Coaches, Team, Getting Set For First Game September 6

Head Coach Jim Herridge and Assistant Coaches Guy Whitaker and Earl Barnett are making preliminary plans for the Eldorado Eagles' fall season. The opening game will be held the night of September 6 in Del Rio with San Felipe.

There will be a weiner roast for all high school football players and their fathers. It will be Thursday evening (tonight) at the roadside park on the San Angelo highway. Boys and their fathers are urged to be there to provide Coaches Herridge and Barnett an opportunity to meet them. It will start at 5:30 and everybody will eat at about 6:15. Immediately after the weiner roast the boys will go in a group to the clinic to get their pre-season physicals. Gonzales, Aug. 6.—Rhonda Carolyn Sproul, seven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Sproul, Eldorado, has been discharged from the Gonzales Warm Springs Rehabilitation Foundation.

A victim of polio, Rhonda was first admitted to the Foundation in 1954 and re-admitted on June 11. She has been receiving intensive rehabilitation treatment.

The Foundation is a non-profit, state-chartered center established some 15 years ago to provide the best possible rehabilitation services for the handicapped citizens of Texas. It is fully approved by the Joint Committee on Accreditation of Hospitals which demands the highest treatment standards.

Pool Season Tickets To Terminate On August 31

Official closing of the Schleicher County swimming pool is set for August 31. Season tickets will be honored until that time although the prices were figured on the basis of an August 15 closing date. The season tickets will not be honored after August 31st, according to Byrl Clayton, pool manager.

Unofficially the pool will be open after school hours from 4 until 8 and on week ends the same as usual: Saturdays 2 until 8, and Sunday 2 until 6, on a trial basis as long as the demand and warm weather continues.

The pool will also be available for private parties during this period.

Telephone Company Makes Building Repairs

The General Telephone Company of the Southwest is completing extensive remodeling of the Eldorado building. New fireproof roof is being added, inner walls removed, all window openings have been closed and a central heating and refrigerated air conditioning system is being installed. New floors are also being put in.

They have been working on and are still installing equipment for inter-toll dialing which will make it possible to dial a party in another city from an individual phone without having to go through the San Angelo or Sonora exchange. This system should be ready for use in about one more year.

The building is being painted on the inside and outside. Commercial Construction Co., Inc., of San Antonio has the contract for this job.

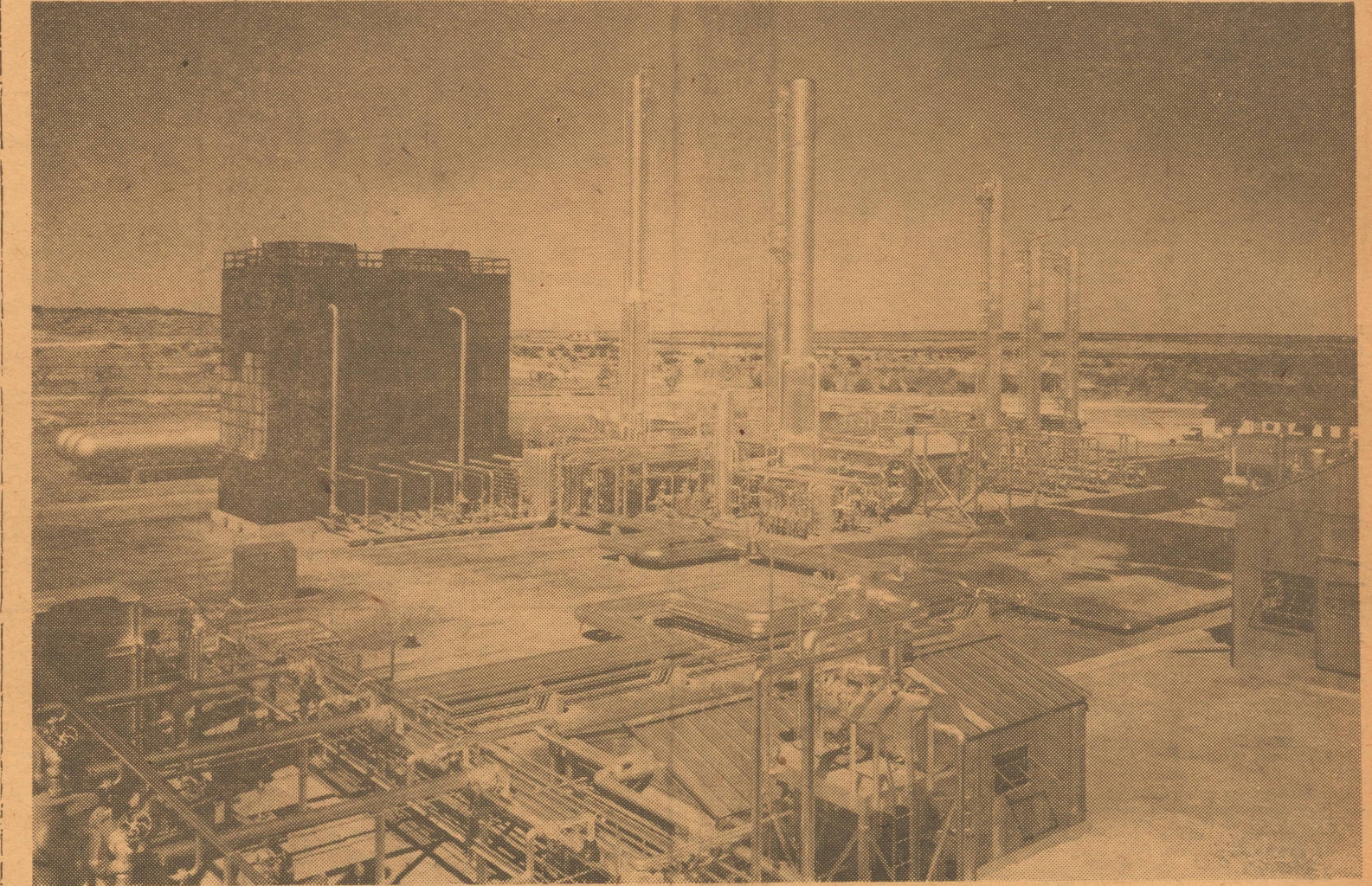

Expansion To Sinclair Plant At Huldale Now Under Way

Tulsa.—Installation of dehydration and desulphurization units has started at Sinclair Oil & Gas Company's Gas Products Plant No. 23 in the Huldale field, 12 miles northeast of Eldorado.

The plant, owned equally by Sinclair and Skelly Oil Company, is operated by Sinclair.

The plant has a capacity of 25 million cubic feet per day. Approximately 14,000,000 cubic feet of gas per day is being processed. The new units will remove water and hydrogen sulphite from the plant residue gas to make it salable to gas transmission lines.

The dehydrated and sweetened residue gas will be sold to Pioneer Gathering System, Inc., of Amarillo, Texas. The installation is scheduled for completion by November 1st.

Plant No. 23 was put into operation in July, 1956. Hydrocarbons salable in the liquid phase contained in the oil-well gas are removed by compression and absorption, then liquefied and fractionated. The liquid products are sold by tank trucks, tank cars and pipeline.

Sinclair operates 16 gas products plants, and owns an interest in 18 additional plants.

Oil News

Pan American Petroleum Corp. will drill a location NE to the Neva West field of Schleicher County. It will be 13 miles north of Eldorado and will be the No. 1B L. Wilson. Rotary drilling to 6,900 feet will begin when permit is received.

Location, on a 156-acre lease, is 3,800 feet from the north and 900 feet from the east lines of 1-J.A. White survey, Abstract 663.

A test was run on the Ashmun-Hillard No. 1 Williams Tuesday from 4490 to 4530 feet. The tool was open one hour.

Gas surfaced in 2½ minutes at an estimated 1 million cubic feet per day. This test was in the Harkney sand and they are now drilling ahead.

W. P. McConnell of the Ft. McKavett station reports that the station there is temporarily shut down due to only 13 days of allowable production in August. The station has been shut down since August 3rd.

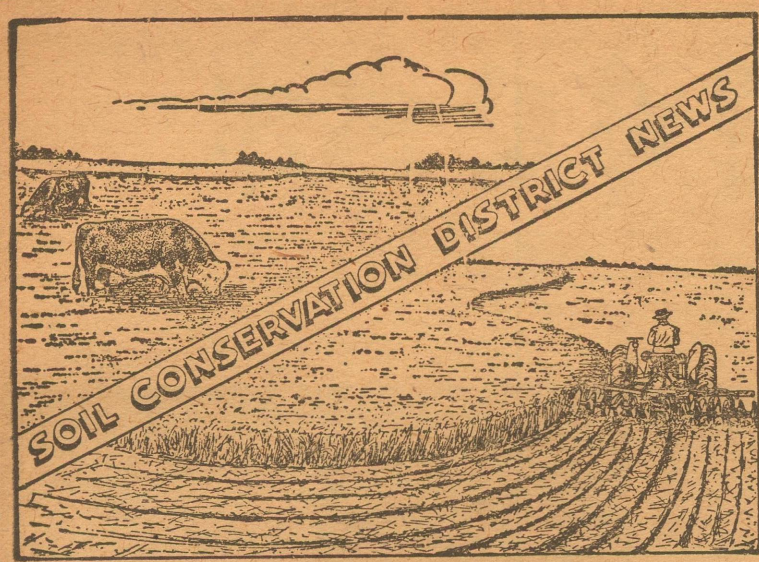
Commissioners Set Up Larger Precinct No. 2

At their meeting Monday, the Schleicher county commissioners voted the enlarging of voting precinct No. 2, in the southeast part of the county, by extending its boundaries to the city limits and to the sonora highway.

A new voting box has been designated which will be known as 2-A, Eldorado Wool House, to serve the voters in the western part of the precinct. Voters in the east part will still vote at

2-B, Cooper Gas warehouse. Under the new set-up all voting precincts come to the city limits, although Eldorado is still entirely in Precinct 1. About 25 or 30 voters will go from Precinct 1 to 2 as result of Monday's action by the court.

In other business the court authorized Byrl Clayton to operate the swimming pool after the official closing date of August 31, and to pay all operating expenses and receive all monies taken in.

Moisture conditions have held off so long that it's risky business to plant perennial grasses and expect them to become established before frost this year, according to technicians assisting the district.

Grass seed are expected to be in great demand again next year. If landowners have stands of almost any kind of grass seed it would be advisable for them to take the necessary steps to harvest the seed. For assistance in checking grass seed for harvesting, contact the local work unit of the Soil Conservation Service.

Several landowners in the district plan to take advantage of this lax part of the season to carry out some mechanical soil and water conservation practices. They are Joe M. Christian, Mrs. L. T. Wilson, and A. B. White, constructing terraces. Bill Blaylock also plans to construct terraces after he has constructed a diversion above his cultivated field. Others in the district plan to construct terraces this year after their crops have been harvested.

What conservation jobs did you have planned to do on your place this year? The months are passing by mighty fast. The year will be gone before we realize it and we will not get these jobs done unless we put forth some special effort. Let's apply a soil conservation practice to conserve the water when it does rain in order to grow a good crop next year.

Jobs ahead for the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District during the latter part of this year include a field trip to look over the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District leased place and also the Sonora Experiment Station September 6; sponsor range management, soil judging, and plant identification contest in conjunction with the election of a soil conservation district supervisor in Zone 4 October 1st; and sponsor a range field tour on the D. C. O. Wilson ranch sometime during the latter part of October.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been in the whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 42, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a referendum of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, to be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year since who is not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,000,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred, Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, Five Hundred, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

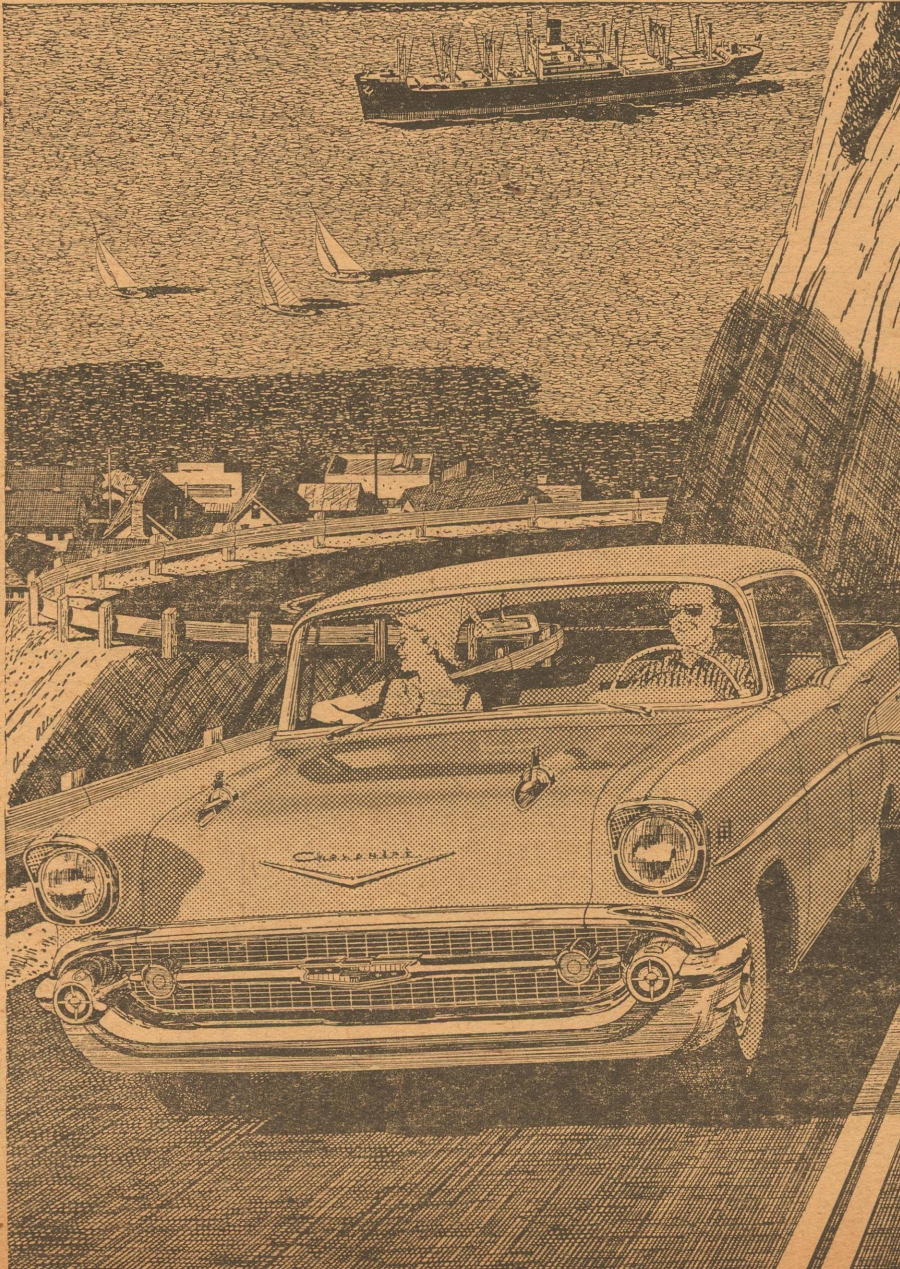
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a referendum to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following clauses:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Reporting Board Sees Light Cotton Crop

College Station.—The Crop Reporting Board has forecast a 1957 cotton crop of 11,897,000 bales—11% less than last year's crop of 13,310,000 bales and compares with the 1946-55 average of 13,669,000. An average loan rate of 28.81 cents a pound, basis Middling 7/8 inch, was also announced.

Handicapped by unfavorable early season weather, crops made an exceptionally good response to favorable late June and July weather. However, lateness of crop in northern areas of Central Belt, Oklahoma and Northwest Texas, which was only partially overcome, remains the limiting factor.

The expected yield per acre for the U. S. of 416 pounds per acre is only one pound less than the 1955 record high and compares with the 1946-55 average of 300 pounds. Record high yields are expected in Georgia, Texas, Arizona and California with better than average yields in other states.

The average loan rate of 28.81 cents for middling upland cotton is an increase of .66 cents above the advance "minimum" rate announced last winter. This final rate reflects 78% parity price of 36.93 cents a pound for upland cotton as of August 1, 1957.

Attend Twirling School At Texas Christian U.

Ft. Worth. — With 108 high school students from Texas and New Mexico completing the "Twirling School" at Texas Christian University last week, the annual TCU Fine Arts Summer Workshop came to a close. The one-week school was the final phase of the workshop program.

Dr. Lawrence Hanley, TCU director of the summer program, reported 450 students from 81 cities and towns in four states took part in band, orchestra, speech-theater and twirling divisions, during the summer.

The work in twirling and drum-majoring, held for a single two-week period in the past, was divided into two one-week events this year. The first session was held on campus June 9-14, with 192 in attendance. An exhibition of twirling techniques by ensembles and individuals concluded the week-long program.

Among those attending were Genelle McCalla and Emma Lou Menees of Eldorado.

Water Is Cheap, Yet Important To Poultry

College Station.—Water is the least expensive yet one of the most important supplies in poultry production. It cannot be over-emphasized in a chicken's diet.

Water constitutes about 66 percent of an egg and a bird's body contains approximately 55 percent, says Bob Griffin, extension poultry husbandman. It is pretty obvious that a shortage of water could have an adverse effect on egg production and broiler gains.

The water should be made convenient for the birds, advises Griffin. Have waterers level with the birds' backs and arranged so that they will not have to travel more than ten feet to the water supply. And finally, says the husbandman, keep all waterers clean and free of litter. Check them several times each day if necessary.

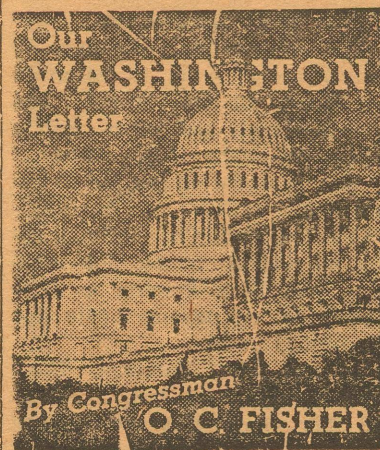

Adjournment is in the air, and may be a reality before the end of August. Again, it depends on what happens to Civil Rights. Before this newsletter is printed you will probably know the answer to that.

I plan to return to the district about Sept. 1, and will spend the month of September visiting over the area. It will be necessary for me to return to Washington in late September for some committee work here.

Junk mail got a lot of attention last week when the House approved a postal rate increase bill—the first in many years. I offered an amendment to increase the rate on 3rd class—junk—mail, effective on Oct. 1, to 2½¢ per piece, and my amendment was adopted by a standing vote of 147-to-74. If finally enacted this one amendment will increase revenue by \$67 million over and above the amount proposed in the bill. This type of mail consists of advertising circu-

lars, miscellaneous printed matter, and merchandise weighing 8 ounces or less.

In urging the House to approve my amendment I pointed out that the Post-office Department is losing money on 3rd class mail at the rate of \$300 million per year under present rates. It seems to me these commercial users are not entitled to this sort of a subsidy from the taxpayers. As passed by the House, rates on junk mail will just about pay its way. * * *

Should Supreme Court decisions be based upon legal principles rather than upon political philosophy? Therein seems to lie the basis for the issue on whether we should or should not seek to improve the caliber of that court. The present system emphasizes the political; a proposal I recently offered seeks to obtain judges who will think in terms of sound legal principles. A Texas lawyer, a student and devotee of the Constitution, in a letter to me expresses a viewpoint similar to scores of others I have recently received. He says: "The continuation of our form of Government most emphatically requires decisions from our Supreme Court based upon legal principles rather than edicts based upon a political philosophy. Every citizen in this country should appreciate any effort directed toward placing sound lawyers, rather than politicians, upon our Supreme Court."

If you made a list of "killers" around the home, you would be amazed. Insecticides and other poisonous chemicals stored within a child's reach can bring tragedy. Statistics prove this point. Two out of every 100 persons die each year due to accidental poisoning. Of this number, every fourth person is between the ages and 1 and 5 years.

Check your home now to make sure that all "killers" are stored out of reach of children.

Start with the medicine chest. Keep it locked or make it certain that it is high enough to keep children out. Label all bottles and material stored there. Keep cosmetics, soaps, bleaches, polishes and cleaning agents out of reach of small children.

Avoid throwing partially filled containers into wastebaskets or trash barrels where children could test or taste.

The county show will be held at 9:00 a.m. The district show will be held at 10:30 a.m. Schleicher, Menard, Kimble and Gillespie counties will be competing in the area show.

Local 4-H boys competing in the local and area shows are: Jimmie Whitten, Bob Steward, Joe Stanford, Ernest P. Nimitz, Jimmie O'Harrow and John McGregor.

Premiums for the local show will be 1st, \$15.00; 2nd, \$12.50; 3rd, \$10; 4th, \$7.50; 5th, \$5. There will be a class of ram lambs and ewe lambs making a total of \$100 on both classes.

Premium for the district show will be \$100 for each class of ewe and ram lambs. Placings will be from 1 to 10. The monies for the area show will be \$20 for 1st; 2nd, \$17; 3rd, \$14; 4th, \$12; 5th, \$10; 6th, \$9; 7th, \$7; 8th, \$5; 9th, \$3; 10th, \$3.

4-H club mothers will be in charge of the concession stand, selling coffee, soft drinks, and sandwiches.

Mr. J. A. Gray, extension animal husbandman, will judge the show.

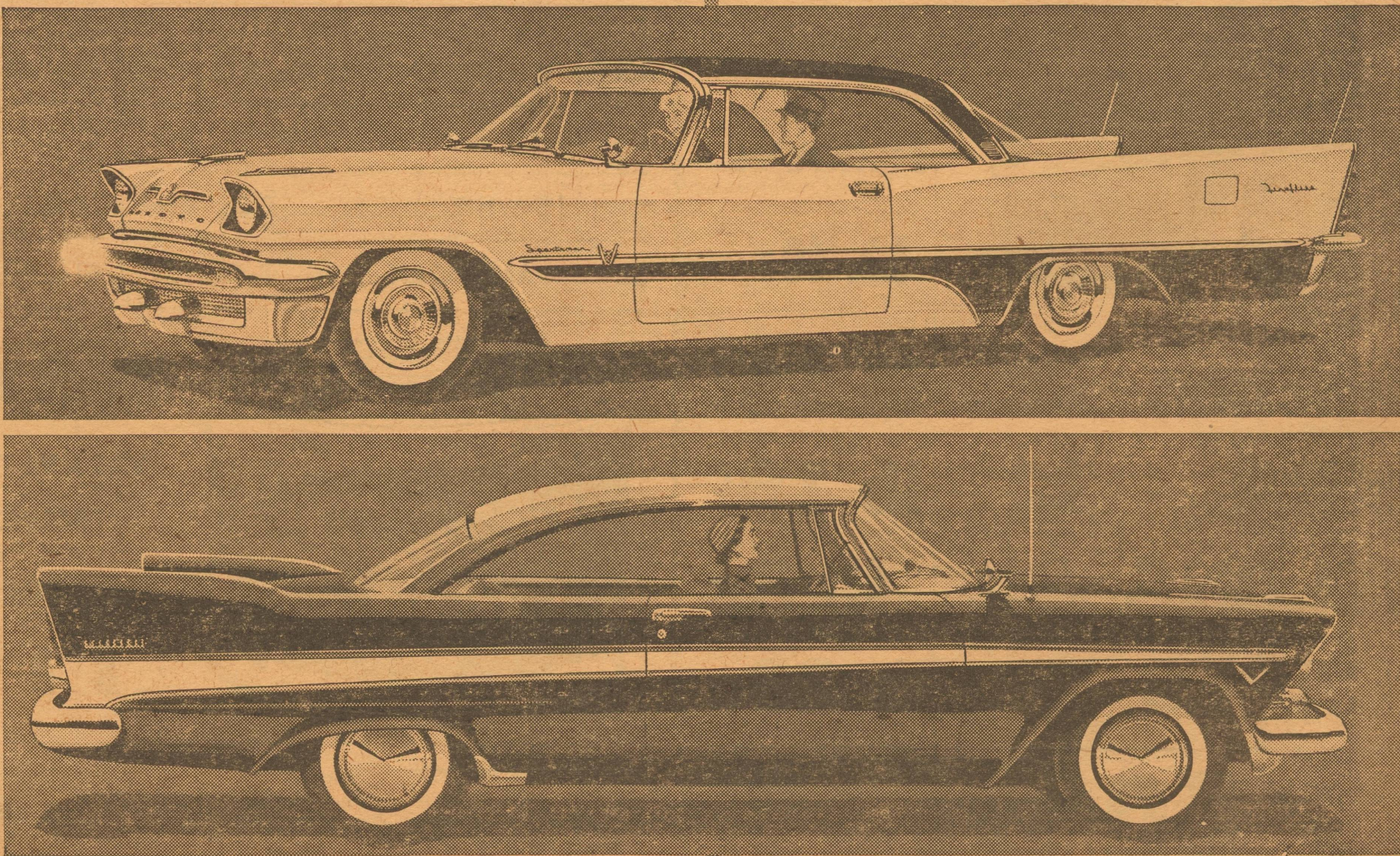

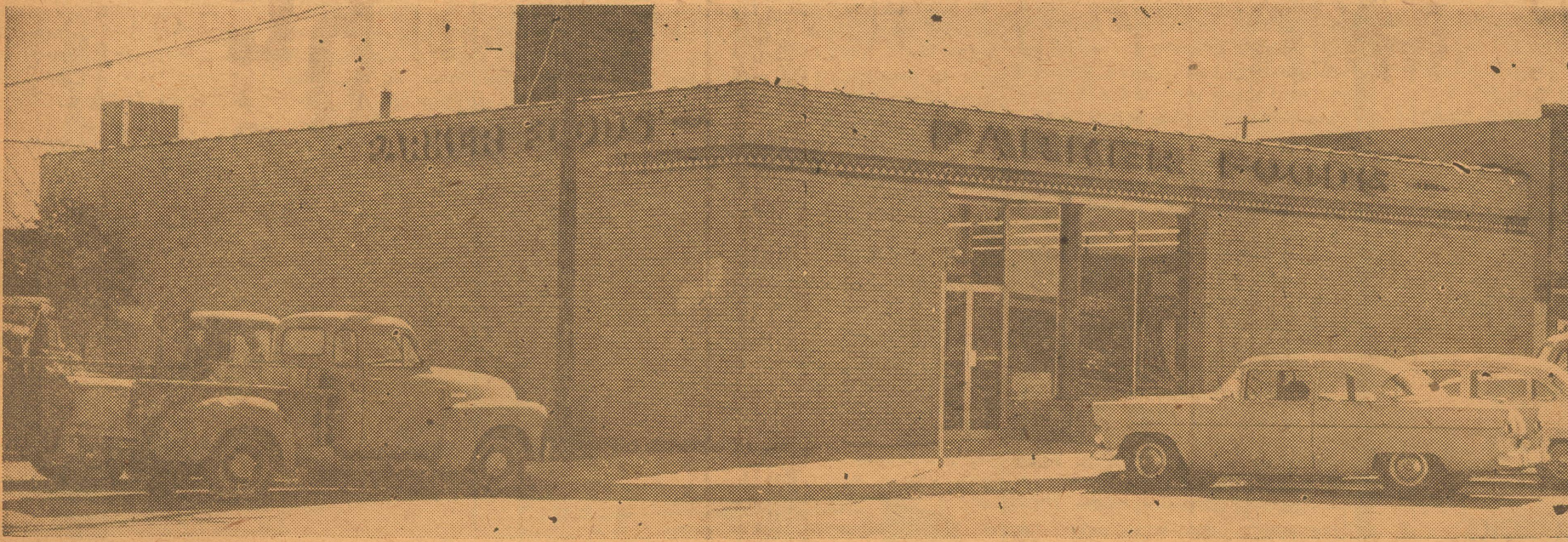

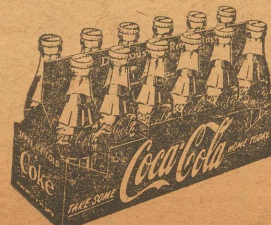
