial use of resources, greater employment, business diversification and economic strength.

As an example, Dr. Gibson said, "in the discussion on natural resources there may be a round table devoted to studying the availability, development and use of capital; another on the problem of developing management and technical skills; a third on the role of economic and scientific research information and facilities; and a fourth on the techniques for encouraging private investment."

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include in such classification of officers and employees of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State...

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of such obligations as may become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a, of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection."

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following clauses:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

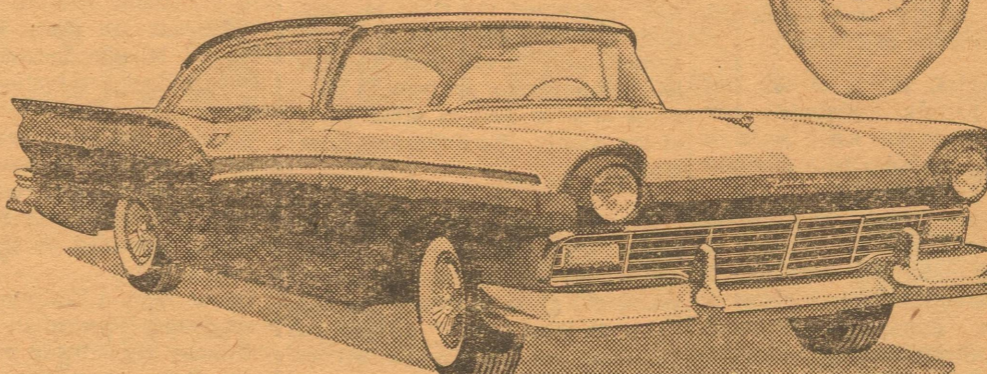

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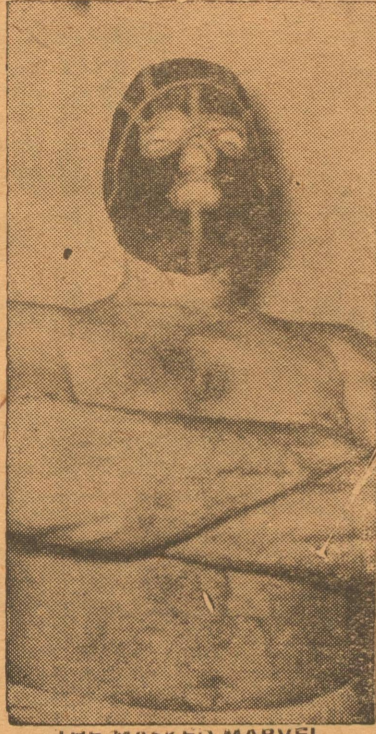

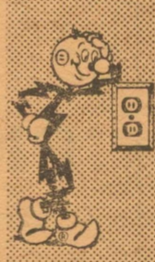

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

A new fishing license law increasing fishing license fees becomes effective September 1st. The additional revenue will enable the game and fish commission to increase its work program by 25 percent and will generally benefit Texans interested in better fishing. The new law states that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish in any waters of this State without first obtaining a fishing license, the fee for which shall be \$2.15.

The exceptions to the law are persons under 17 and over 65 years of age; fishing on property he owns or upon which he resides, and persons fishing with trotline, throw line, or ordinary cane pole having no reel when fishing in the county of his residence.

Unlike the old law the new one is not concerned with the type of bait to be used.
